

Manse to undergo major remodelling, minister to move

Remodeling of the Presbyterian manse at 32 East High street was decreed Sunday morning in an almost unanimous vote by the congregation.

The work will entail the tearing down of parts of the house and building on to other parts to make it a one-floor plan dwelling. Estimated cost is set at \$15,000. Spokesman Charles Vansdale told the congregation this amount does not take into account contributions of labor by members, which are likely to reduce the total expenditure. The building program will be financed by pledges from church members.

While the work is being done, the pastor, the Rev. Mrs. Rutan, and Mrs. Rutan will occupy the William Wechter house in Trux street. The two-bedroom house which Mr. Wechter has left to the church, not adequate as a manse, will probably be put on the market for sale at a later date.

Petitions asking school transfer circulating, deadline, May 7

Initiative petitions seeking referendum to approve transfer of Plymouth school district to Huron county jurisdiction were submitted for signature by electors in the district Tuesday night.

A committee of volunteers headed by J. Benjamin Smith and Mrs. J. Harris Postema carried the petitions to electors, who were asked to sign this:

"... qualified electors ... propose that the Richland county board of education transfer all of the Plymouth local school district to the adjoining Huron county school district for educational purposes. This petition is hereby presented for the purpose of having the transfer to Huron county placed on the ballot. ..."

DEADLINE FOR SUBMITTING the petition is May 7, to afford the county board of education and the board of elections the statutory time of 90 days to consider the petitions.

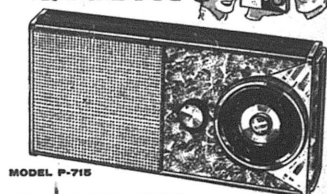

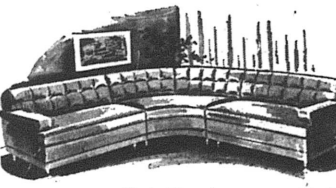

The four-tiered wedding cake

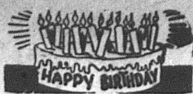

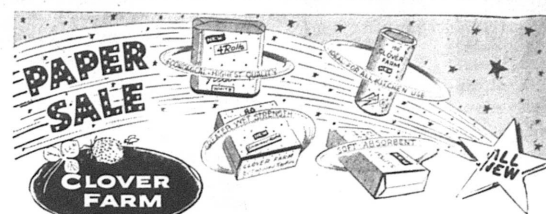

Primaries are Tuesday: VOTE!

Primary election day is Tuesday.

There isn't much of a contest, locally. For Huron countians, there is the question of whether O. W. (Bill) Leech of New London should be re-nominated by his party for county commissioner.

Our policy has always been that his work has been satisfactory and if where an incumbent is willing to serve again, he should be re-elected if there is no compelling reason to support his opponent.

Mr. Leech has, we think, served honorably and well. He has been fair and diligent in the discharge of his duties, with no special favor to his own district.

He should be re-nominated and we urge Huron county Republicans to support his candidacy in great number.

For Richland countians, there are at least three contests of a local nature.

The office of sheriff is an important one. Several candidates have come forward. Some of them are or have been deputies in the office. Their experience is worth something. And it should be given consideration.

But the best police officer we ever knew was a school teacher who'd never worn a badge, never fired a pistol, never made an arrest. He knew in his heart what was right, he understood how the law should be enforced, and he was a success at his job. So experience in a law enforcement post is not, by itself, a compelling factor in choosing a sheriff.

It has been our impression that political considerations have here-tofore carried too much weight in the sheriff's office. It's too bad we can't participate in both primaries, because we would certainly support

new and fresh candidates who aren't touched, whether innocently or otherwise, by politics in office.

Republicans in Richland county will opt for a candidate for probate judge. The Democratic incumbent, Judge Freehafer, has served the public well. In at least two well-publicized instances, his opinions in matters of weighty and involved legal questions have won praise from the appellate courts. So far as we are able to ascertain, nobody has any reasonable complaint against the manner of conduct of the office. We believe Judge Freehafer should be elected to a new term, and we shall support him in the general election, come November.

On the Republican side, Richland countians who are deeply concerned with the school muddle in the northern districts may wish to express their displeasure with the conduct of the affairs of an office which has had considerable influence on the muddle.

