

Ban parking on Square Thursday nights

Midtown dwellers who park their cars in the Square oversight are due for a rude awakening.

Village council instructed the solicitor Tuesday night to bring in an ordinance which would prohibit parking on the Square from midnight Thursday to 6 a. m. Fridays.

Purpose: to enable street department to clean the Square.

IN OTHER ROUTINE BUSINESS, authorization was accorded Henry VanderBilt to tap into village water services in Curtis drive

to serve a new house he plans to build astride the village line. Councilman Donald E. Akers made certain he wouldn't be billed a sewer service fee.

An ordinance authorizing the state highway department to make casual repairs to state roads within the corporation limits was passed on first reading.

Robert Vogel was paid \$23.08 for his claim that through village negligence his car struck a school sign in the middle of a street.

VILLAGE CLEAN-UP DAYS

were set for May 7 (Huron county), 8 (Richland county) and 9 (Square). Rubbish will be picked up by the street department if placed in a stout container at the curbside.

A lengthy debate over the merits of road maintenance for street repair work ensued.

Councilmen Akers, Whitney J. Briggs and Elmer E. Markley seemed favorable to the acquisition of a used maintainer. But Councilman John T. Dick wavered and Omer G. Burkett flatly opposes the acquisition, both for

reasons of economy and inefficiency.

"This machine won't do what we need to have done," he said, citing his 14 years on the council

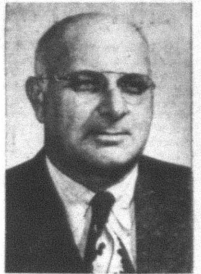

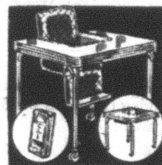

the woman's side of it

You simply can't win if you are a mother. This has been determined the hard way at our house. It all began last summer.

We had a crate of strawberries for making jam. So beautiful, in fact, that we froze some of them whole. Occasionally, through the winter months, we have had wonderful strawberry shortcake. Now we are down to one container. It was defrosting, we had cream ready for whipping, and freshly baked shortcake.

That is where the bomb fell. Some characters — and there're several involved (categorically denied, there were only two — Ed. Note) — had eaten the strawberries the night before. All day I had been looking forward to a big fat dessert of strawberry shortcake. There is one moral: always keep canned peaches. Peach shortcake is peachy at such a time. If you like peaches, that is.

Peaches we like, but only for upside-down cake. It's one of our standbys for a nice-looking dessert. Start out with a ring mold, of the nine inch size. Melt enough butter to cover all around the bottom. Then sprinkle brown sugar over the butter. Place peach halves, cut side upward, around the mold, fitting them carefully together. Mix up a two-egg cake batter, pour over the peaches, and bake.

The result is lovely. It comes out of the pan nicely with a little loosening around the sides and you fill up the center with whipped cream.

THIS WEEK ALL CHRIST-endom is observing one of its greatest feast days. Many, many great things have come to the world because of the carpenter of Galilee.

Some of these things have been the art of sculpture, painting and buildings created in His honor and glory. The very greatest artists the world has known have

tried their hands at depicting a face of which there is no written image nor description left.

One of the most famous still remains on the wall in Milan, "The Last Supper" — or, more correctly, "Il Cenacolo" — is known to millions at a glance. I have seen it, awe-stricken to my very marrow by its magnificence. Some of the portraits done by the Dutchman, Rembrandt van Rijn, have received world acclaim.

And the 20th century also has its great portrayer of Christ. In 1924, a young artist, Walter Sallman by name, was assigned to do a cover for a youth publication. The day before it was due he sat listening to a YMCA Bible class in Chicago. The instructor's spoken words — "I hope some day an artist will give us a picture of Him as a man of strength, courage and ideals, cheerfulness and hope — sank into his mind. Sallman went home to his pallet. He tried and tried, but the results were not quite right. Almost ready to give up, he saw the picture in his mind as it should be.

The drawing came easily. It was accepted for the magazine and there were only a few requests for extra copies.

THROUGH THE YEARS, the serene portrait of the Master of Galilee, which is simply titled "Head of Christ," is finding its place with the great masters of art. The original portrait is now in the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City. Copies of it are found in homes and offices across the world, and a cherished possession of many a wallet.

For the latter, there is a fine story of a young man who couldn't find his ticket after he boarded a train far from home. While he was frantically looking into every cranny of his wallet for it, the conductor caught a glimpse of the portrait. "I believe you, son, that you did lose your ticket."

Sewer system making 'good progress' after delay

The laying of sewer mains in Shiloh is now advancing at a rapid rate.

Although one excavator ran into a bottleneck in the form of a treacherous strata of gravel in Mechanic street, and was held practically in one spot for almost a week, it now is moving steadily up Church street and contributing alleys.

LINES IN THE NORTH-ern section are practically completed. They advance from the east of the brick yard pond, across lower Prospect to the railroad tracks, up Mechanic and across the alley to the east of it, up the alley between Prospect and Delaware, up the west side of

Delaware, up North street by the county garage to West Main east of Superior, across West Main to the alley between Dan Springton and Homer Beard and back of the

houses on the south side of Main and across South Walnut to South Delaware.

In a number of places the excavations are between 16 and 22 ft. in depth and the cutting of

drains in the north section has resulted in a number of residents complaining of water backing up in basements and dooryards. A councilman reported on Saturday a number of these residents have

been permitted to tap their cellar drains into the sewer lines. The resultant drainage accumulates in the manholes.

Although no code was formulated at the last meeting of council Mar. 26, he said that every thing will have to be regulated by state specifications. All cellar drains carrying wash water will have to go into the sewer line and bathrooms, too, will drain directly into the line. Septic tanks must be by-passed. Sewer tile of at least four inches in diameter, better six, is a requirement, and a \$30 tap fee will be charged every user to hook on.

The property owner will pay the cost of tiling from his premises.

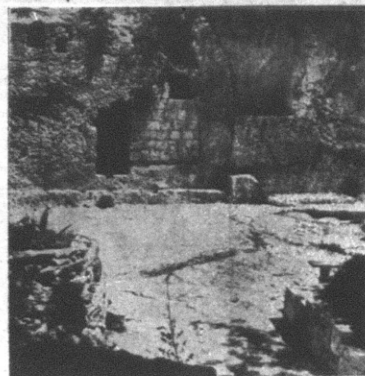

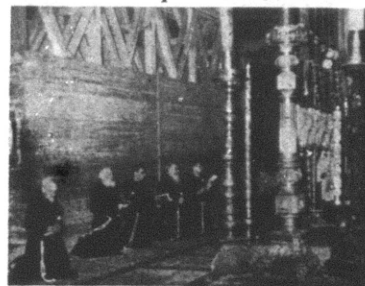
