Flash rains pour into cellars as damage figure rises here

Rainfall measured at 2.1 inches fell here Thursday, inundating farms as far as Celeryville, producing highest flood line recalled in this region in 50 years, and drowning a score of basements.

Highest water in the village was reported by the Horace Goldsmiths in Trux street. Assistance of the local civil defense unit was required to pump their basement more or less dry of three feet of water.

es recorded severe damage to the basement, including appliances on display in the principal show room there.

Don's Shoe & Harness shop reported nine inches of water in the basement, damaging leather stocks and rubber footwear laid in for the fall season.

CELERYVILLE FARMERS wrote off a late radish crop be of flood waters. Losses were variously estimated at between \$35,000 and \$60,000.

On the Sidelines

By THE OLD TIMER

Slang expressions in baseball are now so much a part of the nomenclature of the game that it's worthwhile to inquire into their origin. A fan sent us these, which have since been verified by research with the curator of the baseball museum at Cooperstown, N.Y.

Let's take a look at some of the mand see where they started.

BULLPEN—In the old days, there appeared in all big league park huge signs advertising "Bull Durham" tobacco. These signs usually were plastered on the fences in the deepest right and left field corners where the relief pitchers warmed up during a game. Thus the "Bulpen."

SOUTHPAW—Since most of the baseball parks, in the old days as now, faced due west or southwest (from pitcher's box to home plate), a left-handed pitcher would be serving from the south and a right-hander from the north. A writer, apparently seeking to add to baseball lingo, referred to a left-handed pitcher as a "southpaw." The term gradually caught on and became part of baseball terminology.

AT BAT, ON DECK, IN THE HOLD—In 1872, the great Boston team of the National Association of Baseball Players journeyed to the village of Belfast on the Maine coast to engage in an exhibition game. As practically every male resident of the town was a fisherman or a seafarer, their language bristled with nautical terms. Because no scorecards were issued, the official scorer, a Belfast man and a seagaling fellow, bellowed each batter's name as he stepped to the plate. At the same time he would announce the next two men to bat, in this manner:

"Mr. Spaulding at bat, Mr. Cal McVey on deck, Mr. Jim White in the hold."

And so it was that three of baseball's best known phrases came into being.

HOT CORNER—The expression was coined by a Cincinnati sports writer following a game in that city in which the home team third sacker was almost torn apart by seven line drives, each waist high and hit with terrific force and each marking the third out of an inning. In describing it in his story the reporter wrote: "The Brooklyn had Old Hick on the 'hot corner' all afternoon and it's a miracle he wasn't murdered."

SHUTOUT—Baseball is indebted to the horse set for this one. In the issue of July 3, 1879 a baseball reporter of the Troy, N. Y. Times wrote: "The Troys have at last been whitewashed... shutout" as the horsemen say. Until then a shutout was called a "Chicago" because the first no-run game was tossed by a Chicago pitcher.

SEVENTH INNING STRETCH—The practice was begun as far back 1869, not in 1910 as is popularly believed. It is supposed to have originated in 1910 during a game in Pittsburgh when U.S. President Howard Taft stood up and stretched. The crowd, thinking the Chief Executive was about to leave, stood up out of respect for the nation's head. Actually it was done back in 1869,

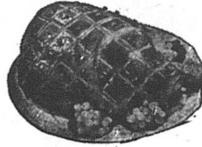

Editorials Are Paper's Duty, Editor Asserts

But More Than 200 Dailies Have Stopped

CHARLOTTEVILLE, Va.—Is the editorial page necessary? More than 200 dailies in the United States don't think so and have stopped carrying editorials completely, the editor of the Richmond News Leader told delegates to the Virginia Press Assn.'s annual seminar on writing here.

James Jackson Kilpatrick said two of the original reasons for the existence of the editorial page—serving as a political party organ and furthering political ambitions of the publisher—had largely disappeared.

But Mr. Kilpatrick declared the editorial page "can be the soul and personality of the newspaper. Here the editor meets his reader. He becomes an eagerly awaited friend, or a bitterly hated antagonist."

The newspaper "has a holy and essential obligation" to present intelligent and stimulating editorials, Mr. Kilpatrick said.

Colgate W. Darden Jr., president of the University of Virginia, was another seminar speaker.

He said the vast amount of news today imposes a substantial burden upon those who are gathering it and interpreting it. He noted that freedom of the press is vital in a

Most Newspapers Write 'Up,' Editor Believes

SYRACUSE, N.Y.—Some of the problems of the modern newspaper were explained to educators attending a "workshop for educators" here co-sponsored by Syracuse University and the International Circulation Managers Assn.

