For variety of agenda, Tuesday's village council meeting takes first prize.

Warriors favored to win first game against Milan here

"If we're ever going to win one, this should be it," says Coach Lew Pettit of prospects for his improving Plymouth Warrior eleven in tomorrow's North Central conference game with Milan.

The Indians haven't won a game, have been whipped by big schools, haven't even scored a point.

PHIL THE FILBERT. TAKING counsel of Dr. E. E. Liffenhaus, Toledo comparative score expert, and of other scouting reports, said Tuesday "I figure Plymouth should win by 14 points."

For 24 minutes here Friday night, the Warriors looked like a half club. Defensively, that is, for offensively they couldn't get off a dime, except sporadically.

If the offense can get going — and it is a question of improved offensive line play more than anything else — the Warriors should have a fairly easy time of it.

Milan is out-weighted and out-manned by the Warriors and rates a solid underdog.

VETERAN PRACTICE SESSION hangers-on pointed to this one as an opportunity for the Warriors to regain their confidence.

"It's discouraging," one of them said, "to lose one after another, and even more discouraging for high school boys to be told they lose because they make mistakes. Sure, it's true our team puts its pants on one leg at a time like the others, but they're young, green, and lack poise. They'll learn. The sophomore and freshman crop looks good and if we can win one or two you'll see better football in the future."

Some of the sophomore crop is excellent by a flesh, Dave Barbour, whose inexperience dictated at times. But he played a whole of a game at defensive end Friday and can expect more frequent call from here on in.

Game time is 8 p.m.

The council in turn dealt with: 1. A request of the Board of Public Affairs to make an exception for payment of a bill to a Fremont firm for repair of the village water tower.

2. Allegations that a service station owner has built up splash aprons in his place of business so that surface water is shunted to properties in the north side of East Main street.

3. Application to establish a taxicab service here.

4. Appeal of Shelby Air Force depot for cooperation in staging its annual charity drive.

5. Requests of Erie county mayors for information and support of an effort to upset the present laudable phase, mayors' courts out of existence in two years.

6. Request of Huron county civil defense director to establish a civil defense organization here.

7. Report of Alden E. Silson Associates that the proposed sewer system will cost \$597,000.

BOARD OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS. President Robert L. McIntire and the board's consultant, Roy Simpson, appealed to the council to make an exception to the state rule that contracts for more than \$1,000 must be advertised for bids.

Simpson took the floor and suavely explained that in May the board determined to repair the water tower. Two reputable Fremont firms made tenders to paint and clean the tower, and the lower offer of \$525 was accepted.

When the tower was drained and cleaned, workmen discovered the interior to be in serious condition needing immediate repair.

Welding of a specific nature was required, the firm said. Cost was estimated at \$993. Two members of the Board, McIntire and George W. Cheesman — were not in town when the crisis arose. The remaining member Luther R. Fetter, on his own authority, signed a contract with the firm to execute the repairs.

SIMPSON HERE INTERPOLATES that his experience dictated no other course. He said it would not be possible to know in advance what repairs would be necessary until the tank could be cleaned, and once cleaned and

empty, the repairs should be done at once, whether or not the contract exceeded \$1,000. He cited several villages of his experience where, he said, similar situations obtained. He claimed the state examiners would be lenient in such an instance.

Total amount due: \$628.55 less \$55 for a defective valve.

In the absence of Village Solicitor Joseph F. Dush, the matter was tabled.

Street Commissioner Henry Trauger reported some headway has been made toward alleviating water overflow in the rear of Miller's Hardware. He was authorized to proceed with next step. Part of the trouble, he said, is that Ray Dininger has raised macadam topping in his service station so that "water pitches right out into the middle of Spring street."

DEWEY E. RICE, NORTH FAIRFIELD, asked for permission to establish a taxi service here with these rates: 40 cents first passenger; any address in town; 15 cents extra passenger, same destination; outside corporation: within five mile radius, 30 cents a mile; within 20 mile radius, 40 cents a mile; over 20 mile radius, 50 cents a mile.

Because they've reaped a plenty in less than six months of a 'teen-age enterprise in American Legion hall, Teen-Time Rendezvous has plowed back \$100 of its earnings into a donation to Plymouth Community chest.

THE CHECK WAS HANDLED by its officers, Richard Prater, James Strine and Hilda Elliott, to John T. Dick, president of the chest, together with a letter which expresses the club's sentiments:

"Good fortune has been with us and we sincerely hope will remain, so that in the years to come

our organization can be of further benefit to you and other worthy groups as well as our young people."

In this issue, the Teen-Time Rendezvous publishes a full page tribute to the three couples whose interest and support made the organization possible — the Donald Shavers, the Lewis Pettits and the Miles Christians.

THE TRIBUTE WAS CONCEIVED, composed, ordered and paid for by the youngsters without adult prompting or assistance of any kind. The editor of The Advertiser was given their confidence and kept secret the real purpose of the photograph which illustrates the tribute.

