Approval given to \$2,180 bleacher plan

Formal approval to the building of new bleachers in the High school auditorium was given by the Board of Education Thursday night.

Some 448 seats, instead of the present 240, will be available when the work is completed. The work will cost approximately \$2,180. Of this, \$540 will be for labor. Cost of the project will be borne by the athletic association with the help from the newly organized Plymouth-Booster club.

Kenneth Echelberry, president of the Boosters, handed a check for \$200 to Supt. M. J. Coon Thursday as part of the \$1,000 the Boosters hope to raise this year for the seats.

MOST OF THE BOARD meeting was devoted to routine school affairs. Board members strongly protested the action of the Richland County Superintendent, Dale Kinney, in withdrawing the services of the county speech therapist who worked

with children in both the Shiloh and Plymouth buildings. The explanation appeared to be that duties in other county schools took all of her time. A letter of protest is being sent to the county board for further action. This is the first year that the Richland county system has furnished a trained speech instructor to its schools.

The problems of the various insurance policies covering the buildings and contents were discussed at length. Presently seven different agencies have the policies and two of them are not residents of the school district. A special meeting will be held to hear the report of a committee chosen to study the problem further. This will be held before Nov. 8 when one policy is due.

A MOTION WAS PASSED requiring all children entering the first grade for the 1959-60 school year to show a birth certificate before being accepted.

Superintendent Coon reported several cases where under-age children have been deliberately enrolled by their parents.

The board went on record to encourage the Xenia plan, which is being proposed by that school board to make changes in state foundation moneys, which will try

to equalize the richer and poorer school districts.

MR. COON ANNOUNCED to the board that a new system for reports will be put into use next week. Pupils in the upper six grades will receive a separate card for each subject.

Pro-transfer group to meet Monday

Proponents of the transfer of the Plymouth school district to the Huron County system met Monday night to map final plans before the Nov. 4 election.

Claiming eight solid reasons on its side "for the transfer the group agreed to mail letters to every household in the school district urging a vote for the transfer. Some supporters have already

contributed money toward the expense of the campaign. Donations are being received by Mrs. Harris Postema and J. Benjamin Smith this week.

An open meeting is called for Monday at 7:30 p.m. in Plymouth Elementary school. Patrons desiring transfer are urged to attend.

Citizen's committee reports to P-TA today

Results of exhaustive studies of Plymouth school system by three teams of citizen investigators appointed by the board of education will be revealed to the Parent-Teachers association today at 8 p.m.

All patrons of the school district are invited to attend.

The 12-member committee studied as sub-committees, headed by Mrs. Edwin Beeching, Kirby Nesbitt and Homer V. Beard.

BEARD'S GROUP, WHICH included the Revs. Thomas S. Taylor, pastor of Plymouth and Shiloh Methodist churches, as Shiloh member and the Revs. Robert F. Hall and Moss Rutan as Plymouth members, is reported to have a report of electrifying importance.

This group discovered only one teacher in the elementary system with full academic training, it was reliably learned this week.

The committee will recommend that the salary scales be adjusted so that increases be afforded those with baccalaureate or master's degree training, with no increase to teachers not having that kind of education.

However, as an incentive to obtain it, these teachers, it was reliably learned, would be paid a fixed sum per semester hour by the school board as part or full defrayment of tuition costs at colleges or universities.

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WHOLE OBJECT OF THE report, one informant said, is to encourage the teaching staff to improve itself and to assist it to do so far as resources would go.

The buildings sub-committee, headed by Nesbitt, and Mrs. Beeching's instructional materials, laboratory equipment and textbook study group, are expected to bring in reports which underline the need for approval of the new three-mill operating levy.

The recommendations will be forwarded to the state house on education, which meets next month in Columbus.

"The recommendations are, of course, not binding upon the local board or upon the county or state board. They represent merely what a team of sincere, dedicated

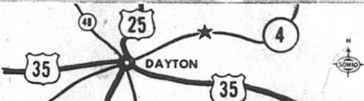

LET'S EXPLORE OHIO



A treasure house of aeronautical information that draws visitors from all over the world is the Air Force Museum at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, eleven miles east of Dayton, home town of Wilbur and Orville Wright. This museum, with 20,000 or more items of early and recent equipment pertaining to aircraft and aviation, has 175,000 square feet of floor space available for exhibit purposes. It's library contains some 675,000 documents and photographs. Fittingly located in the shadow of the "Birthplace of Aviation"

on the ground where the Wright Brothers made many of their test flights, the Air Force Museum welcomes groups and individual visitors. It was originally started in 1923 at old McCook Field at Dayton to provide a place to preserve aeronautical equipment displays from World War I such as this Army plane. The museum was moved to Wright Field in 1927. Here can be seen an early Wright Brothers glider and through its exhibits can be traced the history of aviation down to the present.

