

We endorse these candidates, issues

Both sides claiming lead in school transfer fight

Election day six days off, and it's still up in the air who'll win. That was the gist of opinions given an Advertiser survey this week on four vital issues:

1. Will the transfer of Plymouth school district succeed?
2. Will the three-mill school levy be approved?
3. Can Mike Di Salle defeat Governor C. William O'Neill?
4. Will "right-to-work" be approved?

INTEREST IN THESE FOUR questions overshadowed what would otherwise be an exciting election locally. A \$150,000 general obligation bond issue, to pay for a sewage system, is on the ballot this year. Signs are it will fail. It calls for an additional tax of 2.8 mills for 25 years.

So is a half mill levy for Mary Fate park, in which interest was found to be lacking.

A citizen's committee headed by Mrs. J. Harris Postema and J. Benjamin Smith was working at the start of this week to induce voters in the school district to approve a transfer. How well they were succeeding was problematical, even to themselves.

"We feel confident that the transfer, which any thinking person knows is necessary and desirable, will be given an affirmative vote," the committee said Monday.

But organized support was slow in coming. The Chamber of Com-

merce came out resoundingly for the three-mill levy at its Oct. 16 meeting, but was silent on the transfer.

AND TWO MEMBERS OF the school board who had been thought to be strong supporters of transfer, issued a belated statement which incited the committee and the publisher of The Advertiser, who backed one of them, albeit faintly, in the last election.

David E. Cook, whose letter appears elsewhere today, and Gerald S. Howard, whose maneuvering initially upset the transfer to Huron county, attended the

meeting. It was plain during the survey that opposition is strong, but it was difficult — and some of the survey was made by disinterested persons not employed by The Advertiser — to detect the nature, strength or identity of the opposers.

Some of the opposition developed, it was said, because of a confusing opinion rendered by Attorney General William Saxe. In an official statement, Plymouth Board of Education said "the opinion does not seem to affect the situation at all, since

there is no proposal on the ballot to unite with Willard, nor has there ever been any idea to this effect. The attorney-general apparently has made a mistake."

A HOT FIGHT WAS GOING on in Huron Valley district between those favoring annexation to Willard district, led by former New Haven Board President Claude A. Bauer, and those favoring retention of the status quo, led by Stanford Cherry.

Both sides claimed an early advantage. The anti-annexation group issued a cordial invitation to patrons of the old Shiloh district to join with Plymouth in transferring to Huron county.

Cherry said he reaffirms the feeling of residents of Huron county that the old Huron Valley district was an efficient district. "The cooperation of all concerned was outstanding," he said.

"Don't be misled by false information or half truths," Cherry counselled Shiloh residents, "or by people with personal preferences and selfish motives. We want you in with us and we'll be glad to have you."

"Right-to-work" votes will probably outnumber anti-"right-to-work" ballots locally. What will happen on a state-wide basis generated considerable heat in opposing quarters. But there was no evidence favoring either side.

A LAST-MINUTE LOCAL swing to Di Salle was detected. Whether this traditional Republican area will opt for the rotund Democrat remained problematical, although many independents said they disapproved of Governor O'Neill's stand on "right-to-work."

An editorial -

PRIDE BEFORE PUPILS?

One of the risks an editor takes when he endorses a candidate whose popularity is slight is that the candidate may eventually let him down.

Nevertheless, many editors take that chance, and persist in the habit even after they have been let down.

Some time ago, we endorsed a candidate for local office because, despite his unpopularity in some quarters, we thought his dedication to a forward-looking policy was worthy of public support.

Now he has reversed himself. Now he says that when he proposed the motion to reconstitute the Huron Valley school district in Mareh, he intended that it should be done so under the jurisdiction of the Richland county board of education.

We attended that meeting, as well as those before and after it. We have carefully interrogated those who were there that night, and we have searched the records equally carefully.

Nowhere can we find any evidence that he intended that Huron Valley district should be reconstituted under Richland county jurisdiction.

The suspicion is strong that he has changed his mind for personal reasons, chiefly that he enjoys serving on the school board, possibly imagines he can obtain some favor for his own and others by doing so.

Tragedy befall two businesses in downtown Plymouth last week.

