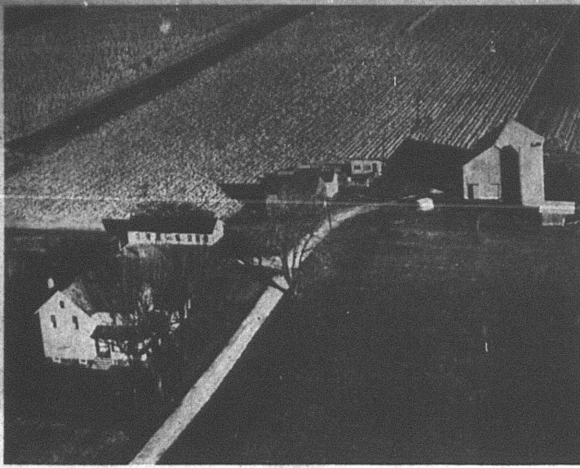

Egg hunt planned for Easter Sunday

Objections to the staging of the annual Easter egg hunt on Easter Sunday were put aside by the board of directors of Plymouth Chamber of Commerce Thursday night and the event will be staged in Mary Faye park as planned.

A written objection by the Interchurch council to the date and time of the event was considered by the board. The objectors said the staging of such an event on Easter Sunday detracts from the sacred observance of the Resurrection of Jesus.

The board noted that no afternoon services are staged in any local church with which the hunt might conflict.

Bryan firm gets armory contract

Weaver Construction Co., Bryan, has been awarded the contract to erect the new Army Engineer reserve center in Sandusky street and will break ground early next week. The Corps of Engineers at Huntington, W. Va., reported on Tuesday.

The firm's bid of \$107,627 was about 10 cents over.

Contract completion date is May 5, 1959.

The building will be the first of three to be constructed on the site.

Council takes steps to qualify for grant

Steps to obtain a \$100,000 federal grant-in-aid, without any strings attached, were taken by the village council Tuesday night.

The council voted to instruct its clerk, Carl V. Ellis, to set in motion plans to apply for \$100,000 in federal funds under Public Law 660, which allows the federal government to contribute up to 30 per cent of the cost of sewage treatment plants.

WHAT ELLIS MUST NOW do is ask Alden E. Stilson & Associates, Ltd., Columbus, consulting engineers on the project, for an estimate of charges to bring the plans up to date.

Assuming the council will find this estimate within reason, next step is to revise the engineer's estimate.

Final step is to prepare a financing plan for the remaining 70 per cent of the cost of the project, or roughly \$350,000.

To do so will require the advice of the village's bonding attorneys, Squire, Sanders & Dempsey, Cleveland.

THE APPLICATION MUST be filed before July 1. It must show conclusively how the village proposes to finance its share of the cost.

In all likelihood, the plan will

entail general obligation bonds (\$125,000 is the maximum which can be voted), special assessment bonds (which would be retired by assessing property owners so much a front foot) and mortgage revenue bonds (which would be paid off from collections for sewer service).

What the cost will be when the plan is worked out depends on the council said Tuesday, on three factors:

1. Exact figure for engineer's estimates for the project.
2. Manner of financing. (Mortgage revenue bonds, for example, generally carry higher rates of interest than general obligation bonds.)
3. Market conditions among contractors when the job is let.

WHATEVER THE PLANS, however, about \$40 a family a year for 20 years is the figure about which discussions are centering.

This assumes that the federal grant-in-aid will be forthcoming without difficulty.

For the first time in many years, the council was forced Tuesday night to ask Richland county tax authorities for an advance on real estate taxes.

Funeral services were conducted from a Bellaire funeral home at 2:30 p. m. Sunday. Burial followed there.

MRS. THOMAS WENT to her sister early Thursday. Mr. and Mrs. P. S. Thomas of Shelby and Mr. and Mrs. Daniel M. Henry of this place joined her, together with Richard Barks of Cleveland, another nephew, at the funeral service.

Dr. Tschappatt was the third brother-in-law of Mrs. Thomas to die in a year. Mr. Thomas died a year ago this week.

School issue sent to November vote by county board

Whether Huron Valley school district should be annexed to Willard will be decided on Nov. 4.

After one false start, dissidents in the Huron Valley district managed to present a counter petition to that which requested immediate transfer of the district to Willard. And on Saturday night the Huron county board of education ruled it was valid and binding.

