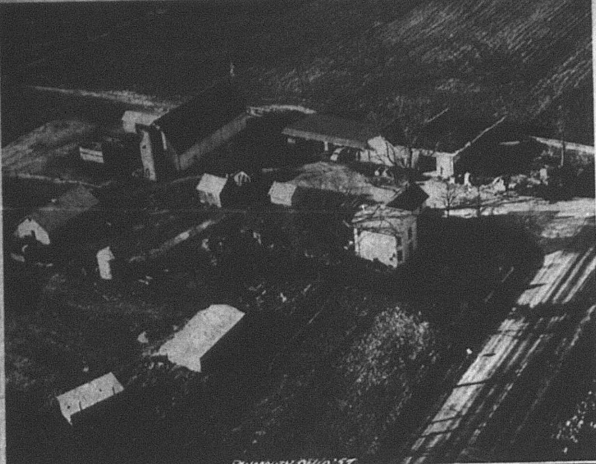

Two resignations and one new teacher acquisition were announced by Plymouth board of education Thursday night.

Mrs. Dale Osborn, fifth grade teacher here, and Mrs. Virginia Morrow, fifth and sixth grade instructor at Shiloh, turned in their resignations.

Frederick Kreutzfeld was given a two-year contract to teach science in the high school.

He taught here before accepting a biology instructorship and assistant coaching job at Ottawa Hills, near Toledo, three years ago. Last year he was a partner of his father in a bill collecting business at Lorain.

Kreutzfeld said he prefers the Plymouth opportunity to other districts where he could have been hired. He will not coach here, "It

AFTER THE HAPPY gesture of approving congratulations to H. Dale Moore and the high school band, which won a superior rating in the state music contests in class C-1, the board was all but overcome with embarrassment.

First National bank of Mansfield, Shiloh branch, notified the board it had been reprimanded by

the Federal Reserve system at Cleveland. The \$23,000 advanced by the bank to cover the future sale of bonds for the Shiloh addition never having been consummated by sale of the bonds, the bank is now required to collect interest for the loan.

Prosecutor Theodore Lutz advised the board to pay the interest. It decided to do it. It was apparent that both the bank and the board were embarrassed by this turn of events, which is unlikely of settlement until the Court of Appeals rules upon the validity of the school district, as requested by bonding attorneys at Cleveland.

Already in straitened fiscal circumstances, the board is thus called upon to pay from general fund more interest charges.

Personal tax payers lauded by auditor

"More personal tax returns were filed this year than in any previous year," reports Huron County Auditor Bernard F. Kean. Advance payments also exceed those of any previous year.

"While more returns have been filed, there is a greater number who overlooked filing returns, according to present indications," Kean says. Since many do not bring the forms mailed to them and use another form, where first names are changed to initials or vice versa, a double check is necessary, so that citations will not be mailed out in error.

Others change to trade names, or from trade names to individual names. Despite every effort, some of these discrepancies will not be noted.

Every year some taxpayers file more than once, necessitating re-funds. Others file tangibles and fail to report intangibles, or vice versa.

Many who receive returns ig-

nore them completely, believing the return is not meant for them. In some instances there is no tax involved, as the property may have been transferred to others, but the return should be made, so there will be supporting record for every form that is mailed.

As soon as possible reminder notices will be mailed to those who overlooked filing returns. The new law effective last year provides for one half percent penalty or interest charge each month in addition to the penalty for late filing.

In the first year of the extended filing date to Apr. 30, filing was distributed more evenly over the period, with no real rush developing until the final three days. This made possible that more time could be given to each individual return prepared in the office.

It did not reduce the number of extensions any appreciable amount, however.

