An editorial---

Memorial day is tomorrow. It got started a long time ago when General Logan issued an order commanding troops to decorate the graves of soldiers who had died. Through the years Memorial day has become a national holiday, when a grateful republic pauses to pay honor to those who gave their lives so that republic could live.

But let's not kid ourselves. Nor try to kid those who sacrificed all they had because it was their duty to do so.

Just how grateful are we? If in some unseen Valhalla the war dead can look upon what we have wrought, have they cause to be proud?

Consider what they see. A whole city will be slain senselessly on the highways over this weekend. A whole generation of young people will be graduating from high schools next month with no clear notion of where they are going, nor how, nor when, nor even whether they are educationally equipped.

So when you hear the rifles in salute this Memorial day, give a thought to the poor devil who went west for YOU. Are YOU measuring up to the faith for which he died? And if not, why not?

We've got some pretty good ideas as to how the honest citizens will answer. And knowing people as we do, some of them will feel badly about it all. But cheer up, friends, in a few months everybody will forget all about duty and patriotism and respect for our freedoms — especially respect for our freedoms and defense thereof — except the comparative handful of folks who really care.

And take off tomorrow in the family car — the parade will be small anyway — and wrap yourself around a pole somewhere. It'll make a dandy story — you paid tribute to the men who laid down their lives for you by throwing yours away.

Two local men lose close kin

Father-in-law of Clem Ruffing, co-proprietor of Bob's cafe here, Alex L. Heltz, 67, lifelong resident of Bismark, died May 21 in Willard Municipal hospital.

Mrs. Ruffing is one of four daughters and two sons and five brothers and sisters who survive.

Only 35 volunteer to give blood here

Because only 35 volunteers have come forward to give blood here June 6, a critical situation is developing in whole blood supply.

Barton Lydy, Willard American Red Cross Bloodmobile chairman, indicated Tuesday.

American Legion auxiliary women have solicited the village, Lydy said, in a door-to-door canvass, but could get only 25 percent of the volunteers necessary to support the Bloodmobile's visit.

A quota of 125 pints is usually sought, Lydy said. About 140 prospective donors are required to meet that quota, allowing for rejections because of ill health.

Plymouth has had only one visit of the Bloodmobile in the summer of 1954.

Since that time, some Plymouth donors have reported to the Bloodmobile at Willard and Shelby to give whole blood, but the number, Lydy indicated, is comparatively small.

HE CALLED ATTENTION to current regulations which allow donors to "deposit" blood, so that it can be drawn by their selves, their families or friends.

School board rejects, 3 to 2, appeal for state building aid

A resolution to apply for state building aid was defeated by Plymouth Board of Education in special session Friday night.

H. Dale Moore, successful music instructor, resigned, to accept a new post at Perkins school near Sandusky.

THE RESOLUTION TO AP- ply for state building aid so that construction on an addition to the Plymouth High school building can be undertaken if the transfer-to-Huron-county measures on the general election ballot fail of public support was supported by David E. Cook and Gerald Stan-

ley.

But President Donald P. Markley, Judson A. Morrison and Hal, don Cheesman voted against the resolution.

They argued that to fail to do so would be "treason to the measures which have been placed on the ballot. If we succeed in what we intend to do — to reconstitute the Huron Valley district — then the application for state funds wouldn't be worth the paper it's written on."

JUST HOW DESPERATE are building needs the board learned first hand May 22 when

it went to Shiloh to inspect buildings there. The need for repair and rehabilitation of the schools there was found to be "very great."

In other action the board agreed to set aside for one year the requirement that a teacher complete six months' hours of additional study during the year to qualify for an in-grade raise in pay.

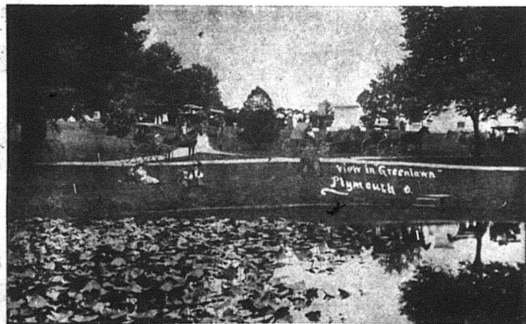

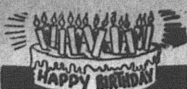

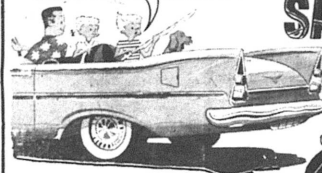

'You can live life only once': Cummingses

"I found her here, I married her and kept her here," says Walter Cummings, veteran New Haven township farmer, of his wife, whom he married 52 years ago, come October.

