mond Wellises, was awarded the annual Kroger cup for his entry in the Ohio State fair. He raised the wheat on a four acre plot. It produced 52 bushel, to the acre, tested 60.5 pounds

per bushel, was fertilized at the rate of 450 pounds of 3-18-9. His teacher is A. E. Strickland.

Boosters set ticket sale, aim \$1,000

An all-out effort will be made Saturday to enroll members in Plymouth Athletic Boosters club.

Memberships will be sold to residents of the school district. A membership of \$1 for the school year entitles the holder to voting privileges in the organization.

Wayne Strine will head the sale of tickets in Plymouth village. Delmar Nesbitt and John Reynolds will be in charge of the sale in Shiloh village. Cass and Bloomington townships will be under the direction of Gerald Hamman and Earl Lynch. High school pupils will go from house to house for the sale.

PROCEEDS OF THE MEMBERSHIP tickets will be put into a fund for the Booster organization. The club has set a goal of \$1,000 for the year, to be contributed toward the construction of new bleachers for the high school auditorium.

At Monday night's meeting it was decided with the school athletic committee that part of the cost of construction can be borne by the athletic activities themselves over a period of several years.

New bleachers to replace present seats in the auditorium will add approximately 200 to the number which can be seated. Cost for materials alone is estimated at \$3,000. It is expected that most of the labor might be donated. Work is planned so as to be completed in time for basketball season.

Present seating capacity is worse than inadequate for spectators. It is also insufficient for most of the school programs since the districts have been combined. If a new school building is constructed in the future, there is the chance that the present building would be a junior high school and the enrollment enough to sustain the additional seating capacity.

Caudill, all of Plymouth, and Charles and Mervyn Carrick.

The suit alleges negligence on three counts. Mrs. Hackett was riding with the Colberts Sept. 2, 1957, when their car, driven by Mrs. Colbert, collided with the Carrick machine, driven by Mrs. Carrick.

Caudill's car struck the Colbert machine while Mrs. Hackett lay injured inside it.

The plaintiff alleges wanton and willful misconduct and negligence.

Lutz suggests \$950 bill of Howard be paid

Richland County Prosecutor Theodore Lutz confounded Plymouth Board of Education last week with a written recommendation that legal fees allegedly incurred by former Shiloh Clerk Ronald R. Howard be paid by the board.

Howard submitted a bill for \$950 when the Plymouth board acceded to the rights and obligations of the old Shiloh board at the time of annexation of the latter district.

Howard's bill for the amount of \$950 was included in a sheaf of statements submitted for the board's consideration.

THE BOARD REJECTED the bill out-of-hand. It said the bill was not in proper form, that it was an unauthorized disbursement of funds by an official who was no longer empowered to act

officially, and it represented an action of which the board did not approve.

Lutz said in his letter to Clerk Evan P. LaFollette that he had inquired of the attorney-general whether the board can legally pay the bill.

Lutz says Saxbe told him the bill need not be paid, but if the board feels the debt was fairly incurred in the public interest, it may be paid.

Lutz urges the board to pay the bill.

THAT IT CONFOUNDS a body which is already badly strapped for funds is apparent. Since it does not meet officially until Thursday night, no official action has yet been forthcoming. But two authorities, one elected, one appointed who have always been truthful to The Advertiser, said, on promise of anonymity:

12-member citizen's committee named to study public schools

Appointment of a 12-member citizen's committee to study the Plymouth school system was announced Tuesday by the Board of Education.

Six members represent the old Shiloh district, including Homer V. Beard, former superintendent of the Shiloh schools. The remaining six represent the Plymouth area.

The board has charged the committee thus:

"To study the Plymouth school system for the purpose of improving our educational services to the community, to make recommendations to the public in regard to the need for passage of the 3-mill levy, and to report to the State House conference ways

to improve the schools of our state."

SHILOH REPRESENTATIVES are Kirby Nesbitt, the Rev. Thomas S. Taylor, Mrs. Donald Dawson, Mr. Beard, John Reynolds and Robert Bushey.

Plymouth appointees are the Revs. Moss Rutan and Robert F. Hall, Francis Miller, Dr. P. E. Haver, Mrs. Edwin Beeching and Paul Stoodt.

Subcommittees have been named as follows:

Mr. Beard, chairman, the Revs. Mr. Hall, Rutan and Taylor, professional study group, "to study the qualifications and salaries of the instructional staff and to make recommendations thereto." Mrs. Beeching, chairman, Dr.

Haver, Mrs. Dawson and Mr. Reynolds, instructional materials and equipment study group, "to study the condition of educational equipment and textbooks and make recommendations thereto."

MR. NESBITT, CHAIRMAN, Mr. Bushey, Mr. Miller and Mr. Stoodt, buildings and grounds study group, "to study the condition of the buildings and grounds and the permanent fixtures attached thereto and make recommendation accordingly."

