School board licking wounds, may choose its course tonight

Defeat of the school transfer issue and rejection by Shiloh voters of the three mill operating levy are expected to be topics of discussion tonight when Plymouth Board of Education meets in regular session in the elementary school.

Failure of the Plymouth Citizens' committee to obtain at the polls the same kind of support it got in circulating the initiative petitions cost the transfer issue any chance of success.

What confounded most persons sympathetic to, but hardly confident of, transfer across the county line was the rejection, 222 to 220, of the three mill levy by voters in the old Shiloh district. Some informed Shilohans laid this to a lack of confidence in the board.

"What the board did to the Shiloh teaching staff and to the bus driver didn't go down well with people over this way and they weren't about to vote for a three mill levy because they don't trust the board," one of them said.

Rumors flew thick and fast about Plymouth in the latter days of the week that resolutions may be introduced at once calling for:

1. Change of the name of the school district, from Plymouth

Local School district to Richland Local School district.

2. A special election in the spring, on which bonds to pay for a new high school building would be voted.

It is fair to say that disappointment was strong in Plymouth on election night and the next day.

Supporters of the transfer idea grasped at half a dozen explanations of why Precinct B failed to vote for the issue in greater number.

THEIR CONCLUSIONS. whether, or not valid, were these: 1. Many signed the initiative petition because they wanted to place the issue on the ballot, despite the fact to do so only for that purpose is a breach of honor if not of law.

2. Decisions of Attorney General William Saxbe, who was defeated, and of Richland County Prosecutor Theodore Lutz, also defeated in his bid for higher office but remaining in his present post, confused and misled voters, even though Saxbe admitted the opinion which suggested annexation with Willard was possible was erroneously taken.

3. County ties remain strong despite the fact hundreds of Plymouth residents live in one county.

work in another, and cross the county line a dozen times a day without pausing to obtain visas, passports, or permits.

4. Vocal promises among residents of the old Shiloh district were more easily obtained than their favorable ballots at the polling places.

5. Shilohans feared approval of the transfer would further obliterate the identity of their community, already obscured during the past five years by cessation of passenger train service, re-routing of direct mail service, acquisition of the local bank by an out-of-town firm, departure of the village's only industry and annexation of the schools to Plymouth.

There was no evidence any of the school board members intends to obstruct development of the school district as is along line planned by the board, its executive head and the county superintendent.

Tonight's meeting may indicate how, when and under what circumstances they propose to implement the plan.

A young Marine Corps private was seriously injured Friday afternoon when, state highway patrolmen said, he drove through a stop sign in Upsilon road and into the path of a car headed north in Plymouth Springfield road.

He was Clayton Brooks, 19, son of the Arthur J. Brooks, Plymouth route 1, who is spending a 20-day furlough with his parents after service on Okinawa.

At 4:15 p.m. Friday he was headed west in his brother's car. Failing to halt at the stop sign, he collided with a sedan driven by Johnnie Taylor, 28, Plymouth route 1.

THE BROOKS MACHINE was all but demolished. Rushed to Shelby Memorial hospital in McQuate's ambulance, young Brooks was said to have a severe head injury and 90 minutes later was in the emergency room of Grant

hospital, Columbus.

Hospital authorities said Sunday he has a fractured skull but is expected to recover.

Harold Taylor, 26, an Army sergeant, riding with his brother, was treated at the hospital for a laceration of the forehead and a contusion of his knee.

Brenda Taylor, nine, daughter of the driver, was treated for a contusion of the forehead and remained in the hospital overnight. Another daughter, Kathy, six, was treated and released.

Dance programs recall grandma's day

Down the valley of a thousand yesterdays you'll find these memorabilia of social life when grandmother was a girl — and then some.

Mrs. Emma Snyder of New Haven loaned these items to The Advertiser, for a special reason. Each of them was produced in The Advertiser's job printing department, when job printing was an active part of the newspaper's business.

OLDEST ITEM IS AN INVITATION to a cotillion party at the Steuben house, Greenfield, for Jan. 1, 1866. That it must have been quite a party is borne out by the fare: \$2.50, equivalent in the devalued dollar of today to \$14.25.

The printing, obviously done during the latter part of 1865, remains legible, clean and sharp.

The ball card was issued for dancers in Plymouth hall Oct. 9 and 10, 1878, when a New London orchestra played for schottisches, reels and polkas. Ticket: \$1, equivalent now to \$5.70.

THE PROGRAM OF THE New Haven Sunday School Union proves, Mrs. Snyder points out, two facts long questioned by old hands in New Haven township.

One is that a Baptist church once existed in that village. She searched the records, determined that it stood where Cecil Smith's house now is.

Other fact: New Haven was a strong temperance town in the late 70's, despite the fact strong drink was a medium of exchange, as well as one of social intercourse, two decades before, when the railroads were coming west.