Treasurer James C. Davis reported that as of 3 p.m. Tuesday a total of \$406 had been collected by the chest's second annual drive.

This represents 13.3 per cent of the goal of \$3,050, with 11 days left in the campaign.

The commercial and business solicitation committee was making its round of retail houses this week. No separate report by class of donor will be given, the officers of the chest said.

DIRECTOR FRED L. BUZAR reiterated his appeal of two weeks ago: "All we ask for is a cigarette a family a day, in cash equivalent. It isn't much to ask, we think and if we think, and if we can count on \$4 a household, we will reach our goal with a little bit to spare."

Donations may be sent to Treasurer: Davis at P. O. Box 554, Plymouth, left with him at Peoples National bank, or handed to any of the officers or solicitors for the chest.

"Each donor is entitled to a receipt, which is enclosed with the card sent in the mails," Davis said Tuesday. "If, however, some donor may wish to have a more formal receipt, he may obtain it from me."

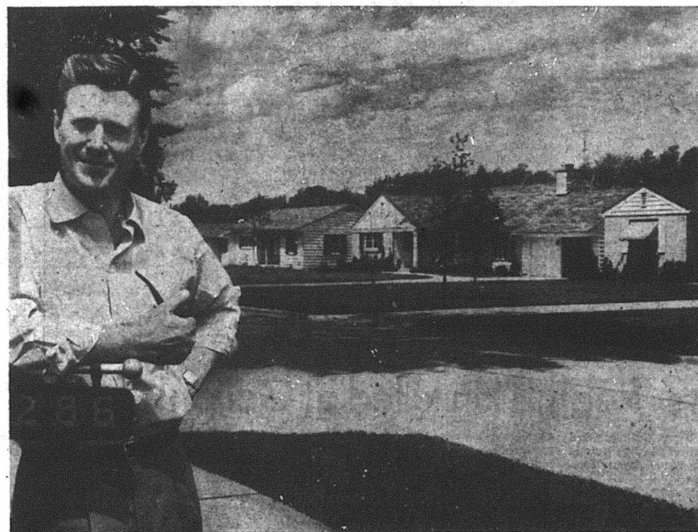

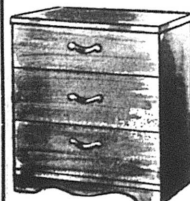

Warriors frighten Lodi, then fall, 38-0

Young Bob Packard came into his own in North Central conference quarterbacking Friday night with a stellar performance at the helm of Lodi's Tigers.

The visitors struck twice through the air in the second period and three times on the ground in the last half to whip Plymouth, 38 to 0.

IT WAS PACKARD'S SHOW, although he was manfully aided by Jimmy Nicholas, who scored a touchdown and two extra points himself.

Packard tossed two scoring passes, one to Bob Phillips, the other to Tom Underwood, ran for two more, and scampered around for two points after touchdown. His output before a slim crowd at Plymouth's Homecoming totaled 16 points.

For 24 minutes, Lodi had no easy time of it. Plymouth's defense was the equal of any the Tigers have faced all season. The vaunted power drives of Jimmy Nicholas were turned in and contained by the Warrior forward wall, and Packard and Tom Hefelfinger could do little outside.

The first quarter was scoreless. Both teams tumbled twice, losing possession.

NICHOLAS WAS PARTICULARLY adept in the red-dogging role. He thrice stole the hand-off from Billy Strine, part-time Warrior quarterback.

Early in the second canto, Lodi drove to the Plymouth 15. But the Warriors braced, threw back Nicholas' charge off right tackle and took over.

Unable to gain, Plymouth sent Dick Akers back to punt. This he did nobly, a high spiral that rolled dead on the Lodi 42.

Nicholas and Jimmy Allen alternated in the next two series of downs and with four minutes left in the half, Packard faded to his right and hit Phillips, who had sidestepped Dayton Reed in the Plymouth 10 to hit secondary. Phillips went in for the score. The play carried 19 yards.

JOHN HANES INTERCEPTED Strine's heave on the Plymouth 20 and Lodi had another score shortly thereafter. This time Packard drilled a high one to Tom Underwood on a cross-over pitch and the big end had no trouble scoring.

Nicholas bulled across for the PAT.

To this point, Plymouth had made a game of it. Drills throughout the week apparently had paid off in sounder, crisper defensive play. Lodi gained somewhat between the 30-yard lines, but couldn't do much inside them.

DUANE UTISS' FUMBLE recovered by Lodi early in the third period set up the third Lodi touchdown. The Tigers drove 55 yards in eight plays — and there was a 15-yard holding penalty socked against them in the middle — and Packard scooted in from

Later in the same quarter, Nicholas punched across from the four. Packard again converted. Here the Plymouth offense all but fell apart and with second and third stringers on the field for Lodi the Tigers mounted another, final offensive.