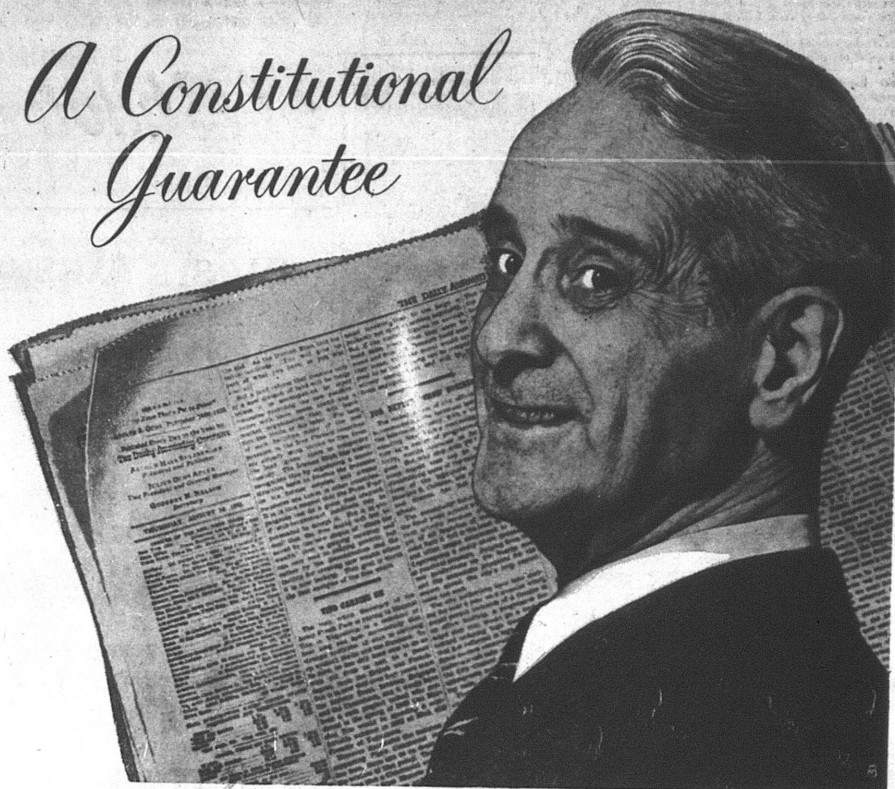

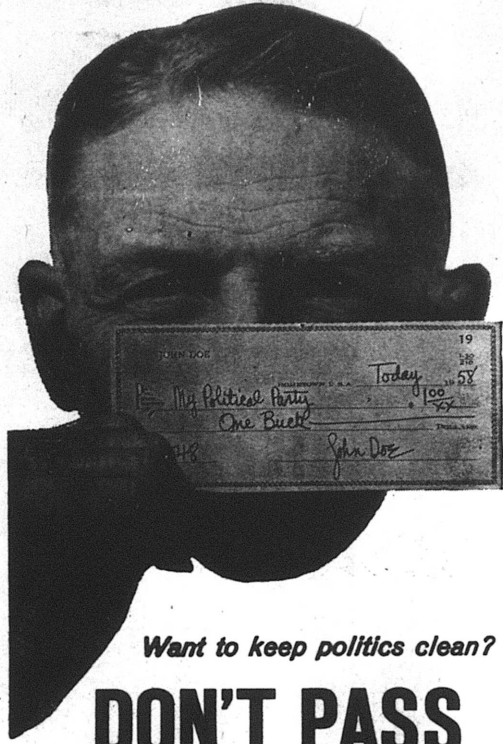

The Warriors scored first and last. The first was a thing of beauty, a 70-yard pass play with Billy Strine pitching and Duane Baker catching. Strine converted by rush.

A few moments later, after Milan failed to make a first down on the visitors' 39, Utiss and Patterson combined their efforts to send

the latter in from the three.

EARLY IN THE SECOND period, with a masterful bit of fakery by Strine, Patterson burst through left tackle and scooted 40 yards untouched.

Milan struck back, on a pass play, Dave Fox to Russ Dillender, good for 35 yards and a score. Ron Charity rushed the PAT.

The Warriors put the game on ice early in the third canto with two magnificent drives by Utiss.

He went in from 20 and 30 yards out, each time virtually unaided beyond the scrimmage line and the second time after five tacklers had latched onto him.

Dick Fidler scored the second PAT.

Charity pitched to Fox for the second Milan touchdown in the final canto, but Milan was done.

Patterson closed out his sensational performance with a fine 50-yard jaunt around left end late in the period.

Finally, Fidler burst through guard for 13 yards and added the extra point.

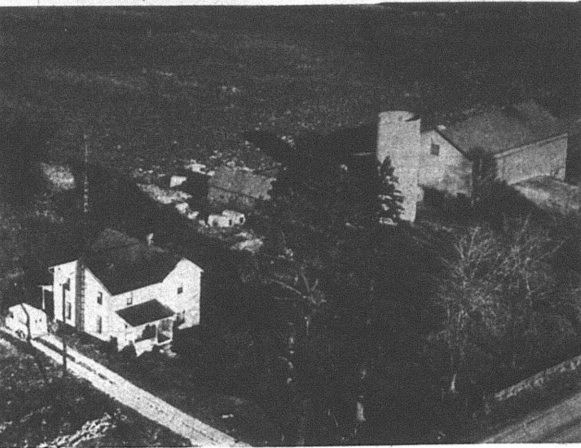

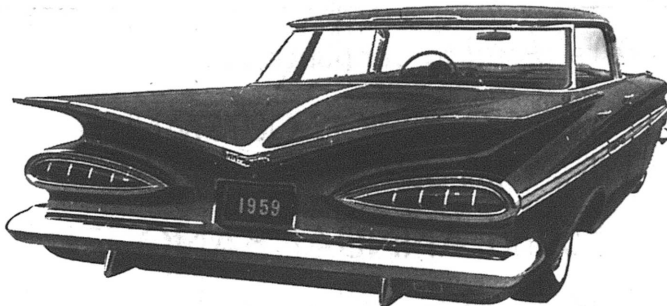
