Mosher to run again for state senator; Kreuger announces

Filing date less than a month away, and candidates are coming forward with nominating petitions for the party primaries in May.

State Sen. Charles A. Mosher, publisher of the Oberlin News-Tribune, is a candidate to succeed himself.

HE PRESENTLY REPRESENTS Ashland, Richland, Medina and Lorain counties in the state senate.

Mosher first went to the Senate in 1951. Since then he has achieved distinction as an outstanding senator. For the past two sessions he has been named to the

mythical "all-star team" of Ohio legislators by newspaper correspondents assigned to the capital. This year he was the only unanimous choice.

He seeks a two-year term, all that's available for this district.

NOT UNTIL 1960 WILL THE 20-23rd district elect a senator for a four-year term.

The candidate is 51, married, father of two children, director of Oberlin Savings bank, former member of Oberlin city council.

State Senator Clarence Kreuger of Berlin Heights announces he is seeking the post to be vacated by Senator Delbert E. Latta of McComb.

Latta is running for the GOP nomination for Congressman, to succeed the retiring Cliff Cleveland of Bryan.

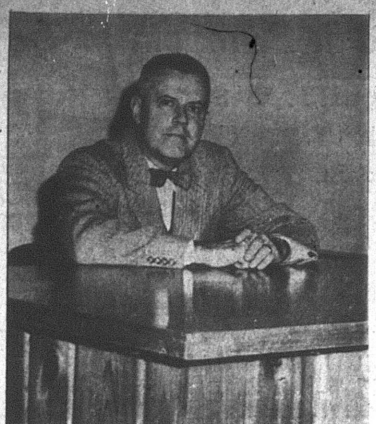
KREUGER'S TERM DISAPPEARS, owing to Ohio's peculiar representation law, this year. Had not Latta withdrawn, he would be bumping heads with the veteran Hancock county legislator.

Closer to home, a full-sized race for Richland county auditor shapes up in November. Norman L. Wolfe, who has served as auditor for nearly a generation, says he is a candidate for reelection. He is a Democrat.

RICHARD L. HAMILTON, young Madison county board member who gave Wolfe the scare of his life four years ago, is circulating petitions for the GOP nomination.

Fred Dawson, veteran Shilohan who is Richland county commissioner, is circulating a nominating petition. He is a Democrat, only one on the Richland county party.

O. W. (Bill) Leach of New London, incumbent, is a candidate to succeed himself as Huron county auditor.



Cashman reelected head of Plymouth school board as Beard gets Shiloh post

Plymouth and Shiloh Boards of Education held their organizational meetings in their respective schools Monday night.

Plymouth's meeting was routine. J. Harold Cashman was chosen president again, although he strongly urged board members to choose another. "I have been chairman now for six years," he said, "and would like to see someone else take his turn."

NOMINATED BY DAVID Cook, Cashman was seconded by Haldon Chessman, who said that Cashman's experience would be needed in the days to come.

Mr. Chessman was then chosen vice-president. Earl C. Cashman was reelected as clerk at a monthly salary of \$150 and bonded for

The Peoples National bank was again named as depository for school funds. The second Tuesday of each month was chosen as the regular meeting day at 8 p. m. at the high school building.

David E. Cook was named chairman of the finance committee with Donald Markley to serve with him. Judson A. Morrison will head the transportation committee with Cook. Buildings and grounds will be supervised by Chessman as chairman and Markley.

SINCE THE PLYMOUTH, Shiloh, and South Central boards are in the hands of an auditor of the school division of the Bureau of Inspection, no discussion could be held concerning the budget. With the anticipation of the Shiloh district becoming a part of the Plymouth district Jan. 17, Earl Cashman said that a revised budget would have to be made at that time anyway.

THE BOARD DID AUTHORIZE Supt. M. J. Coot to interview two prospective physics-mathematics instructors for high school. If another teacher can be found, this would allow Lloyd Ray to return permanently to the elementary school as principal.

The Shiloh meeting was held with four board members present. Homer V. Beard was sworn in by Wallace Harnly as a new board member to replace Dr. C. O. Butler, who resigned last month.

Harnly was also chosen as president of the board and Roscoe Hamman as vice-president.

