

Water plan cost \$205,000

Lay that surplus down, babe, lay that surplus down. Goaded by the village council into an explanation of the purpose of a \$200,000 surplus in the water fund, the Board of Public Affairs sprung a \$205,000 answer Nov. 25.

Some months ago, the board hired Floyd G. Browne & Associates, Marion, as consultants in a village water study.

Preliminary reports of the consultants unveiled Nov. 25 calls for:

1. Flow and leakage survey, estimated to cost \$1,500.
2. Cleaning of all mains laid since 1932 (when water treatment here began), estimated to cost \$17,500.
3. Installation of additional valves, estimated to cost \$3,000.
4. Installation of controls on the water tank, estimated to cost \$1,000.

5. Installation of additional fire hydrants, estimated to cost \$2,000.
6. Installation of a new 250,000 gallon standpipe in Riggs avenue above Greenlawn cemetery, estimated to cost \$23,000.
7. Extensions of water lines as follows:
 - a. West Broadway, six-inch-line, \$14,000.
 - b. Riggs avenue, from Pine to Bucyrus, \$15,000.
 - c. Trux street, \$7,000.
 - d. Over B & O railway bridge in West Broadway, \$1,000.
 - e. Loop from West Broadway to Curtiss court and thence to Walnut street, \$20,000.

Second phase of the engineers' program would call for extensions of water lines in four locations:

1. Willow drive, installation of loop
2. New line along AC&Y railway from Plymouth street to Trux street, \$23,000.
3. Hoffman street from Park avenue to Sandusky street, eight-inch-line, \$8,500.
4. West Broadway, six-inch-line parallel to four-inch-line, \$15,700.

Conditions described in the preliminary report indicate a long-standing neglect of the principal water conduits.

The original system, installed in 1902, is 65 per cent extant. These lines are carrying now only 30 to 70 per cent effective flow, owing to encrustation.

In West Broadway, pumping of water through the hydrant developed only 81 gallons of water a minute. Cleaning of

the line would produce 87 gallons a minute.

HOW TO FINANCE THE improvements? Browne associates recommend general obligation bonds or mortgage revenue bonds be sold to pay for the work.

If general obligation bonds are sold (by popular vote of the electors of the village), water rates need not be increased.

If mortgage revenue bonds are sold, water rates would have to be boosted by 30 per cent.

Indebtedness against the system now amounts to \$21,000, \$6,000 in first mortgage slated to be paid off in 1962, \$15,000 in second mortgage to be paid off in 1972.

Both could be paid from present surplus not earlier than August, 1959.

Wanted: a way out with honor

Unless the Board of Public Affairs shows a more penitent attitude toward what the village council regards as a serious breach of law, prospects of a reconciliation between the two seem dim.

That, at least, was the outcome of Tuesday's village council meeting in which:

1. Village Solicitor Joseph F. Dush told the council he can find no way to regularize what is obviously a breach of law in the case of the repair of the water tower.

(Briefly, here's what happened: a Fremont firm was asked to submit an estimate for cleaning and painting the water tower. This estimate, being under \$900, was accepted. A contract was executed. When the tower was opened, additional work was found necessary. One member of the Board of Public Affairs authorized this work, despite Ohio law which requires all contracts in excess of \$1,000 to be advertised for bids. The work was done and \$993 was paid to the firm for the second, not the first, phase of the work. Now the firm wants its money and the council demurs.)

2. Nevertheless the council agreed an effort will be made to arrange payment by showing no willful fraud was intended or perpetrated.

3. The council showed it intends to "make haste slowly", to impress upon the Board that it will have no part of such action, to employ no punitive measures, but to show firmness in dealing with the Board so that the council's wishes on water extensions can be considered.

4. The park board overrode the council's recommendation on fees for tables in Mary Fite park. Council's idea: 75 cents for residents, \$1.25 for non-residents. Park board: \$1 for residents, \$1.25 for non-residents. The ordinance was passed without dissent.

Shiloh sells bonds for sewer project, pays through nose

Shiloh's sewer project is back in business again, bloodied but unbowed.

Mortgage revenue bonds to finance the third share of the project have been sold to First National bank of Mansfield. Rate of interest on the \$155,000 purchase is 4.75 per cent, said by a Cincinnati bonding house to "be about the highest rate of interest for mortgage revenue bonds we've heard of this year."