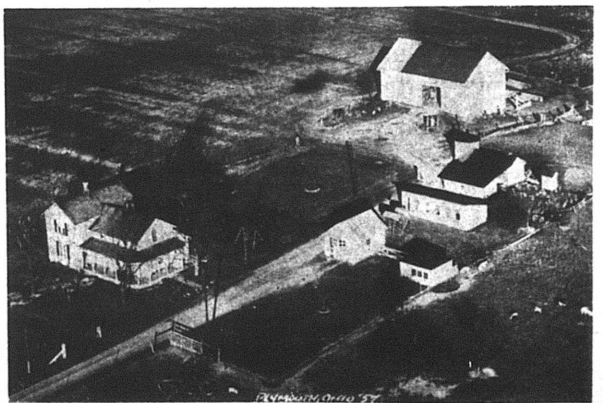

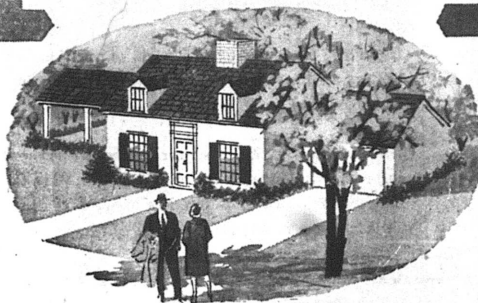

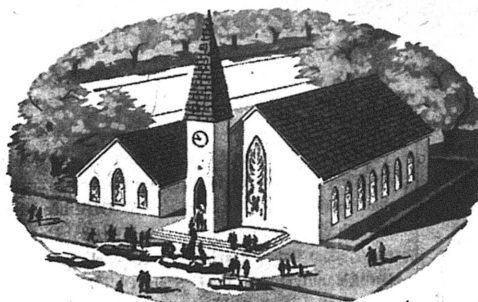

Sir: The Plymouth School district offers an educational program to boys and girls that is second to none in this area, but to maintain such a broad curriculum in face of continued rising costs, has made it necessary to neglect other aspects of our schools. As a result, some repairs have been neglected, worn out books have not been replaced rapidly enough, and our teachers' pay is lowest in the county.

The board of education is asking you to vote on a three mill levy for school operation. Only if the levy carries, the school can continue to offer a fine educational program, but if it should fail, there will be no other alternative than to cut back our operation to a bare minimum and

hope that the state will continue to approve our program.

We hope that you will support this important levy, but more important you have the right to decide at the polls if our schools should go forward or backward. Don't forget to vote. Respectfully,

Sir: The Plymouth Local School district has lower tax rates for school operation purpose than any Richland County school except tax-rich Springfield township. This is the basic cause for asking for a three mill increase, for districts with low evaluations can no longer support an adequate educational program on less than 15 mills.

The estimated combined tax rate for Plymouth and Shiloh for next year, without the additional three mills, would be 13.40. This compares with Springfield township, 10.80; Lexington, 13.80; Lucas, 15; Madison, 17; Union, 17; Butler, 17.20; Belleville, 19.80. The addition of three mills to the Plymouth rate would place

Plymouth about average among the county schools. If all new and renewal levies pass in Richland county the average tax rate would be 16.61 mills. Plymouth's new tax rate would approximate 16.40 mills.

Sir: I have been asked to clarify my position concerning the combining of the Plymouth district and the Huron Valley district, and also to explain or justify my apparent defection from the cause.

It has always been my ambition that we provide the best education for our children that is possible. It has always hurt me to hear—"Our schools are just as good as —'s" or "Their schools are not as good as ours" leaves so very much to be desired.

Realizing a few years ago that the six mill limitation, because of our enrollment would stymie us from providing adequate high school facilities, I began agitating (I use the word "agitating" advisedly) for a consolidation of districts that would enable us to go beyond the six mill limitation.

There is no need to belabor the process by which we came out as we now are. Acting as a school board member I twice voted for a resolution stating that a school district comprising the old Richmond Greenfield, New Haven, Plymouth and Shiloh was desirable and should

be aimed at. However, I have also attended numerous meetings where certain people stated that they wouldn't mind one certain district to match, but they wanted nothing whatsoever to do with another one or with certain elected officials governing them. These were not certain isolated cases but were said from north to south and from south to north.

The members of the present Huron Valley board have consistently refused to be persuaded to go into Willard or come into Plymouth. This is as true now as it was when they were members of the respective boards of Richmond, Greenfield and New Haven at a time when both the state department of education and patrons from their own districts were asking them to remedy the situation and in spite of the fact that the Huron county board of education could have effected this by themselves until Jan. 1, 1958, had they so wished. So the people themselves have taken the initiative there.

The present situation is this: The Plymouth district is now big enough to meet all state requirements and standards. We can go ahead now and build a high school, raise our curriculum standards and set a pattern for others to follow, needing only the cooperation and support of what once was only two districts.

To move to Huron county now

all that we would gain would be an increased valuation per pupil of \$1120, or about the cost of a 1/2 mill levy. On the debit side we would have five or more separate fractions to weld together to make a cooperative effort rather than the two we now have. The South Central district cannot get the support from their three old districts. Do you think we can move from five? I would rather place my money on the two.

