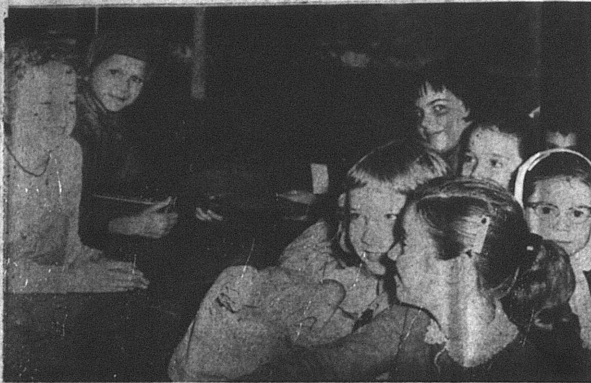

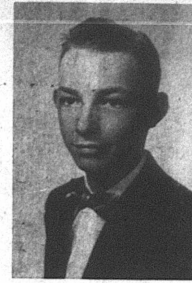
Robert Crumquist, high school music teacher, has also resigned.

Boy, 17, killed in Rt. 224 crash

A recent Plymouth High school graduate was killed and a classmate seriously injured early Thursday morning when a sedan went out of control in Route 224 and collided head-on with a tractor-trailer rig.

Larry D. Wilson, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Wilson, Preston road, Plymouth township, was dead on arrival at Willard Municipal hospital with a fractured skull, broken neck and internal injuries.

HIS COMPANION, Malcolm Riggie, 18, son of the Clarence Riggies, Plymouth route 1, was admitted to the hospital with injuries, including a fracture, of his right hand, a concussion, and a gash on his head.

Orville McDermid, 43, Indianapolis, Ind. driver of the truck, was not hurt.

State highway patrolmen of the Norwalk post said the boys had been at a dance at Attica. They were returning home shortly after midnight when Wilson, driving a 1956 model Plymouth sedan recently purchased by his father, sped into the Scurry seven-tenths

of a mile east of Willard. Speed of the car was too great for the curvature of the road. The sedan slid off the right hand (south) side of the road. Wilson corrected for drift and skidded into the path of the tractor-trailer.

The sedan was struck on the right-hand or passenger side of the body, yet it was the driver who died.

FRIENDS OF THE YOUNG, pair recounted that two other classmates, Gary D. Levering and L. Edward Taylor, might have ridden with them but for last-minute changes of mind.

Levering elected to go to bed. Taylor rode with another boy.

Young Wilson, who was born Dec. 31, 1940, is survived by his parents, two sisters, Donna Mae, Oakland, Cal., and Martha, at home; four brothers, Leonard, Plymouth; Harvey and Miles, Shelby; and Duane, at home, and his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Mae Sourwine.

In the absence of Luther R. Board, the Board of Public Affairs conducted a short meeting Monday night devoting much of its time to discussion of its various problems.

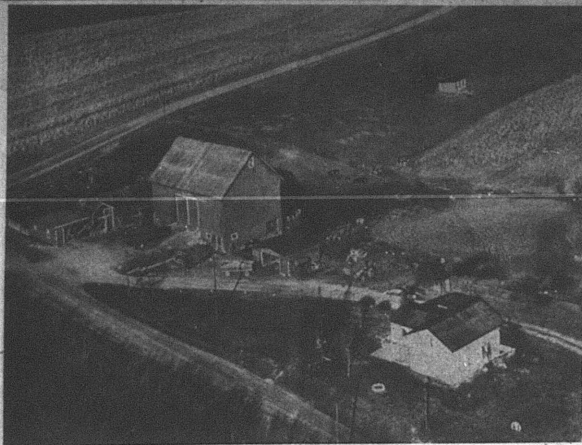
Authority was given to Russell Meiser to discontinue water meters to householders who do not have meters. There are now a few users in the village

Purchase of sand and gravel for the filter bed at the waterplant was planned. R. L. Simpson, addition to the Board, estimates it will cost \$1 per cubic foot for the materials, which will be ap-

proximately \$450 plus labor charges for changing the materials.

During the reading of the clerk's report, it was noted that electrical collections are close to \$200 lower this year than last year: Here, Clerk Carl V. Ellis, pointed out the village has lost 30 water users and 40 sewer accounts during the last few months.

