



Gunther Duille hurt when struck by car in freak collision

A German immigrant who lives with Mahlon Nimmons was injured Mar. 19 and three others received facial lacerations in a bizarre crash in Route 61 half a mile north of the corporation line.

Gunther Duille, 36, has head and facial lacerations received when he backed his car into the northbound lane of the highway and was struck by another driven by James Humphrey, 24, 91 Broadway, Shelby.

DUILLE HAD DRIVEN INTO a driveway east of the highway because his car ran out of fuel. A friend, Paul Luppino, 34 403 Woodbine, Willard, had brought him a new supply and when he was able to get his car started, he backed without warning into the main stream of traffic.

Passengers in Humphrey's car, Stewart Smith, 22, Shelby route 2, and Glenn Lybarger, 22, Shelby route 2, also received head and face lacerations.

Humphrey hit Duille's car with such force it was knocked 48 feet. BOTH CARS WERE DEMOLISHED. Impact of the collision threw the spare tire from Duille's car into the windshield and left door of Luppino's machine.

The injured were taken to Willard Municipal hospital in McQuate's ambulance.

Churches defeat effort to move cafe

Objections by the pastors of three Protestant churches, within 500 feet of the proposed site, have resulted in disapproval of a petition by Weber's Cafe to move its C-2 permit and D-1, 2 and 3 permits to 4 East Main street.

John Kleer and Mary McKown administratrix of the estate of Wade McKown, applied to the Ohio Board of Liquor Control for approval to transfer their alcoholic beverage sale and consumption licenses to their building at East Main and Plymouth streets.

The pastors objected, some on the grounds that "it would be a bad advertisement" for Plymouth to have a saloon on its principal corner, others that "it would leave the place they are vacating open for another saloon."

The board said the applicants are not owners or operators of a restaurant at 4 East Main street, as required by law, and an inspection revealed that no business of any type is in operation at the address.

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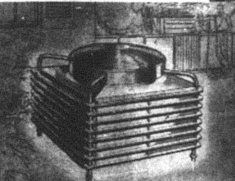

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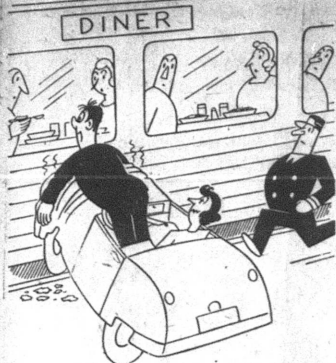
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the woman's side of it

Another month and another winter are slowly finishing. Everyone is, no doubt, looking forward to Spring. We are not. We are being curious about predictions told to us the other morning by a lady whose friend is a confirmed moon watcher and almanac reader.

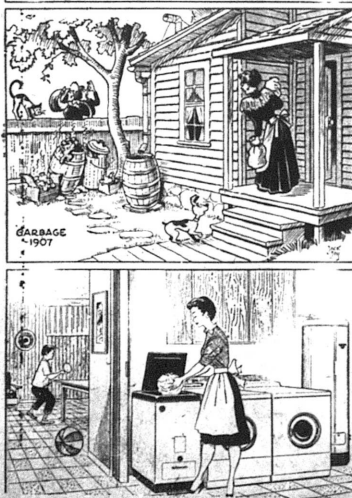
He (and only a man could think this up at this time of the year) says that there will be five more snows before Spring actually is here: to stay. He counts a snow as enough to cover the ground so you can track a rabbit. Snow or no snow, tulips, hyacinths, narcissus and daffodils are beginning to poke up through the ground. Only the other day while driving we saw a willow tree whose drooping boughs were beginning to turn yellow. That is a springy sign.

NOW THAT WE KNOW HE can cook, we can indulge in some spring fever and let Father slave over the stove. It really amazed me that he could brew up such a tasty meal as he did last week. I was late for dinner and he was hungry. That's what really brought the whole operation into action.

His prize recipe starts out with four (because there are only four of us) nice slices of liver which are sautéed quickly in about four tablespoons of margarine. To this he added a cup of chopped onion, small clove of garlic, an aberrage can of tomatoes, what celery and parsley we had in the refrigerator. I also chopped — one green pepper sliced thinly and a good dash of cayenne pepper. This he simmered like the dickens (he used another word) for about 45 minutes. Then he poured off the liquid and parched four tablespoons of flour in it. This he added to the whole mixture and heated it strongly for 15 minutes.

Another pan he boiled a cup of water to which he added a teaspoon of salt and another of vinegar. Then he put in the same amount of rice.

THE CHANGING SCENE

Some one of these days, the world is going to rediscover, as our friend Jay Eff Dec has, the remarkable stories of the American explorers of the 19th century.

We've just passed a weekend reading one of them, the account by 1st. Lieut. A. W. Greeley, Cavalry Corps, assigned to the Chief Signal Officer of the Army, of the Lady Franklin Bay expedition into northern Greenland in the 1880's.