But Shiloh had to make certain upward adjustments, as predicted last week, in order to sell the bonds:

1. The tap-in charge was set at \$50 a household.
2. Sewer rental fee was boosted \$4 a year, from \$36 to \$40. Fee for the public schools was left at \$4 per head per year.

As soon as the proceeds of the sale are received, the village will pay off the two contractors, Mayor Robert Moser said.

Bitter winds blight but fail to obscure patriotic demonstration at new armory

Military brass from four counties and about 150 local residents braved near-zero weather Saturday afternoon to witness the dedication of Rhine Army Reserve center.

They heard Maj. Gen. Ralph W. Zwicker, commander of XX U.S. Army Corps (reserve), Ft. Hayes, Columbus, say the center is part of a far-reaching Army program to abet the na-

tion's defense against Communism.

AND IN WELL-MEASURED tones against a biting wast- ily wind, they heard Maynard J. Coon, executive head

of Plymouth public schools, praise the gallant soldier for whom the center was named.

He was Charles W. Rhine, a first lieutenant in an infantry unit who died in December of 1944 during the Battle of the Bulge. Born here in 1917, young Rhine was graduated from Plymouth High school in 1935. Drafted, he was advanced through private first class, corporal and second lieutenant before attaining his ultimate rank.

Mr. Coon read from records of his military unit the citation by which Lieutenant Rhine was awarded the Bronze Star.

OWING TO ILLNESS, REP. A. D. Baumhart, Jr., 13th Ohio district Congressman, was unable to be present.

A color guard from Ehret-Parsel Post, American Legion, advanced the standard. Invocation was by the Rev. Robert F. Hall, pastor of First Evangelical Lutheran church.

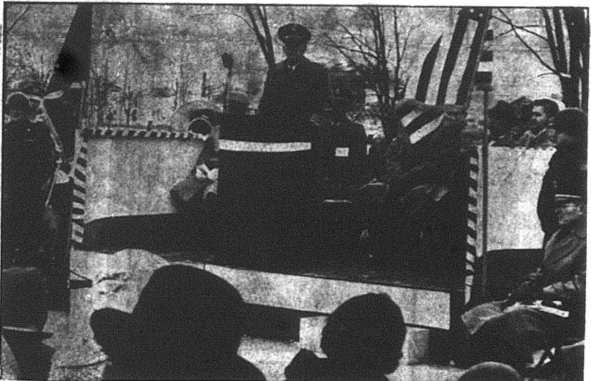
William E. Root, general manager of Fate-Root-Heath Co., was master of ceremonies.

The Rev. Moss Rutan, pastor of First Presbyterian church, delivered the benediction.

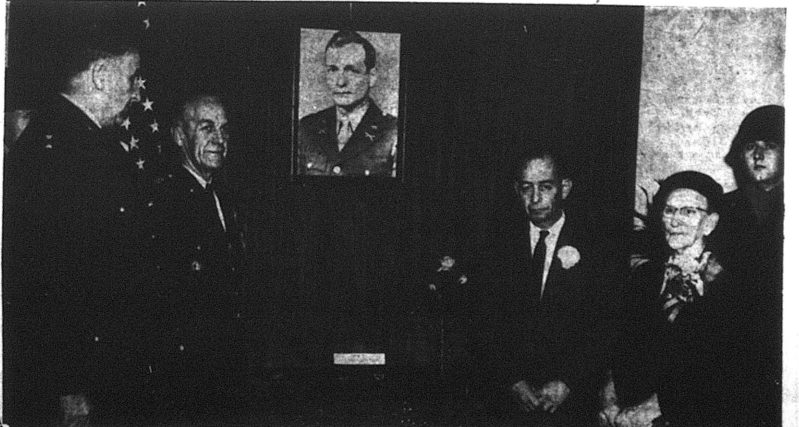
Major General Zwicker and his party were guests of the Chamber of Commerce at a luncheon in Cornell's restaurant at noon.