The board noted the petition carried the valid signatures of 187 persons whose names were among the original 439.

With this reduction, to 243, the total segment of petitioners represented only 55.8 per cent of the electorate, enough to command a decision by ballot, insufficient to command immediate transfer.

Shilohan to get appointment as successor to J. H. Cashman

A Shilohan will be appointed to the vacancy on Plymouth school board created by the resignation Feb. 25 of J. Harold Cashman, a nine-year veteran on the board.

Cashman, entering a new four-year term, was president of the board.

He said ill health is the reason for his resignation.

THE REMAINING MEMBERS of the board informally committed themselves to appointment of a Shilohan to the vacancy.

Evan P. LaFollette, an accountant employed by Fisher Body division of General Motors, Inc., at Mansfield, was appointed clerk of the board for a year, at \$1,800 salary.

Other applicants were George

D. Ellis and Mrs. Harm Kruger.

LAFOLLETTE TOLD THE board by letter he is trained in accounting. Also, he said, "I have the tools for the job — a safe, file cabinet, typewriter and an adding machine."

Richland County Supt. Dale Kinney attended the special meeting and told the board Bowling Green State university has agreed to make a survey of the Plymouth district to recommend school needs. The survey, to be paid for by the county board, may be made in April. Its purpose, Kinney said, is to reinforce a request by the local district for state building funds.

There is no dispute, the board said, between Plymouth and

South-Central school districts on the question of the amount due the latter for Shiloh's share of administration of the outwashed Iroquois district.

The amount of \$46,000 claimed by the South-Central district has been reduced by payments made from Shiloh funds for invoices incurred directly by Shiloh schools.

THE TOTAL IN QUESTION now is slightly under \$41,000, which the board recognizes is a moral — if not legal — obligation due South-Central and which it has set aside, to be paid.

If Richland County Prosecutor Theodore Lutz were not so adamant in his attitude of the legality of payment, it would have been paid "long ago", the board said.

