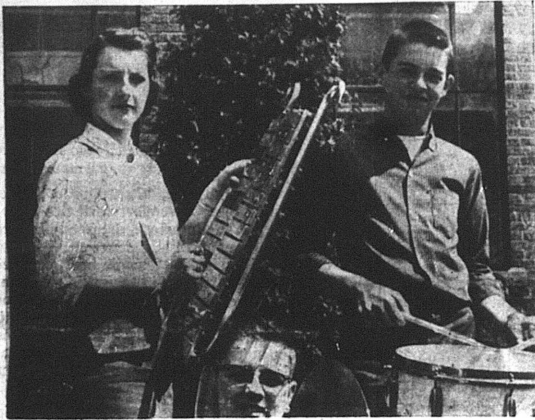
They will play, with hand accompaniment, "Bright Eyes".

Legality questioned, board to ask court OK

Legal action to validate the Shiloh school bond issue of \$25,000 has been demanded by bonding attorneys advising Plymouth Board of Education, which has been told it may not be lawfully constituted.

Squire, Sanders & Dempsey, Cleveland bonding attorneys, has told the board in a letter to M. J. Coon, executive head of the schools, that litigation must be undertaken to establish whether the Plymouth board has the legal power to issue bonds of the consolidated Plymouth board authorized by the vote of the electors of

the old Shiloh district.

The firm is seeking answers, it said, to two critical questions:

1. Were the proceedings of the Richland county board of education properly taken in view of the fact the 30-day remonstrance period had not expired before the enabling statute was amended Jan. 1, 1957?

2. Is the board of education of Plymouth school district now constituted a valid board of education empowered to act for the district in view of actions taken by Richland and Huron

county boards, decision of the supreme court, and failure of the district to hold an election to fill the expired term of some of the members?

Squire, Sanders & Dempsey told Mr. Coon by telephone this week that, even though the present board had nothing to do with these problems, no other body can bring suit in court to establish the board's validity.

It's a question of filing suit," Mr. Coon said Monday, "or have the question of validity hanging over our heads."

• Other developments

Three significant developments occurred in the muddled school situation over the weekend.

1. Huron County Prosecutor Bernard Freeman filed in Richland county common pleas court a friendly suit to recover \$40,957 for South-Central local school district, Plymouth local school district is the defendant.

2. A committee was organized to circulate initiative and referendum petitions to transfer Plymouth school district to Huron county jurisdiction. It will be headed by Mrs. J. Harris Postema and J. Benjamin Smith.

3. WILLARD BOARD OF Education announced it has the room and would accept Huron Valley pupils as tuitioners in its high school.

The Plymouth board wants to do what is right by South-Central, and would have done so — that is, pay the bill — long ago but for counsel to the contrary by Richland County Prosecutor Theodore Lutz.

The Chamber of Commerce summoned representatives from a dozen patriotic, fraternal and civic organizations to thresh out the plans to submit the question of transfer of Plymouth district to Huron county to the electorate

THE COMMITTEE WILL organize its members so that the entire district is sub-divided into areas, in which one or more committee members will be assigned the responsibility of carrying the petition to every elector in the area.

"In this way," the committee heads said, "we will give everybody an opportunity to express himself."

Shilohans who attended the meeting were said by some prominent Chamber of Commerce members to have opposed placement of the issue on the ballot.

"Let's be frank about it," one proponent of transfer said Sunday, "the move by the Willard board tends to jerk the rug out from under us. We have to have something to 'sell' to Huron Valley district. That something is a rural school that is modern and up-to-date and serving the needs of the Huron Valley population, at a price they can afford to pay and over which they'll have some form of control through the ballot, because they won't be outnumbered so much and they won't be ignored at all. Plymouth has a long record of seeing to it that minority areas get school board representation."

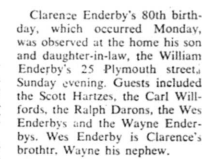
She was Mrs. Stella Briggs, 44 Dix Street, who had been visiting the grave of her husband.

Examiner's report shows first-class management

Findings of \$43,622, erroneously deposited to the village account instead of paid to the Richland county treasurer and the treasurer of state, were made against the village during the periodic audit by the office of State Auditor James A. Rhodes.

The audit covered the period Jan. 1, 1955-Aug. 31, 1957.

The findings were paid Nov. 12, 1957, in the amounts of \$8,622 to the treasurer of state and \$35 to the Richland county treasurer.

They represented fines collected in mayor's court cases.

CHARLES M. SHANK, state examiner, found little fault with the conduct of village affairs.

Highlights of his report: There is an insufficiency of security of \$17,395.39 by the official depository. The treasurer's bank balance of \$107,395.39 was

covered by only \$90,000 of security in the form of \$10,000 Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. insurance and securities of the federal government.

Method of keeping permanent records of the official proceedings of the village council does not conform to law. The clerk should record each resolution and ordinance immediately after passage, together with a certificate of publication, in a book furnished by the council for the purpose. Proper indexing should be carried out.

Members of the park board, because they have not given or furnished bond in the amount of \$2,500 each, as required by state law, merely serve de facto which means they hold the jobs but not lawfully until such bond is given or furnished and approved.

Board of Public Affairs does not keep a daily cash book record of each collection.

Record for consistency? 'P. H.' may have one!

Forty years with the same li-
cense tag is the record of Percy
H. Root, who obtained No. 221
in 1918 when Ohio first permitted
a number to be reserved from
year to year.

And he has complete collection
of tags from 1909 — when the
first registration tags were issued
in Ohio — to the present. The
only gaps are 1943 and 1952,
when windshield stickers were
issued in lieu of metal tags as
conservation measures during World
War II and the Korean crisis.

THE FIRST PLATE MR.
Root got was in 1909, for a four-
cylinder Cadillac. It carried no
date. Until 1911, the plates were
enamel in porcelain. From 19-
12 to 1917 the plates were sim-
ply painted. In 1918 the state be-
gan to employ raised numbers in
a stamping process.

In 1938, Mr. Root's collection
shows, size of the tags got larger.
That was when Ohio, in keeping
with other states, began to ad-
vertise itself.

For completeness the collection
is believed to be the best in Ohio.
And certainly there's nobody else
who can show he had No. 221 all
those years!

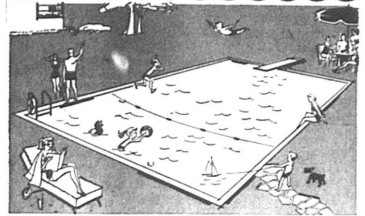

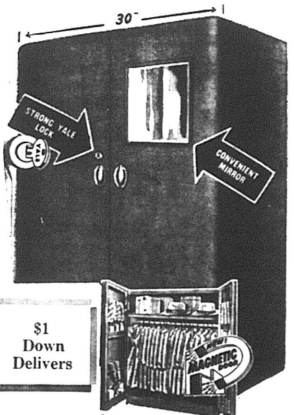
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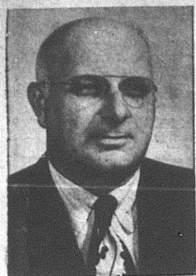