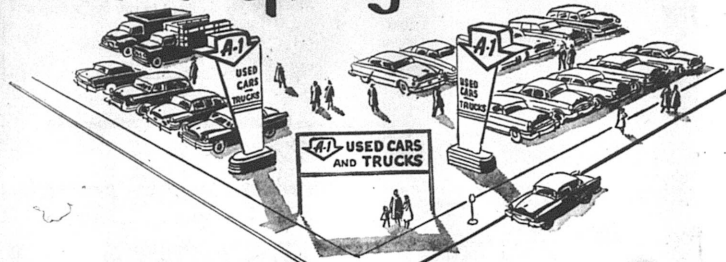

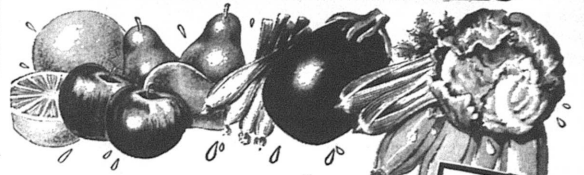

A PRIMER FOR MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT

After attending 107 meeting of the village council, 88 meetings of the Board of Public Affairs, 77 sessions of the Board of Education, and nearly 60 meetings of other bodies of a less imposing character, we have prepared a sort of political primer, which we think should guide the conduct of municipal government.

This primer consists of several maxims, which are:

Services of government should be limited to essential needs.

Costs of non-supporting governmental services should be held down to minimum acceptable levels, save for education.

Self-supporting governmental services should be required to reproduce themselves, by charging sufficiently for service so that its replacement can be financed from its own earnings.

Elective bodies should show leadership by developing programs for civic betterment and urging their adoption upon the electorate.

Appointive officers should be required to maintain a standard of decorum and service at least as high as officers of the military service, and in no case permitted to regard their tenure as interminable nor their positions irreplaceable.

Governmental affairs should be discharged by elective officials in accordance with the doctrine of what they believe to be right and just for the people, not in response to public or private pressures, or threats thereof.

Efforts of the 'teen-agers to do for themselves deserve the plaudits of every citizen. Too often the kids look to adults to do for them. The case of the 'Teen-Ager Rendezvous, which meets weekly in the Legion rooms for jive, jazz and conversation — and innocent pleasure — is an exception.

The youngsters have adopted a book of rules — to keep the facilities offered to them in good repair, to refrain from unruliness, to pay cash for food and drink, to cooperate with chaperons and officers in maintaining proper order, to abstain from loitering in the neighborhood of the hall, and to surrender membership — which costs \$1 — if the pledge is violated.

Some good-intentioned citizens are behind the rendezvous — the Don Shavers as organizers, Police Chief Meiser, who interceded with the Legion to obtain the rooms, John Hass, who finances the soda concession, Coach Pettit, who is the teacher-advisor, Tom DeWitt, who provides the amplifying machine, and some others whose names slip our memory right now.

And these kids deserve another boost — they've always offered to pay for what is legitimate advising.

It's never been taken, but we appreciate the gesture.

THE RETURN OF FRED KREUTZFELD to the teaching staff of Plymouth High school should be regarded as another feather in Plymouth's cap. He was a good teacher when he was here before, stayed out of the profession for a year, and doubtless could have obtained a position elsewhere. But he chose Plymouth. Apparently the town were well on the Kreutzfelds. Experienced teachers are not easily come by, and fair treatment of teachers in every aspect of their work is one way to see to it that good ones are retained.

No self-respecting teacher wants to be shielded from just criticism. His room is always open to the parents or citizen who has fair criticism to make. He deserves the right of private criticism first.

Should he fail to rectify an obvious error, he expects public criticism for that mistake, let the chips fall where they may. For when you be-

Renters should have no less authority than property owners in the councils of the people.

Prestige of a community is important to its future, and capital improvements designed to enhance its prestige should be a regular part of its tax structure.

Too often, the citizen is prone to allude to problems of another community in defending the conduct of his own town's affairs. The thief of a dollar in one village is no less a robber than the thief of five dollars in another.

The standard maintained by a village's government should be judged against an absolute measurement, not against those observed elsewhere, in other villages.

Government is everybody's concern. But hardly anybody pays it any mind. Yet the complaints of harsh treatment rise promptly, often without reference to needs, to conditions, or to failure to do the job years ago.

This primer is not in its final form, we hasten to say. It will be altered in the light of another 107 village council meetings, God willing. And of 88 more meetings of the Board of Public Affairs and 77 more sessions of the Board of Education.

But we promise this: we shall continue to judge what we see and hear by the standards contained herein.

Especially that one that begins, "Elective officers should show leadership..."