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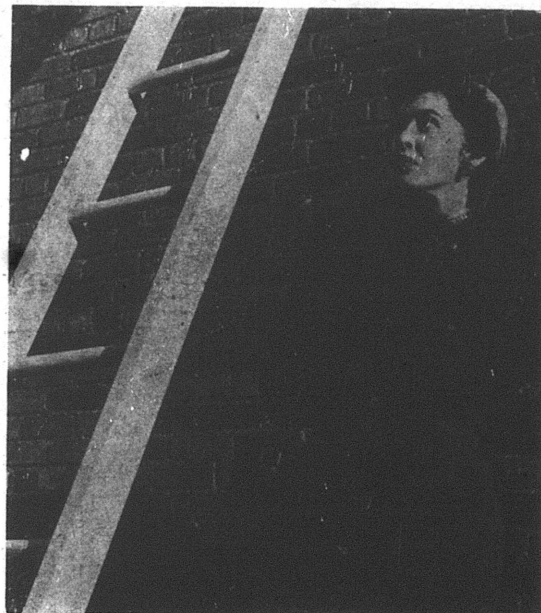
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SUPERSTITION IS A POOR SUBSTITUTE

For her going-away costume, the new Mrs. Baker change to a royal blue sheath. The young couple spent a short honeymoon in Cleveland.

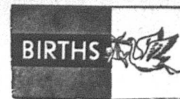

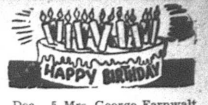

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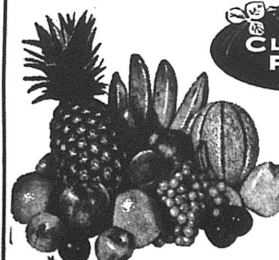

It must be open season on editors.

Oliver Bigelow, in the Johnstown Independent, reports rumblings among the faithful.

"We receive a complaint every now and then that a story is missed here and there. A lot of this comes from the fact that few understand how much work it is, how expensive it is and how much of a press it continually is to keep a newspaper inexpensive to the public despite spiraling costs," he writes.

"Small newspapers do not and cannot send reporters to various meetings. There is no such thing as an editorial staff. Most editorial type work is generally done in the wee hours of the morning. The independent brings to the public more news, more pictures and more paper than any comparable newspaper in a comparable town in Ohio and yet a few will still complain.

"By rights, subscription rates (same as The Advertiser's) should be raised but we try to keep them as low as possible. We enjoy serving the public but feel that a lot of people would have a real revelation if they spent a week or two following those around who put out the home town paper each week."

AND ACROSS THE STATE, J. S. MILES, writing in the Libert Press, at Liberty Center, in Fulton county, says:

"About the time a country editor begins to think he knows considerable about the business he has made a specialty of for 10 or 15 years, along comes some man who has demonstrated he don't (sic) know any more about anything than Thompson's colt, however little that is, and tells him how he ought to conduct the many and diverse departments of his business in order to make a success of it and please the entire community.

"When a country editor thinks of the many who will walk right past the office door and drop a card in the post office telling him to stop his paper, or tells the postmaster to mark it 'Refused', he is forced to wonder if

this country could ever find enough brave men to fight and win another Civil war."

THE ONLY WAY TO KEEP YOUR SANITY in this business, a tried-and-true editor told us not so long ago, is to remember that your problems are the same as another guy's problems, only his are usually worse.

And we have discovered, after parley with a hundred or so editors across this state, that is a true statement.

The tempo changes from town to town, but the melody is the same.

One editor of our acquaintance, believing the time had come to put a halt to all this, printed up a little card, in Bible-size type:

"Your observations and comments are received with displeasure and rejected on their face. When the time comes that you shoulder the economic burdens of meeting the payroll, paying for the news print, ink, and other materials that are trucked in here for the enterprise, then you may have some say in what goes in the paper and how it will be worded. But until then, kindly keep your observations and comments to yourself."

A LITTLE HARSH, AND ONLY A MAN man expresses the sentiments of editors the whose mortgage was paid could do it, but the world over.

Is it any wonder the newspaper profession has difficulty in attracting young people?

"Pull it yourself," he said,

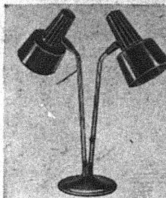

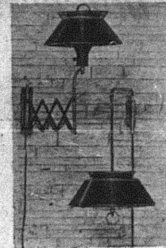

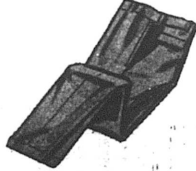