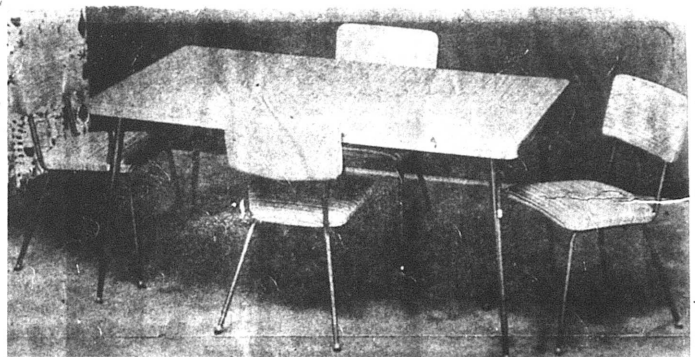

Mrs. Average Housewife has small notion of what goes into single stalk of celery

Mrs. Average Housewife in Columbus doesn't give a thought to what goes into that bunch of crisp, white celery she buys in her 1½ city supermarket.

But a peek into the washing shed on the Fred Van Zoest farm is worth the pains.

FOR YOU CAN SEE HOW careful these spotless folks are with the comestibles for milady's table.

When the celery is picked — and this is the season for it — it goes into boxes, whence it's taken to be lopped or cut, so the root stock is served from the stem.

Then it's immersed in a vat of clear water, so the rich, black muck dirt of Celeryville will be soaked from it.

Finally, a hand — and this week it was Joanna Van Zoest,

an eighth grader in Celeryville school come fall — passes the celery through a mechanical washer.

HERE, ON AN ENDLESS carriage that revolves slowly, the celery undergoes a three-pronged pressure bath. Pure water at 300 pounds the square inch pressure squirts out in jets from atop, beneath and the side of the celery stalk.

This flushes the last bits of dirt from the marketable product. One last bath in deep water and the celery is packed into boxes, about 48 stalks to the box.

THENCE IT'S LOADED IN trucks and hauled to Columbus — the Van Zoests are Columbus marketers, but it could well be anywhere else — and jobbers or

retailers buy it for household consumption.

It's not all milk and honey, this raising of celery. The casual observer thinks otherwise, but does so wrongly, say the Van Zoests.

Plant parasites and diseases need to be controlled. Among these are nematodes.

If a nematode were to grow in the last cycle of his existence at the same rate as he does in the first, you'd need several St. George's on horseback, with swords 16 feet long, to slay them.

RAIN DOESN'T STOP ACTI- vities on a vegetable farm. Monday, despite a mild downpour, field hands were picking onions.

And year in and year out, 365 days a year, there're children to look after. Youngest, a handsome

blonde named Bette, only four, is at the bottom of the list. They stretch up to Newage, employee of Peoples National bank here, and stop off at such as John, eight, Joanna, 13 and include an intending nurse to enroll in September at Grand Rapids, Mich.

THIS IS A NEAT, CARE- fully planned operation that only sometimes goes off the tracks.

"When your help fails you," say the Van Zoests, "you've got to step in yourself."

All of the Van Zoests can do that. But never on Sunday, the Lord's day, which they respect as such.

"If you can't do enough in six days a week," the Van Zoests seem to reason, "you can't get anywhere by working on the seventh."

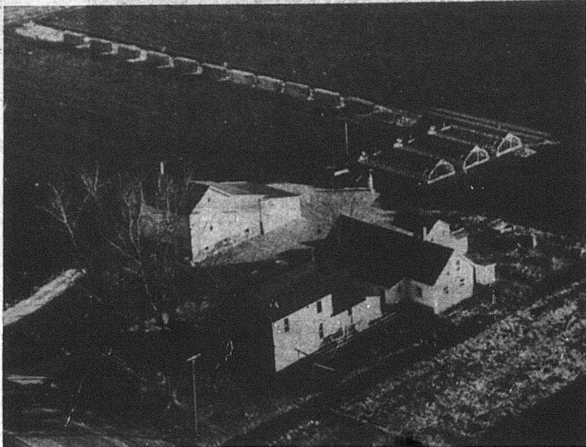

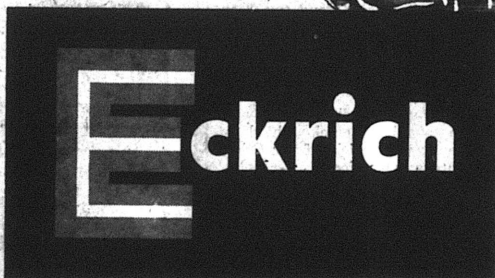