IT BEGAN WITH ANOTHER interception, the second in two plays. Allen had nailed Strine's pass and run it in to the Plymouth 22. But Lodi was offside and Plymouth took the penalty. On the next play, Packard drove in for the final score. Nicholas converted.

Farm leader urges: Give workers same freedom of choice as farmers



Charles B. Shuman, President, American Farm Bureau Federation, speaks out in favor of Right to Work in this article reprinted by permission of Nation's Agriculture.

Week after week more and more of the unsavory stretch of labor union corruption has been brought to public attention by Congressional investigation. Mass picketing, bombings, secondary boycotts, gangster control, murder, shakedown of employers, arson, theft of trust and pension funds - countless other examples to prove that "power tends to corrupt and absolute power corrupts absolutely."

Labor has the greatest political and economic power ever permitted any organized group in the history of our nation. Current legislative proposals that deal only with the results of the misuse of power will not correct this disgraceful situation. Only by restricting the power of the unions will we eliminate the gangsters, goons and grafters and permit the membership to regain control of their organizations.

There are two principal sources of the dangerous labor union power - exemption from prosecution as a monopoly under antitrust laws and compulsory union membership. No business or financial monopoly was ever more ruthless in fixing prices and restricting competition than is the modern-day labor monopoly - often in collaboration with big business and with government encouragement. Legislation to control this monopoly is badly needed but is unlikely as labor controls one political party and neutralizes the other with fear.

WHAT RIGHT TO WORK WILL DO:

- Give every man and woman in Ohio freedom to join or not to join a labor union.
- Give every man and woman in Ohio freedom to pay or not to pay money to a labor union.
- Prohibit compulsory "union shop" agreements between employers and labor officials under which an employee must pay union dues or be fired.
- Make unions voluntary organizations controlled by members free to act, investigate or resign, as are religious, farm, political or other organizations.
- Require union organizers to secure members on the basis of services performed rather than through compulsion.
- Help combat such abuses of power by some professional union officials as have become a matter of public knowledge.
- Return to Union members effective control of the way their dues and assessments are spent.
- Stop forced contributions used for furthering ambitious programs of political domination.
- Help build public and member confidence in the labor movement.

WHAT RIGHT TO WORK WILL NOT DO:

- Not interfere with the legal right of employees to organize and bargain collectively.
- Not affect wages, seniority, or pension.
- Not affect wages or bargaining for higher wages.
- Not permit any employer to fire anyone because of union membership or non-membership.
- Not interfere with union membership compulsion.

HERE IS THE AMENDMENT

"No employer or labor organization shall deny or abridge the right to work by requiring membership or non-membership in, or payment or non-payment of money to, a labor organization as a condition of employment or continued employment in this State. All agreements in conflict with this Section are, in the extent of such conflict, null and of no effect in this State. Section 1 of Article 1 of the Constitution."

Compulsory union membership is an important source of power because control of job opportunity is actually the power to control the worker's life. Fear is the tool of power-hungry organizers - fear of union expulsion and loss of job, fear of heavy fines assessed by union officers, fear of property damage, fear of physical violence to self or family. In opposing forced membership Samuel Gompers, the founder of modern unionism, once said, "No lasting gain has ever come from compulsion." Much of the present corruption in labor organizations is a result of a lack of member interest in union affairs. Members enrolled by compulsion methods cannot be expected to be loyal, interested or participating. Forced membership is facilitated by the check-off system of collecting union dues.

State right-to-work laws assure workers that they cannot be denied a job because they are either members or nonmembers of a labor-union. Farmers have taken the lead in bringing about the adoption of these laws in 17 states and are supporting similar action in other states. Farm Bureau members believe in voluntary organization; they recognize the need for labor unions; and they favor collective bargaining between labor and business.

We are not anti-labor! However, we are convinced that right-to-work laws are in the best interests of workers themselves as well as the general public. Compulsory membership in any organization - labor, farm, political or religious - is a denial of one of our fundamental human freedoms - it is a form of servitude.

Justice requires that a balance of power be restored. Right-to-work laws will help restore this balance by making union leaders responsible to their members rather than dictatorial masters over them.

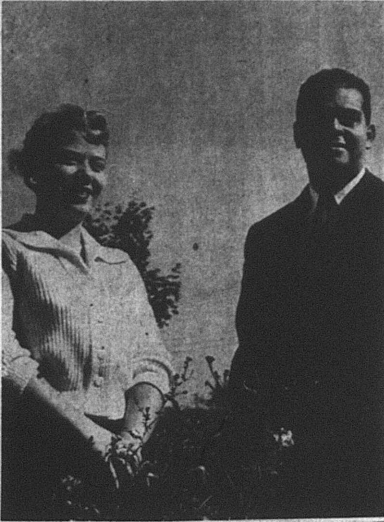