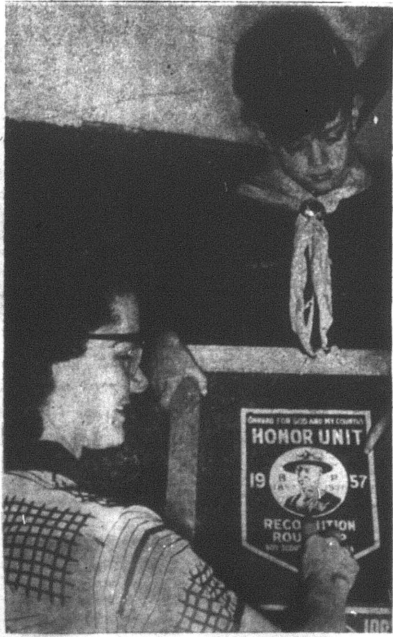

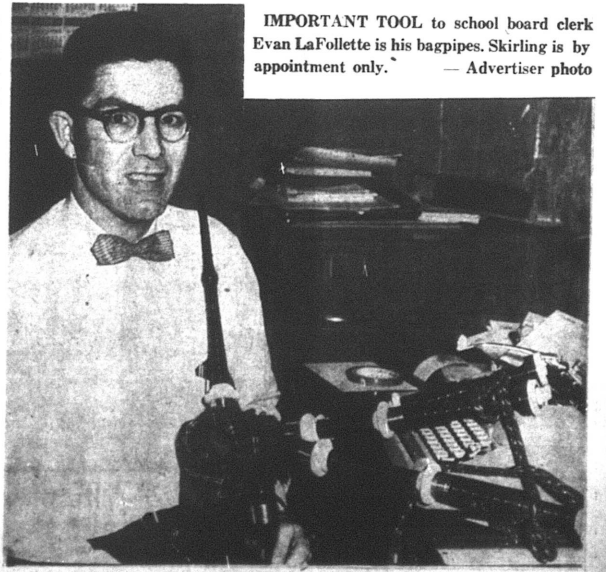

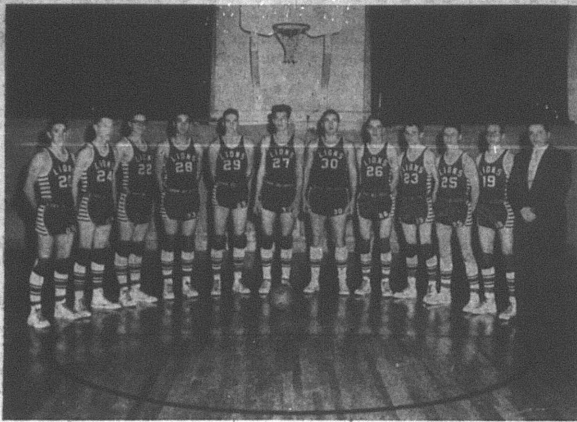

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Now is the time for action

The lines are drawn — or ought to be — for a sensible decision, based upon the issues, in regard to the future of school children of what are now Plymouth and Huron Valley school districts.

The Huron county board, in accordance with its duty set down by law, voted last week to place the issue of whether Huron Valley district shall be annexed to Willard on the general election ballot.

This is, we think, as it should be, despite strong arguments that time is of the essence.

The Plymouth board has committed itself to appointment of a Shilohan to fill the present vacancy.

Shiloh should be represented. We do not doubt that the new member will be chosen because he is a level-headed, dedicated public servant whose interest is primarily for the good of boys and girls, with less concern for other considerations. And who agrees, more or less, with the present board.

We hold it is the duty of the Plymouth board to organize some form of open manifestation of its expressed desire to reorganize the Huron Valley district.

The Huron Valley voters are en-

titled to a reasonable argument in favor of reestablishment of the Huron Valley district as opposed to annexation to Willard.

Without it, they cannot vote other than to approve the annexation.

And the Plymouth district patron is entitled to some leadership. Leadership of a vigorous character, too.

He is entitled to the facts, among which are that chances of obtaining state funds are so remote as hardly worth thinking about.

Thus, to house the children properly, let alone reach the Russians, we ly, to catch up here to a good stand-need to consolidate with Huron Valley.

And Huron Valley needs us more than it needs Willard, we think, but it is a question of sentiment as much as of issue.

But unless the present school board gets off its dead duff and shows some leadership — and it must lead more or less immediately to the filing of initiative petitions calling for transfer to Huron county and subsequent consolidation with Huron Valley — the situation will go a-glimmering.

Now is the time for every good man to come to the aid of our children.

Shorts and middlings

A new type of dent corn having a high content of amylose, a valuable starch ingredient, shows promise for many important industrial uses.

For best results, thaw a frozen turkey in the refrigerator in its original wrapper to maintain moist meat. Allow one to two days for thawing, depending on the size of the bird.

A dustcloth or mitt treated with a solution made up of 1 tablespoon kerosene or turpentine and 1 pint hot water will pick up and hold dust.

Skilled workers are most likely to be in debt because of credit. Next are the semi-skilled, unskilled, service workers, professional and managerial workers. Least likely to have consumer debts are farm operators and families.

Ohio is allotted \$3.5 million dollars for its 1957-58 school lunch program out of a total appropriation of 100 million dollars. Allotments are made on the basis of the number of children and the need for assistance.

The retail cost of the foods in our market basket, except for poultry, eggs, fruits and vegetables, rose continually since June of 1956.

If present plans of swine producers are carried out, hog prices until mid-1958 should average little if any lower than comparable periods a year earlier, according to Ohio State university extension economists.

Alfalfa leafhoppers commonly cause the second and third cuttings of alfalfa to become yellow and stunted. There is no way to correct this situation after it has taken place, say Ohio State university extension entomologists.

To speed up the melting and blending of cheese, get it into small pieces before you heat it. You might break it, grate it, slice it or shave it thin.

Last week the Cubs had their annual banquet. It was a very nice affair. The Cub worked like beavers. Never have I seen so many little boys so useful at one time. I know very well that at home it is like pulling teeth to get most of them to do anything. But get them in a group and they will knock themselves out working.

There is something about doing things with others. You work better and harder. That is the whole philosophy behind group work of the Scout organizations. Those Cubs were scrubbed and cleaned to the point of shininess Thursday night. But the highlight of the evening was the potatoes. Anyone who wants a good recipe for scalloped potatoes will have to call Mrs. Robert Tackett. My, they were beautiful ones. They were fragrant, done to the right point, and the most edible things I've ever seen.

THIS WEEK THE BROWNIES and the Girl Scouts are celebrating. They will have their annual tea and strut their stuff before proud parents Sunday afternoon.