Clerk Ronald R. Howard declined the clerkship, which apparently had been anticipated. E. Dean Wolford, manager of the Shiloh branch of the First National Bank of Mansfield, was appointed clerk for the remaining period of life of the Shiloh local school district. His salary was set at \$150 with a bond of \$1000.

The day was chosen purposely so that the meeting would fall on Jan. 18. By then, it felt, the school transfer would be in effect and any remaining business could be cleared that day.

The Shiloh branch of the bank was named depository for school funds and monies were appropriated to cover all salaries of school personnel plus a flat sum of \$10,000, which will most likely cover any current bills, and Shiloh's share of any bills in the troquois district.

The board granted the easement which the village requested for part of the proposed sewer to cross the corner of a lot owned by the school. A token sum of \$1 will be paid to the board.

A MEMBER OF THE CUSTODIAN staff was heard at some length. He requested that he and his wife also receive an additional \$30 per month which was recently granted to the teachers. The raise was called "cost of living" at the time, but actually was meant to bring the salary schedule closer to others existing in the county. Harnly suggested the matter be deferred until the board could compare salaries for custodians in other county schools. The board did grant a payment to him of \$3 per meeting for each of the adult agricultural classes which are being held in the school building through the winter months. He previously had been doing the work for nothing. A total of 32 meetings has been scheduled.

The meeting ended with the board, on advice of County Supt. Dale Kinney, giving approval to a request by Principal Ralph Daup for additional play equipment so long as it is within reason.

Expiring terms of three members of Plymouth Board of Education were extended by new appointments to four-year terms from Haldon Chessman and Donald P. Markley.

Steps were taken to play teachers for the current month.

Chest pays

Plymouth's first Community chest wound up its affairs Dec. 30 with the issuing of checks to participating agencies.

The drive netted \$3,580.24, which was \$279.24 over its goal of \$3,300, although only one-third of the soliciting letters brought results.

Extra donations in the amount of \$13 were given to the Plymouth Girl Scouts and \$10 to the Boy Scouts. Contributors had specified these amounts be given to the two organizations. The board of directors had agreed to honor such requests if the drive went over its goal and the money was available.

An additional \$125 was given to the American Heart Society. The heart money is being divided equally between Huron and Richland county organizations. An additional \$100 was given to the recreational fund of Mary Fale park. Plymouth Branch library received a check for \$57.24 to be used for current books.

A sum of \$38.50 has been left in the operating fund to begin the drive this year; \$125 was allotted for expenses at the beginning of the 1957 drive, and only \$87.50 for the amount was used.

The board of directors will meet July 21 at 7 p. m. at the Peoples National bank to begin plans for the 1958 drive.

New council argues two-hour parking versus another man

Enforcement of two-hour parking versus additional foot patrolmen in the police department was debated at some length by the new village council at its organizational meeting Tuesday night.

When the lively discussion died down, these facts seemed clear:

1. Newcomer Donald E. Akers and Councilman Lowell E. Keith believe two-hour parking should be more strictly enforced.

2. The police committee — holdovers John T. Dick and Omer G. Burkett — think another patrolman is necessary.

3. The job of police chief and street commissioner might better be divided.

4. A raise for the principal assistant to the police chief, Henry Trauger, now serving as street official, may be in the making, but the council wants to mull it over. On a contract basis, he has been drawing \$3,600 annually, getting no pay for work over 40 hours weekly. He'd like \$4,000.

5. A police warning system — bells and lights — is in process of installation. Bells and lights will eventually be installed at the intersections of Routes 61 and 98, in front of the high school, in front of the D. W. Ellis house in West Broadway and in front of the Ray Bright house in Trux street.

John T. Dick was selected president of the council. Joseph F. Dush, solicitor since 1948, was rehired for two years at an increase of \$200 a year to \$600, unanimously.

The dressing was made with veal, pork, and 17 different spices plus some celery, onion and bread crumbs. It took a week to gather up all the odd spices, and a whole night to make it. I even made a jaunt to Shiloh to borrow cider with which to baste it. I followed the recipe to a T, and it was not half so good as my own made-up way of how to treat a turkey. (Disagree — Ed.)

OUTSIDE THE FACT THAT once in the Marine Corps I helped clean something like a thousand frozen chickens (I was on mess duty and hiding in the frozen closet, but they found me). I did not know much about fowl. That is when I discovered that the average cookbook thinks you do, so I started from scratch. It was expensive, but also very good. Dressing I had never made, but I had a general idea of what should go in, so I put. Then I realized it needed liquid, and the only thing I could think of for some strange reason was eggs. Just bread, onion, celery, sage, and the eggs. It was lovely. It was two turkeys later that I discovered two eggs would do the trick.