In conclusion I feel that the Board has taken a GIANT step forward in appointing the Citizens Committees on Text Books, Teachers, Curriculum and Buildings and Grounds. . . I would like to see them continue their work. I hope they come to board meetings with their recommendations. I'm willing to stay there all night any night to work with them to bring about a school system that the whole community can point to with pride and say:

"Big or Small, Rich or Poor, We've got the best School System in The State and right now we're working on making it the best in the Country."

And the evidence leading to such a conclusion is strong. When his own colleagues voted for nominations to the Huron Valley board, before the ill-fated Supreme Court decision, he was passed over. He was defeated at the polls thereafter. His chance of retention of office in the Huron Valley district would be slight.

This changing of horses in mid-stream smacks of vote-seeking, pure and simple.

The reasons why the transfer to Huron county and re-constitution of the Huron Valley district should be approved have been capably advanced by the citizen's committee.

We shall not repeat them here. Dog-in-the-manger tactics, whether by school board members or others, are certainly improper in school questions.

What to do about it? Nobody is more disappointed than the editor of this newspaper. But he is going to vote FOR transfer across the county line and he is going to urge his friends to do likewise.

No other course is tenable, reasonable or worthy of his time and effort.

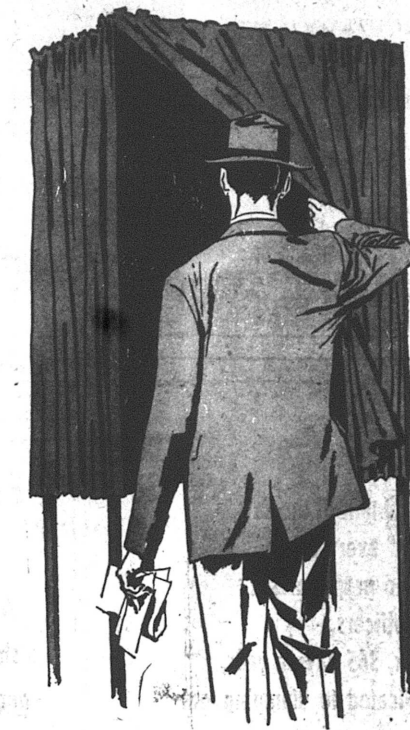

WHY SHALL WE VOTE "NO" ON ISSUE 1

This proposed amendment of the Ohio Constitution authorizes the establishment of a "Metropolitan Federation" in any or all of the cities included in the state. Such a proposal is a matter of vital concern to the people who live in rural areas. This amendment aims to centralize the powers of government in the hands of a few unrepresentative officials, instead of having them exercised by officials elected by the people. Its true name should be "Metropolitan Centralization Amendment."

The amendment plans to create a super-government which will extend its rule over the surrounding rural areas, and take from the township powers and duties that are necessary for their very existence. In recent years, several of our larger cities outside to be more concerned in managing rural areas than in providing good government for their own citizens. This amendment seeks to provide an indirect method of accomplishing what is precisely the opposite of this amendment contemplates.

The encroachment of centralized power over rural areas must be halted if we are to have government of the people, by the people, and for the people. We believe in co-operation between the city and surrounding townships. Any conceivable cooperation does not mean that the city should rule the countryside. Any conceivable cooperation in such problems as water supply and sewer lines can be easily arranged under existing laws, and without creating a super-government such as this amendment contemplates.

It is impossible in a brief discussion to set forth all the provisions whereby the metropolitan federation is to be created. Suffice it to say that the city council of the largest city or the board of county commissioners may initiate proceedings for the election of a citizens committee. This committee is then to draw up a proposed charter to govern the area within the federation. The charter thus framed may provide for the election by the metropolitan federation of any or all of the powers now vested in townships, municipalities, and counties.

In other words, such a charter may provide for the complete centralization of all governmental powers. Many years ago, Thomas Jefferson wrote: "A single government could be the most corrupt government of all."

It is impossible to predict the word provisions of any charter drawn up by the commission, for no one can force the so-called "reform" that the fifteen-member commission may propose. It is worth noting, however, that the amendment itself expressly authorizes the adoption of these three provisions:

1. Any metropolitan federation drawn up by the charter commission may provide for division of the area included into districts for the purpose of administration and taxation.
2. In the exercise of the powers and duties entrusted to it, the federation is to participate in the distribution of township and municipal revenues.
3. Finally, such a charter may provide that the metropolitan federation shall succeed to the rights, properties, and OBLIGATIONS of townships and municipalities.

Note the significance of the word "obligations," that word means "debts." Now, the townships of Ohio have practically no debts whatever. But Ohio's municipalities have a total indebtedness of more than nine hundred million dollars. Thus it would be possible by adoption of such a charter to spread the municipal obligations (debts) over the rural area included within the metropolitan federation.