The unsung heroines, though, behind the boys and the girls are the volunteer leaders. The mothers who give up hours of their own time to take them hiking in the woods, learn to make camp, and memorize songs to teach. Why they do it, no one knows. But they do it.

There is great satisfaction in the work, although no one ever says thank you. As each weekly meeting rolls around, and the den mother or Scout leader looks around at her charges and sees that they are all there, she knows inside that it is worth it. It is a matter of life and death that they get to those meetings. That is the satisfaction. The children love them. Yet they are still too young to express their feelings in words.

They merely come, and they do not want to go home when the meeting is finished.

ALWAYS THERE ARE JOES about Scouts. They are the dogooders in the community. Usually they are asked to take on projects. At times they take on their own. There is a wonderful story which has swept the nation. It concerns two very young Girl Scouts who were seen by their leader to help an old lady across the street. The leader later asked why it had taken them so long. One looked at the other and replied, "Because she didn't want to go."

Unfortunately, like everything else, Scouting is becoming bogged down in committee meetings and keeping of records. Take our case. We've a room cluttered up with Cub Scout record books and such. We receive frantic calls from the dens to forward forms that they must fill out. We hunt like mad, no forms do we find. So a card must be sent to the area office. The girls are just as bad. Leaders have been running all over the countryside attending a confab here and a meeting there for the past six months.

SOMETIMES I WONDER IF it will end, and if so, where. The poor leaders will be too exhausted to take their groups out on a bike hike or a cookout. They are getting away from the whole idea of Scouting. Organization is a fine thing. But there is a limit.

MARCH HAS REALLY ENTERED true to form. One morning sun, the next snow. In between there is rain. If it hadn't been for Neil Slessman, we might still be attending the chicken dinner at New Haven Saturday evening.

We followed the car ahead, got parked in the wrong place. He had to pull us out of mud to the hubcaps. (We almost said running board — you can see how modern we are.)

Democracy In The Sudan



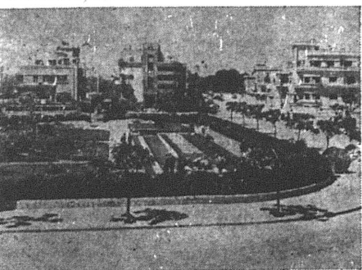
In order to realize the full meaning of democracy within their nation, the people of the Sudan have adopted a traditional African concept—the "town meeting," where residents of the smallest village take an active and very practical interest in the affairs of government on the local level.

The Sudanese Government has deliberately encouraged decentralization of political power to the level of local councils: municipal councils for large cities like Khartoum and Port Sudan; town councils in smaller towns, and district councils which cover many small villages. This process of decentralization is particularly significant in view of the Sudan's past history of a strongly centralized government. Under the Condominium of 1899, the country was divided into seven provinces with a number of districts in each province. Each of these was administered by an agent of the central government. Now the central government relinquishes its powers except in the field of public security. In taxation, civil improvement and agricultural development locally elected officials are assuming more and more responsibility. In Khartoum the municipal council recently carried out a housing development for several thousand poor families.

This decentralization has received much support from the traditional Arab council, or *Mejlia*, which had governed the life of the people in the rural sections. The *Mejlia* had regulated the affairs of many tribes in the Sudan, and through a system of "Sheikhs' Courts" had assumed considerable administrative, judicial and financial powers.

As a result of intense interest in local politics, rural elections now involve vigorous campaigns which provide an excellent stepping stone to higher elective office.

Past Meets Present In Damascus



A city of striking beauty, contrast and historic charm, Syria's capital of Damascus is not only the oldest inhabited city in the world, but also the oldest existing capital.

More than 4,000 years ago the city's foundations were laid in a setting of rugged natural grandeur on the edge of the Syrian desert, beneath the snow-capped Anti-Lebanon mountains. Damascus is blessed with lush green orchards and magnificent gardens, watered by the streams of the Barada River, in vivid contrast to the barren desert which surrounds it.

Damascus was the scene of the famous conversion of St. Paul who received a vision from the Lord on the road to the city and was struck blind for three days. The city's historic sites are carefully preserved by the Syrian Department of Antiquities: The Street Called Straight, the House of Ananias and the wall over which St. Paul escaped.