The incumbent there has filed for probate judge. Dissatisfaction with the advices, whether proper or improper, depending on from which side of the fence you look at it, given by him in the school muddle will, we think, militate against his candidacy.

The incumbent Democratic commissioner, Fred Dawson, is opposed by Wilber M. Worner of Jefferson township. Democrats should be guided, we think, by the same considerations we urge upon Huron county Republicans: an incumbent willing to serve again should be accorded re-election if his work has been satisfactory.

Disagree with these observations if you like. It is healthy to disagree. Healthy for the republic, healthy for politics.

But pay them careful mind, because they reflect deep and careful research. Then vote. To fail to do so is treason.

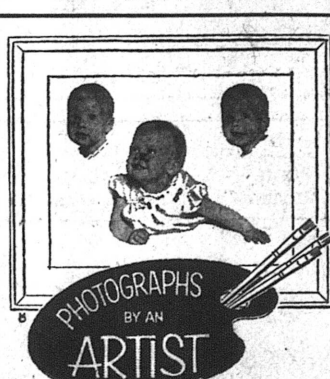
New books received

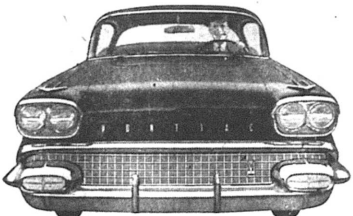

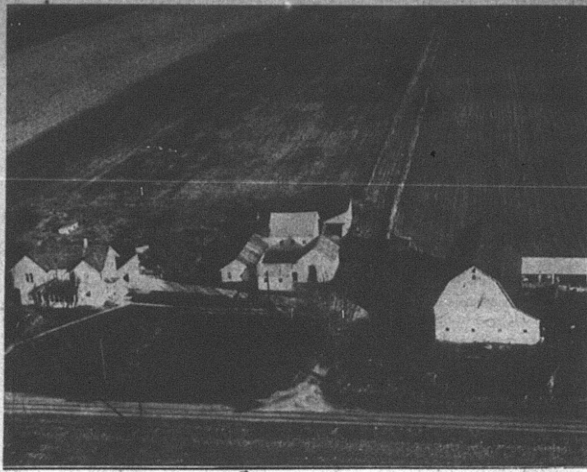

The Lauren Eitles farm just under 80 acres of the best farm land in Richland township.

And after 11 years on the same stand, they've these observations to offer:

1. No matter how hard you work, nor how much you deprive yourself, you can't raise a family on a farm so small.

2. It's impossible for a farmer to raise a family and pay for a farm at the same time.

3. Farm population will continue to decrease, with no appreciable effect upon crop production levels.

4. Farming is hard work, but not without its rewards if you know where to look for 'em.

You'd have to go a good piece, as they say in Richmond township, to find better farm land than what adjoins Coder road, west of the state-owned Willard game

preserve.

And it's plowing time, right now. The tractors go day and night.

LAND TENURE PATTERNS are bigger in Richmond township. Farmsteads run to larger size. Thus farmers there have been in somewhat less of a squeeze than those "in adjoining townships, where land holdings generally run smaller.

But almost all of them work off the farm. Mr. Eitles has just given up, after five years, a post in a New Washington garage.

Mrs. Eitles hasn't been well, is recovering from surgery in the Bucyrus hospital. The Eitles children, save for Jerry, who had his 14th birthday Saturday, have been visiting neighbors and kin.

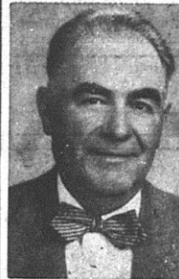
After several years of service on the Richmond school board, and service on the Huron Valley

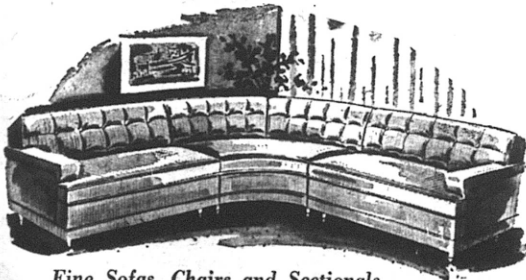

Bright bid brightest

A bid by Ray Bright to repair
