

761 ask school transfer in petitions filed May 7

Initiative petitions calling for transfer to Huron county jurisdiction were filed yesterday with Richland county board of education by 761 electors of Plymouth school district.

As nearly as could be calculated, the signatures represent 85 per cent of the vote at the last general election (55 per cent on the ballot) but only 37 per cent of the total eligible vote in the district, estimated to be 2,051.

Richland county board of education officials explained Monday there are three reasons why more accurate figures are not readily available:

1. Registration of voters is not required in Plymouth, New Haven, Auburn, Cass, Bloomington, Ripley and Butler townships. Thus, calculations of total eligible voters are only that — estimates.

2. Votes were cast in three counties in 11 polling places in the last election. It will take time to sort out the actual Plymouth school district vote, because some who voted in Crawford and Huron counties are included in precincts that are not within the boundary of the Plymouth school district.

3. With primary election duties incumbent on election boards, there isn't time to do these jobs right now.

Deadline was yesterday. Under the new law which went into effect Jan. 1, the transfer of any school district is required to be endorsed at the polls. The county board cannot lawfully transfer the district without submitting the proposition to the

electorate.

WITHIN 30 DAYS, THE county board must submit the petition to the Richland county board of education. A 60-day period may elapse thereafter, whereupon the question must be certified for the November ballot.

"Assuming the signers of the petition were honest in their intent and didn't sign it merely to get it on the ballot," a spokesman for the citizen's committee headed by J. Benjamin Smith and Mrs. J. Harris Postema said Monday, "we should have more than enough to carry the issue in November."

"Those who weren't afforded an opportunity to sign the petition should not feel slighted," he went on. "Our petition carriers got to as many electors as possible within the short time available for obtaining signatures."

"We hope," the spokesman concluded, "that the extremely large participation of electors will show to our friends in the Huron Valley district that we are sincere and honest in our purpose, which is to transfer to Huron county and eventually reorganize the Huron Valley district as it was before the supreme court invalidated it."

Board to try infusion of fresh zeolite in water softener

Nodding approval was given to purchase additional zeolite to add to the village water softening system by the Board of Public Affairs Monday night.

On Advice of Roy Simpson, the board will add from nine to 10 inches of a high powered zeolite which will increase the water softening by about 40,000 units. This action is contingent upon approval by the state department of health.

Simpson proposes to send his findings to it for its opinion. He feels this is the answer to the village hard water situation. Approximate cost is \$800. A completely new zeolite bed would cost nearly \$5,000.

The board interviewed representatives of two firms for the cleaning repair of the water tower. The matter is still under review, although a decision is expected this weekend.

WALLACE REDDEN, spokesman for householders in West Broadway seeking increased water service, presented a petition signed by 47 residents asking for 1,400 feet of six-inch line to be installed at village expense.

The petition stated the purpose is for fire protection under the laws of Ohio and other uses.

Redden submitted figures estimated by one company for the installation. Cast iron pipe of the desired size was set at \$3.75 a foot, transit pipe at \$3.35. The figures also include labor. Three fire hydrants, listed at \$265 each, are desired.

The boards suggested Redden present the petition to the village council also.

115 vote in primary; 'ins' win

One hundred 15 ballots — 63 Republican and 52 Democratic — were cast in Plymouth Tuesday at the rate of .464 a vote in the lightest primary election in many years.

Blustery weather and rain squalls kept voters from the polls, to some extent, but it was the absence of an issue that tayed most voters from the polling places.

So far as local preference went, Gov. C. William O'Neill narrowly bested his Republican opponent, Charles Taft of Cincinnati, in both precincts. His margin was one vote, 17 to 16, in Precinct A and the same, 13 to 12, in Precinct B. Statewide, it was only slightly better than that.

Only 40 votes, all told, were cast in Precinct B, 25 of them on the GOP ticket. A total of 75 votes was cast in Precinct A, of which 38 were GOP.

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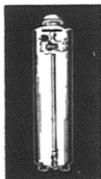
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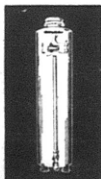
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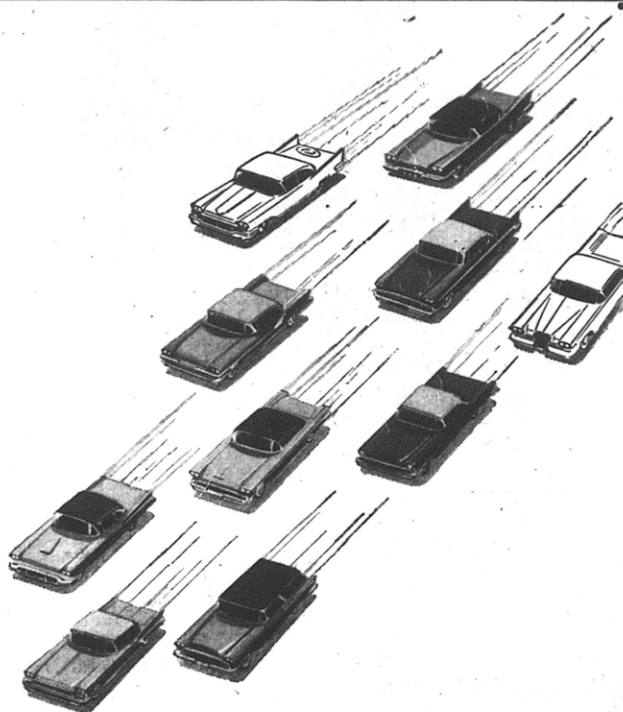
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Miss Bowman becomes bride of V. O. Wince in church here

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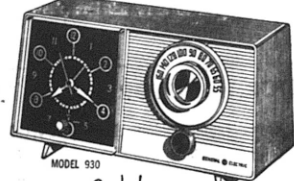