The preservation of historic shrines and buildings is only one part of an ambitious program of conservation and development now being carried out by municipal authorities in Damascus. A whole new section is rising on the present outskirts of the city. To the southwest, 320 modern apartments with large windows and attractive balconies are being constructed as part of a housing program which allows ample room for gardens, playgrounds and garage facilities. And northwest of Damascus, on the lower slopes of Mount Qassoun (the traditional spot where Cain slew Abel), a new municipal hotel and blocks of residential apartments will be built.

Not long after Syria achieved her independence, a visiting delegate from UNESCO was so impressed with the amount of building and re-building in the city that he remarked "Damascus is indeed the most ancient city in the world, but if construction continues at the present rate, it will also become the most modern."

Judging from their remarkable progress during recent years, the 400,000 residents of Damascus have every reason to believe that this prophetic statement will soon become a fact.

Tunisian President Habib Bourguiba

Prime Minister Habib Bourguiba of Tunisia was born August 3, 1903, in Monastir, Tunisia. His father was a Tunisian Army officer, and his grandfather was one of the leaders of a rebellion in the nineteenth century against illegal taxes. Bourguiba studied at the College Sadiki and the Lycee Carnot in Tunis and at the Faculte de Droit in Paris. After his return from Paris he worked within the Destour party, representing nationalist opposition to the French, until, convinced that the party was not working for the Tunisian people, he formed the Neo-Destour party in 1934. He spent the next eleven years working for Tunisia independence, although often jailed by the French. After World War II, Bourguiba continued his efforts and in January, 1955, the Destour party sponsored a cabinet in Tunis after the French agreed to discuss "internal autonomy" for Tunisia. But in December, 1951, the French announced that they intended to keep Tunisia indefinitely under French rule. In January, 1952, the Tunisians appealed to the United Nations, and France retaliated with a series of repression and Bourguiba was again jailed. In 1954, Premier Mendes-France started negotiations with a new nationalist cabinet formed by the Neo-Destour party for internal autonomy in Tunisia.

Home rule for Tunisia was announced on June 3, 1955, and Bourguiba returned home in triumph. March 20, 1956, the independence of Tunisia was declared and on March 25, representatives were elected by the Tunisian people to a Constituent Assembly. Bourguiba was selected to serve as Minister of Foreign Affairs and Minister of Defense, as well as to hold the post of Prime Minister.

Prime Minister Bourguiba has a bill of "the liberty of individuals and of nations is sacred in our eyes." A part of Tunisia's foreign policy is the independence of Algeria. Bourguiba has said frankly that a weakness of the West is that it includes colonial powers who are trying to maintain their rule over other peoples by force.

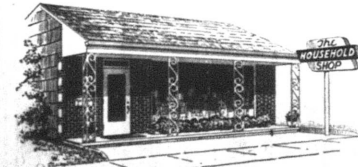

Schools muddled elsewhere, too!

A 20-point program to improve schools at Yellow Springs has been suggested by Supt. R. E. Augspurger.

Enrich educational opportunity for the gifted, he says. Group elementary pupils with others of a different age where they are all of the same level of readiness to undertake a subject, instead of rigid classification by age alone.

CHILDREN WOULD THUS not be assigned to specific grades in their first three years of schooling but rather in relation to their readiness to grasp.

"More public support in deciding what we want to do," the superintendent said, "is needed." Develop a will to make changes, he counseled. Take time to gain acceptance for the changes desired.

Schools should do a better job of reporting to parents. More parent-teacher conferences should be held.

FORMAL GRAMMAR should be taught later than is now the case. Sciences and foreign languages should be taught earlier. A different technique in teaching mathematics should be studied.

Ninth grade science should be moved to the eighth grade. So should health and physical education.

English and social studies might be combined, Augspurger recommended. "Music for everybody, beginning at the second grade," he counseled. Piano instruction is already offered there.

GET A SPECIAL TEACHER for the exceptional or handicapped child. Give more leadership training for pupils of all ages.

Use regularly scheduled assemblies better, he advised. They should provide information and inspiration beyond the classroom.

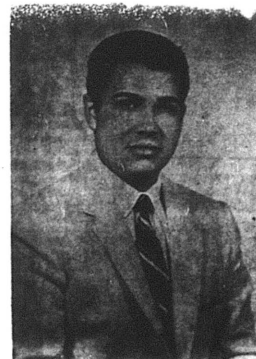