First meeting of the committee as a whole was Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. in the elementary school. Recommendations are due Oct. 16, in time for the state house conference in Plymouth High school at 8 p.m. that day.

high as it can get!"

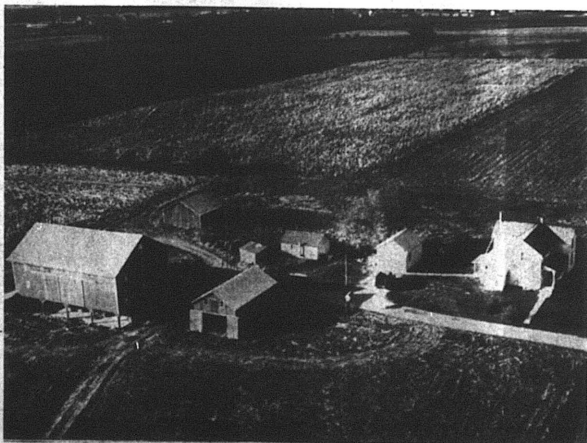

Bill Oberli scored four times Friday night as Seville's Barbers routed, 54 to 14, in a North Central conference game that Plymouth players were wont to call football.

The Barbers scored in the first series of downs, and in the second, and in the third.

From there on, if anybody had any doubts, it was no contest.

SUBJECTED TO THE "I hate you" routine during the half-time recess (Coach Lew Pettit locked his team in its bus, refused to speak to it), the Warriors came back in the last half and held the vaunted Barber offense down to two touchdowns. In the final period, Duane Utiss, who played magnificently for the Warriors, scored two touchdowns, one of them on a brilliant 64-yard ramble down the sideline.

For those who are still interested, here's how the scoring went.

Oberli scored on the eighth play of the game, from seven yards out, after the Barbers had moved from their 35. He took a pass from Bob Chidsey, certainly a comer at quarterback, for the PAT.

After two fumbles, one of them critical, Seville was in possession again, on the Plymouth 48. The Barbers sprung Oberli loose on a flanker pass play that carried 40 yards for TD No. 2, with

Armstrong barreling in for the PAT.

Third time Seville had the ball, it scored again. Simpson pounded in from two yards out, Armstrong again converted.

THEREAFTER, IT WAS ALL but ridiculous.

Armstrong got into the touchdown brigade with a three-yard buck in the second period. But the Barbers couldn't score that PAT!

Oberli got back into the act with another three-yard whack, Armstrong converting.

Then Simpson repeated, Armstrong again converting.

Finally, Chidsey hit Frazier with a 27 yard heave, Hewitt converting.

DOWN 54 POINTS, THE Warriors got Utiss loose on a pitch-out flanker and he burst into the end zone from the Seville 27.

Later, in a magnificent one-man maneuver, he piled through the entire Seville 11 for 64 yards. The last 56 of them, he was on his own.

Tragedy and heartbreak is no less common to high school football.

There's an abundance of it in NCC play this season.

Item No. 1: Principal I. C. Fellers, Townsend - Wakeman High school, announced a letter of protest would be sent to NCC officials.

T-W complains of "carelessness in hiring and directing football officials". The complaint is obviously directed against Westfield High school, its principal, Eugene Clark, and its coach, John J. Racketa.

Action was brought about after the T-W contest with Westfield, which the Purple Raiders won. Four Wakeman players were severely injured - Paul Adams, still under observation in Akron General hospital with a possibly fractured neck; Roger Kuhn and Roland Zimmerman, broken legs,

RACKETA, CONTROVERSIAL coach anyway, got himself in a hassle with Coach Brockett of Seville at the same game, played at Richman field, Lodi.

Nobody was in the observation tower, so Brockett went up there to scout the Raiders. Presumably he either bought his ticket or was lawfully admitted. In the absence of any rule to the contrary, Brockett assumed he could go in to the tower: to watch and diagram.

But Racketa didn't think so and ordered him out.

SURELY NO SADDER sight can be drawn or photographed than the dejected dressing room of Lodi's Tigers Friday night after Berlin Heights scored the upset win, 14 to 6, that for all principal purpose locked up the NCC title for this year.

Coach Ben Spechalske's long face and grieving eye were mute testimony to his disappointment. And, man that he is, it was less that he had lost than that a young freshman's mistake cost the team

But to choose an immature 14 or 15-year-old youngster to go out before perhaps 500 adults screaming like banshees for performance is a brutal decision for a coach, who's no more than a teacher doing part-time work with athletics. Truth to tell, failure ought to be anticipated more often than success. But that's not unfortunately, the way it is.

