### 761 ask school transfer in petitions filed May 7

Initative petitions calling for transfer to Huron county jurisdic-tion were filed yesterday with Richland county board of educa-tion by 761 electors of Plymouth school district.

school district.

As nearly as could be calculated, the signatures represent 85 per cent of the vote at the last general election (55 per cent is required to place the proposition on the ballot) but only 37 per cent of the total eligible vote in the district, estimated to be 2.051.

Richland country beared of adv.

Richland county board of edu-ations officials explained Monday there are three reasons why more accurate figures are not readily available:

Registration of voters is required in Plymouth, New

1. Registration of voters is mot required in Plymouth, New Haven, Auburn, Cass, Bloominggrove, Ripley and Butler flownships, Thus, calculations of total cligible voters are only that — estimates.

2. Votes were cast in three counties in 11 polling places in the last election. It will take time to sort out the actual Plymouth school district vote, because some who voted in Crawford and Huron counties are included in precincts that are not within the houndary of the Plymouth school district.

3. With primary election duties incumbent on election boards, there sart time to do these jobs right now.

Deadline was yesterday.

Under the new law which went into effect Jan, 3, the transfer of any school district is required to be endorsed at the polls. The county board cannot lawfully transfer the district without submitting the proposition to the

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