The speaker was Vincent S. Jones, executive editor of the Gannett Newspapers.

"Whether you like it or not," said Mr. Jones, "monopoly is the predominant fact of modern newspaper life. And whether editors and publishers like it or not, the fact is that this condition is converting most newspapers into semi-public utilities."

"One dividend of monopoly has been a sense of responsibility. It is a harsh editor, indeed, who denies access to his columns to even the most dreadful bore or proven crackpot. His newspaper sometimes may seem to strike a deadly mediating balance of fairness and wisdom, but the chances are that it reflects the true character of the community."

"The average newspaper prints a great deal more of important news than the readers actually want, or will read. Instead of 'playing down' to public taste and indifference, some of the best brains in the business are devoting their writing and editorial skills to making this news more loving and, in effect, constantly nudging the reader upward."

"The editor," he told educators attending the two-week workshop, "have felt keenly that many readers were victims of misunderstanding or misinformation, unfairly critical of them and their product, and that this was

The significant fact, we think, is that newspapers generally—and the weekly press in particular—are constantly improving.

The public gets a better product in these ways:

1. Mechanically and artistically, it is a sharper, clearer job of production.

2. Editorially, it does a better job of covering the news. Photographic journalism is now within the reach of every newspaper. Those which are published without consistent photographic coverage are simply not doing the job they can do.

3. It discharges its duty to inform and to interpret better than it did. This is partly attributable to the fact that newspapering is becoming a profession, with professional people trained to produce newspapers. In the community newspaper field, more and more newspapermen, as distinguished from printers, are obtaining management control. Re-

These changes are not without opposition, especially in smaller communities, where change comes slowly.

When the last-minute notice of a card party at Mrs. Doakes is omitted in favor of an editorial about schools, Mrs. Doakes and some of her friends are angry. They resent the suggestion that schools may be more important than a card party.

People are still news, and we intend to keep it that way. But it is the newspaper's duty to comment on local affairs, to lead and to inform the public, to give praise when it is due and to criticize when necessary.

This is our concept of a newspaper's duty, and we intend to persist in this notion.

At the same time, as we get set to mark our 105th anniversary, we mean to bend every effort to produce a superior newspaper, worthy of that title, and of its colleagues whose excellence is universally acclaimed and acknowledged.

WE OCCASIONALLY FIND IN THE MAIL a pointed hint. This one came this week from an old friend, who clipped it from the Denver, Colo. Post:

"Since Sputnik flew, Americans have been trying to find out what is wrong with American education and what to do with it. As often happens when we attack a national problem much of our collective effort has degenerated into a search for scapegoats. We have blamed progressive education, poor school administration, underpaid teachers, crowded classrooms, and a raft of other things, most of them with some justification.

"What we often fail to appreciate, however, is how much our schools reflect the world around them. To put it another way, the quality of education depends as much on what goes on outside the school as what happens inside.

"The partial answer to what's wrong can be found by a king of mental looking in the mirror. Here's a starter:

"Complaint: Johnny can't read. Question: Do any adults around your house show any enthusiasm for reading by being frequently seen with a book in their hands?

"Complaint: Johnny is a conformist, doesn't want to excel or be different from his schoolmates. Question: Has he been given any reason to believe his family thinks or act differently from the Smiths down the block?

"Complaint: Johnny isn't interested in science and arithmetic. Question: Is anybody at your house?

"This kind of mental exercise may improve more people than just Johnny."

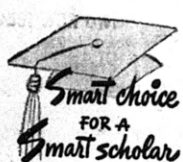

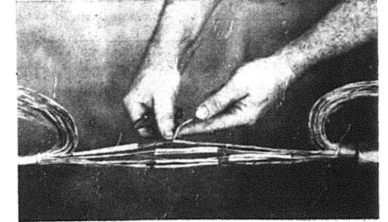

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Betty Zane, one of the heroines of the Ohio Country frontier, made her contribution to our history at the siege of Fort Henry (now Wheeling, W.Va.) in September 1777.
A sister of Col. Ebenezer Zane, Elizabeth Zane volunteered to obtain a supply of powder to continue the fight against the Indians and British from Detroit.

To the surprise of the besiegers, she ran out of the fort to her brother's house nearby and successfully returned with a keg of powder, carried loose in a tablecloth, all the while under fire from the attackers.
This statue to Betty Zane in Martins Ferry across from Wheeling, on U.S. Route 7, stands today in honor of her memory.