The adoption of such a charter would mean government by the city and for the city, using the money of rural citizens living within the district to help pay off the city's debt.

Now let's see what happens when the charter commission has completed its task of framing a metropolitan federation charter.

Such a charter becomes effective if approved by a majority of those voting thereon: (1) in the entire area included by provisions of the charter; (2) in the most populous city in the included area; and (3) in the area outside the most populous city.

Note that the consent of the townships as separate and distinct units of government is not required for adoption of any metropolitan federation charter. Such a step was required under the city-county merger amendment, first adopted in 1923. This fourth step required the approval of the combined total of townships and municipalities, voting as separate governmental units.

But step number four was designed simply by the friends of centralization who wrote this metropolitan federation amendment.

Of all the civil rights any citizen possesses, the most fundamental is law is the right to vote.

The township as a unit of government has no vote on any metropolitan federation that is proposed.

Under the township as a unit of government, the metropolitan federation is to be a "shadowy" entity.

FFA boys cry 'Disengage power take-off'

"Disengage That Power Take-off!"

That's the theme this fall for members of Shiloh Chapter, Future Farmers of America, taking part in the 1958 FFA Safe Corn Harvest program.

A. E. Strickland, vocational agriculture instructor, says Ohio FFA chapters are uniting in this campaign to help prevent corn harvest accidents.

As their part in the campaign, FFA members will visit farms in the area and will make sure that the rules for proper and safe operation of corn harvest equipment. This includes tractors, corn pickers, forage choppers, pickers, shellers, silo blowers and elevators.

Each farmer who pledges himself to observe the rules for corn harvest safety will have a special "Safe Operator" sticker placed on his equipment. The farm family will also participate by displaying a table pledge card during mealtime to remind each family member to prevent accidents.

The campaign will also include films on preventing corn harvesting accidents, to remind farm people that farm equipment is designed for safe operation, but that the operator must follow safe operating rules. These films and demonstrations will be shown to farm groups at special meetings held in the area and in vocational agriculture classes.

For 24 minutes it was a dull and dismal contest. The Rough Riders, superbly coached but ridiculously out-manned, spent most of the time in Plymouth territory. Twice they rapped on the door of the goal, only to be denied, once on downs, again on a fumble.

But Coach Lew Pettit fired his charges up during the intermission and they moved smartly in the third period. The Warriors ganged five first downs in a sustained drive from their own 20 to the T-W 17 before Steve Patterson fumbled.

IT WAS HERE A BAD break led to the first Warrior score. Engard's punt carried only a yard from scrimmage. Plymouth took over on the Wakeman 21. Utiss racked the left side for 10. Baker got a pair, Wakeman was penalized five yards for offside and then Utiss banged in for the TD. He rushed the PAT.

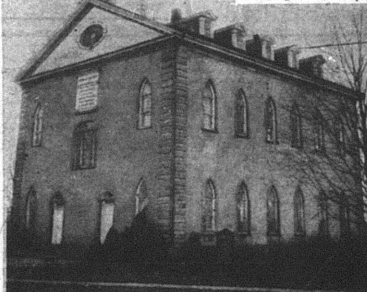
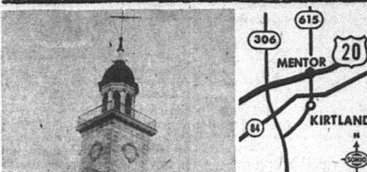

"Crossroad of History"



The first Mormon Temple was built at Kirtland, Ohio, by Joseph Smith and his followers in 1832-1835 and still stands today as a landmark on a hill above the East Branch of the Chagrin River on Route 308.

This temple, used today as a church, is of stone construction plastered over its exterior. The

structure is 60 by 80 feet in dimension and its spire rises 142 feet. It is said to have cost about \$40,000, a huge sum for that early date.

It was from Kirtland that the Mormons started their westward migration to Missouri, then to Nauvoo, Illinois, on the Mississippi River, and finally to Salt Lake City, Utah.

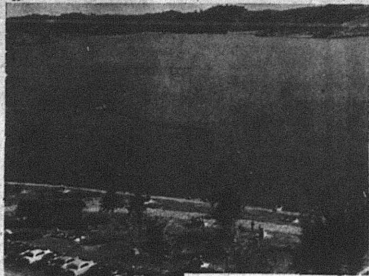

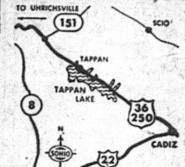

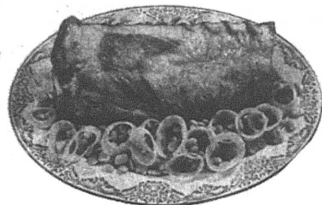