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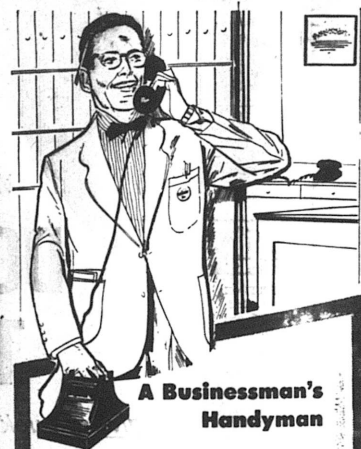

Currently, the two entities share fire protection and cemetery facilities.

WHAT BROUGHT THE DIFFERENCES to a head was the discovery, AFTER a bond issue was placed on the ballot, and voted upon, that where a township and the village jointly raise tax monies to pay for a fire department, the township enjoys priority over the tactical and administrative control of the fire apparatus and company.

In ordinary circumstances, it wouldn't matter much, for when there's a fire, the first objective is to extinguish it, regardless of where it may be. But in Lexington, owing to the animosity between township and village, it didn't work out that way.

Now the fire house has been built and the apparatus purchased, and the bonded indebtedness jointly shared by the township and the village. Were the village to separate from the township now, it would carry with it a share of the debt but no fire house and no apparatus.

It occurs to us that the lesson underlying this dispute is this: that village corporations and townships should strive to get along together in close harmony.

True, the township does draw revenues from the village. And the tax-paying citizen does inquire if the village obtains a fair return in services for what it contributes.

These services exist and they are, so far as we are able to ascertain, cheerfully rendered. Road-maintaining equipment is often loaned at no charge. In our own situation, fire contracts are arranged so that payments by the townships exceed the cost of the services rendered by the village firemen.

We would wish no such situation as obtains in Troy township to apply here. A careful effort by township trustees and village officials to maintain harmonious relationships is a good way to insure that it never does. And what's more — don't own anything in joint tenancy.

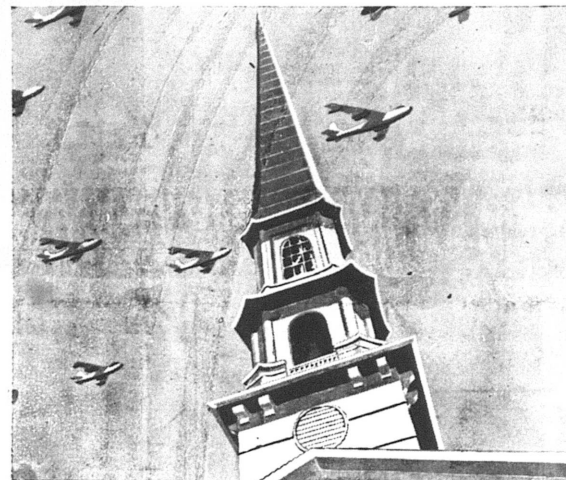

Smith farm steeped in history

For the historically minded, the T.V. Smith farm in Handville Corners road, Greenfield township, Huron county, affords an opportunity to unfold the pages of the past, when the red man roamed these parts.

For it is one of the oldest farms in the county. For many years, it was the property of Nathan Lovell. His wife, the former Martha McKelvey, inherited it. It descended thereafter through the McKelvey line.

BUT IT WAS ONLY RIGHT that it should have done so. For the McKelveys settled there, together with the Lovells, before the war of 1812. During that struggle, Indians — and whether they were in the pay of the British or simply marauders on their own is uncertain — burned them out.

They took refuge with other white settlers until the danger subsided. And, in due time, when

the green shards had covered the blackened ruins of the levelled cabin, they came back, threw back the underbrush and began to till the soil.

At the end of the McKelvey line, the farm was sold to J. H. West, who let it out to a tenant.

THE SMITHS NOW OCCU-py the place and farm it for profit. But their son-in-law and daughter, the Ivan Rogerses, do the farming.

It lies on two sides of Route 61 in Greenfield township.

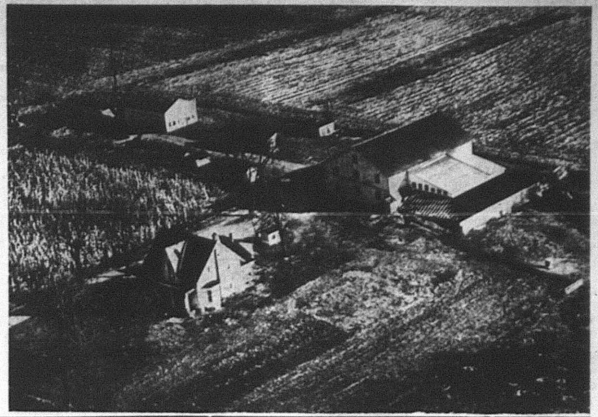
