As their part in the campaign, FFA members will visit farms in the area and will make sure that the rules for proper and safe operation of corn barvest equipm ent. This includes tractors, corn pickers, forger chongers, picker. pickers, forage choppers, picker-shellers, silo blowers and eleva-

Each farmer who pledges him-self to observe the rules for corn harvest safety will have a special "Safe Operator" sticker placed on his equipment. The farm family will also participate by displaying a table pledge card during mealtime to remind each family member to prevent accidents.