She has spent nearly a generation more than that on the 90-acre place that was homesteaded, according to old New Haven plats, by David Bone, her grandfather, long before the Civil war.

"My mother died when I was only two and a half," says Mrs. Cummings, "and I came to live on this farm with an aunt. I've never left it since. And that's a good many years!"

THE CUMMINGSES and their son and grandson work 90 acres in general farming in Town Line road adjoining Peru Center road — they've a fruit orchard that's famous — and another 90 acres across the road, "in what's called Baxter road, I guess."

"When you've lived all of a matured life in one stomping grounds, some of its history rubs off on you, the Cummingses claim.

Consider the roads in New Haven township, for example. North-south roads are narrower than east-west roads.

Reason? "Why, north-south roads were laid out first, and used to measure east-west distances. The east-west roads were laid out much later to accommodate service traffic."

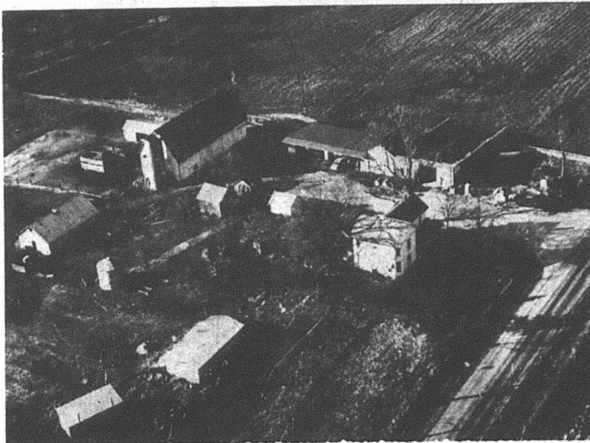
NEW HAVEN TOWNSHIP, they've found, is the first in the Northwest territory to be laid out on the four-mile-square pattern. Commencing at the southeast corner of New Haven township and extending as far as the old Northwest territory goes, all townships are four miles square.

Just how much did New Haven ownership participate in the celebrated Underground railroad, the refuge of escaped slaves?

And is it true that an old house in New Haven proper was equipped with a tunnel which debouched in this Boughtonville road so that slaves could be secreted in town and released under cover.

THE CUMMINGSES HAVE spent a long time trying to ascertain the truth of these reports.

After 52 years of marriage, what advice for those striving for the same record? "You only pass this way once, you can't live it over," says the Walter Cummingses, "so enjoy it while you can."

Soybean acreage shows big increase

Soybeans have increased in importance in Huron County for the past several years, John Wells, county agricultural agent, reports.

Over 40,000 acres are now grown, compared with 27,000 acres in 1950.

The increase in soybeans acreage has been caused by allotments restricting plantings of corn and wheat.

Soybeans are a fast growing crop and remove twice as much potash from the soil as corn, two and one-half times as much as oats, and nearly four times as much potash as comparable yields of wheat. From a fertility standpoint, soybeans are the most potent soil degrading grain crop grown in Ohio. For this reason, a high level of fertility is important if satisfactory yields are to be expected.

The question most often asked by farmers is whether soybeans should be fertilized. Wells says, "The soybean is highly susceptible to injury when fertilizer is placed close to the seed, which would be the case with the grain drill or the common type of fertilizer distributor on a corn planter. The fertilization of soybeans should be planned so that the application can be made sometime on the previous crop. Plowing down a complete fertilizer for corn, in addition to the row application, will materially help the soybean yield when they follow corn. When fertilizer is needed, as much as 200 pounds of 0-20-0 could be applied with either the drill or the corn planter without injury. New types of corn planters that place the fertilizer away from the seed, and slightly below, will permit the use of an 0-20-0 grade of fertilizer at a maximum of 200 pounds per acre. Potash should not be applied where the fertilizer is to be placed close to the seed. When fertilizer is drilled separately lower germination and seedling injury are usually avoided. In many cases, fertilizer treatments may do more to promote weed growth than to help the yield of beans."

ANOTHER QUESTION often asked about soybean production is drilling solid or in wide rows. Higher yields will usually be obtained when soybeans are drilled in 16-in. rows. This, however, is only true when weeds can be controlled. The later and more branching varieties, such as Lincoln, can utilize wider spacing without serious loss in yield. It is usually better to row beans so that weed control can be main, tained and combining is not hampered.

Weed control, by chemicals, is hazardous. Several chemicals can be recommended. However, practically all must be applied at planting time or before the beans emerge. Specific recommendations only can be made due to the type of weeds that need to be controlled. For information Wells asks farmers to call the agricultural extension office, Courthouse, Norwalk.