An old friend once told me to rub the bird with butter, then sprinkle salt on, and from now on that is what we shall do. Although I do not like people who are not willing to try something new, I do know there is a time and place for the old.

SPEAKING OF THINGS old, do not throw out a dress. Give it eight years, and it will be back in style. It seemed like old times when we were younger and gayer to wear a dress that had hung all these years. It is right smack back in style, and the nicest thing I heard was, "Oh, Liz, you have a new dress." I tried to pass it off as an old thing, hoping she would think I was lying. I might add it still zips up, which is a good sign.

Then we have the problem of a piece of equipment which belongs, as Suzie says, "the restroom." A dear person sent us a pink one, not knowing we already had another. We have two choices: install another "restroom," which we need badly, or use it as a picture frame. We could change pictures each week.

The subject is vulgar, I know, but for years we have been plagued with the problem. It all be-

gan after Chippy was born in Italy. The Italians do not make them as do Americans so when one grandmother wrote and asked what she could send, we said THAT. She found an Italian who was flying from New York to Paris and going off into Italy, so she asked him to take it to us. Ask him if you disbelieving.

The nice thoughts of Christmas pass and comes New Years. Not a soul seems to make any resolutions. There is nothing more fun. Each year I thoroughly enjoy making a long list. Each year I say I am going to read better books and not murders, each year I say I am going to be a better cook and housekeeper, and each year I say I am going to try to be a better person. Since no one else is planning on any changes, I am most discouraged and will continue to be my namelessly self. And sometimes, it is hard work to be me. If you try, you can. A person can do anything in this world if he wants to badly enough.

That includes an old friend from my Girl Scout days. We worked in summer camps together. Roberta went through grade school, high school, college, and medical school, plus working with children at Mayo clinic in Rochester, Minn. She had only one thought to be a missionary doctor. She is now in what sounds like the most miserable part of Korea doing what she wants. She went last year after waiting several years because of the Korean war. Her Christmas letter was the most happy and contented one we received.

SEPT. 5 — STATE AUDITOR froze school foundation funds pending outcome of litigation over validity of transfer of Plymouth and Shiloh districts to Huron county. W. M. Delarber died at 45. Miss Marilyn Collier, daughter of the Huron county treasurer, was hired to teach girls' physical education in Huron Valley schools. The Elmer Colberts, Mrs. George Hackett and Mrs. Doris Nichols and three others severely injured in Labor day collision in Route 61.

Sept. 12 — Wilkins Air Force station announced it would discharge some 185 employees. First Presbyterian church was authorized to sell the manse and buy or build a new one.

Sept. 19 — Samuel F. Hutchison received an ensign's stripe in the U. S. Naval Reserve. Ed Taylor scored four touchdowns as the Warriors whipped Milan, 32 to 0.

Sept. 26 — Warriors downed Spencer, 45 to 13, but showed weakness in pass defense. Dr. J. F. Holtz, 75, died.

OCT. 3 — PAUL O. MARVIN, 57, died after emergency surgery. Plymouth Elevator was robbed of \$442. Church of the Nazarene bought a site at Hoffman and Park avenues, on which to build a church. Shelby Reed named Homecoming queen.

Oct. 10 — Shelby Air Force department announced it would phase out all operations by fiscal year 1962. Four died as a light plane crashed near Toledo. They were Leon and Gaylord McCullough, father and son, New Haven and Henry Buttrick and Norman Weirs, Celeryville. Two boys were killed as their car struck an AC&Y freight at Route 598.

Oct. 17 — Community chest sought \$3,300 in its first drive. H. James Root was named president of the board. J. Robert Swartz was appointed to the fire department.

Oct. 24 — A \$60,000 addition to Celeryville parish school was dedicated. The Archie F. Cornells celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary. Florence Mittenbuhler, 64, was found dead.

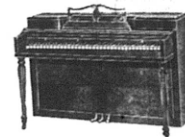

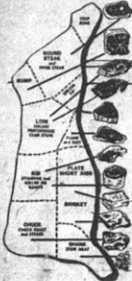