Greeley was an exceptional officer. For one thing, he could write lucid prose. He was indefatigable, courageous, knowledgeable and absolutely dedicated to his job.

IN NONE OF OUR READING HAVE WE encountered such a dramatic story as that of the expedition, which was marooned without likelihood of rescue, reduced to short rations, ridden with scurvy and other diseases of malnutrition, and may have engaged in cannibalism.

The doctor, one Octave Cary, refused to perform duties other than those directly akin to medical treatment of the command. Lieutenant Greeley was compelled to make note of this refusal in his journal. Dr. Cary later performed heroically in administering to sick and starving men, but he was doing so while he was stealing the very food from their mouths.

THAT HE DIED UNDOUBTEDLY SAVED him from the fate met by Private Charles Henry, another food thief, who on the strength of a five-line order prepared by Lieutenant Greeley was shot by three non-commissioned officers. Yet it was done as a gen'leman would have done: "with two-ball and one blank, drawn blind."

There were other expeditions during the 19th century, among them those of John C. Fremont, and of William Lewis and George Roger Clark.

What a pity it is that we do not repopularize these remarkable stories, true in each detail, and recount them to our children. It is of such stuff as America, the real America, the kind of America that strikes fear in our enemies and engenders respect in our friends, is made.

To the city or suburban dog, the farm dog's life must seem like a merry one. He's free to run in the woods and fields, chase rabbits or chucks to his heart's content and bury his bones where he wishes.

True, it may be a happy life. But as far as his health, housing and dietary needs are concerned, they're not always up to suburban or city dog standards.

Since he doesn't live in as close proximity to his owner as the town pooch, he may be sick without anyone realizing that he's not up to par. Many farm dogs are not immunized against distemper or hepatitis and may die from either disease or be left with a permanent disability. In this day and age where veterinarians can nearly always be reached, every dog should be vaccinated against these dread diseases.

The farm dog's diet may also leave much to be desired. He may dine for the most part on table scraps which are apt to include chop bones, steak bones, even chicken bones which splinter easily and can lodge in the throat or intestines. Since cheap fare doesn't provide the dog with all the food and nutrients he requires, he will supplement his diet by eating livestock and poultry feeds.

Some good standard poultry feeds contain ingredients that have proved to be toxic to dogs. Feeding dogs prepared dog foods, either dry or canned variety, is not, as many think, an extravagance. It's actually cheaper than scraps. A forty-five pound dog, for example, can be fed for as little as fifteen cents a day with prepared dog food.

Feeding Tip: The practical routine on puppy feeding is that you give him as much as he'll eat three times a day. It's well, for the sake of his early growth, to give him a top-grade, commercially-prepared dog food such as Friskies.

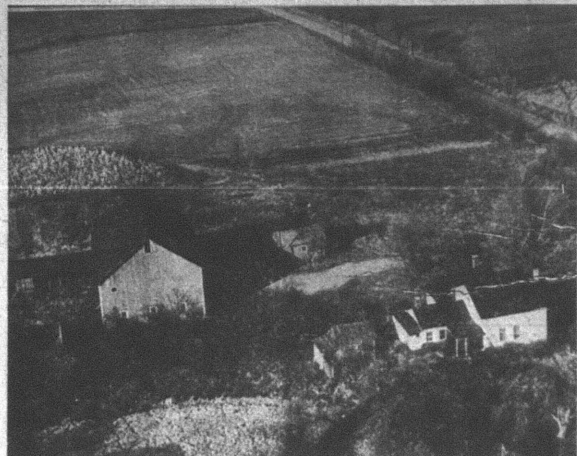

DOG EAR TROUBLES

By E. M. Gildow, D.V.M.
Director, Franklin Research, Kansas
If your dog shakes his head a lot, rubs it with his paw, or scratches behind his ears, don't just pass it off as a possible flea. Dogs—particularly the long-eared varieties whose ears don't get much ventilation—are subject to ear trouble. You can get a pretty good view within the ear by using a flashlight. You may spot a grass awn or other foreign object in the ear canal. You may be able to remove it yourself with a pair of small tweezers. Be very careful, though, for dogs hate to have their ears tampered with and are apt to jerk away. Clean out the ear with a cotton swab but don't go any further than you can see.
The three most common causes of ear irritation in the dog are foreign bodies, ear



mites, and the accumulation of hardened ear wax. If the trouble appears acute or is long-standing, check with your veterinarian. He'll clean out the ear and prescribe medication. A word of warning! Never use in the ears an insecticide such as is commonly used for fleas, lice and ticks. An insecticide may be too strong and cause inflammation.

Remember that the sooner you spot ear trouble, the faster it can be cleared up. Keeping your pet's ears clean, of course, will help ward off trouble. Don't ever use water, however. Either, which dries immediately, is generally best for the job. If you have a new puppy, ask your veterinarian to show you the proper ear-cleaning technique.

Feeding Tip: Don't be concerned if your pet gags down his food without a thought to chewing. Dogs' stomachs are made to withstand such treatment.
