Warriors play at Black River

THE WARRIORS WILL GO to Spencer to play the Black River Pirates in a North Central conference battle. Game time is 2 p. m. EST.

The Pirates were impressive in their opener with LaGrange Saturday, which they won, 16 to 8.

But they waited until the latter stages of the contest to make that impression.

IN THE FIRST PERIOD, the Pirates lost possession twice on interceptions and once on a fumble, each time deep in their own territory, but managed to be strong enough to hold off the Wildcats.

Late in the second quarter, the Pirates recovered a fumble on the Wildcat 15. Larry Haswell, an exciting plunging back at 185, in two plays was at the five, from where John Nagy ran it in.

Tom Davenport, who's always a threat, has his throwing arm in shape. He was under wraps in this one, owing to the presence of two enemy scouts, Coaches Ben Speckhalke of Lodi and Tom Rackets of Westfield.

THE PIRATES FRANKLY expect to down Plymouth by a comfortable margin. Phil the Filbert gives them only an eight or 10-point advantage, however.

As for the Warriors, Dayton Reed is out with a bad cold. An otherwise healthy squad will make the trip.

Quarterback troubles continue to plague the locals. What Pettit would do about them remains to be seen. He's worked hard on defense, but no less hard on the offense. Coach Pettit refused to comment on a report from the practice field that Billy Strine is to be sent to the important spot.

If Haswell, Nagy and Davenport get going early, it could be a rout on Saturday. Signs are, however, that it will be less so.

He is the son of the Milton Lynches, Shelby route 3, a letter winner in baseball, and an outstanding vocational agriculture student.

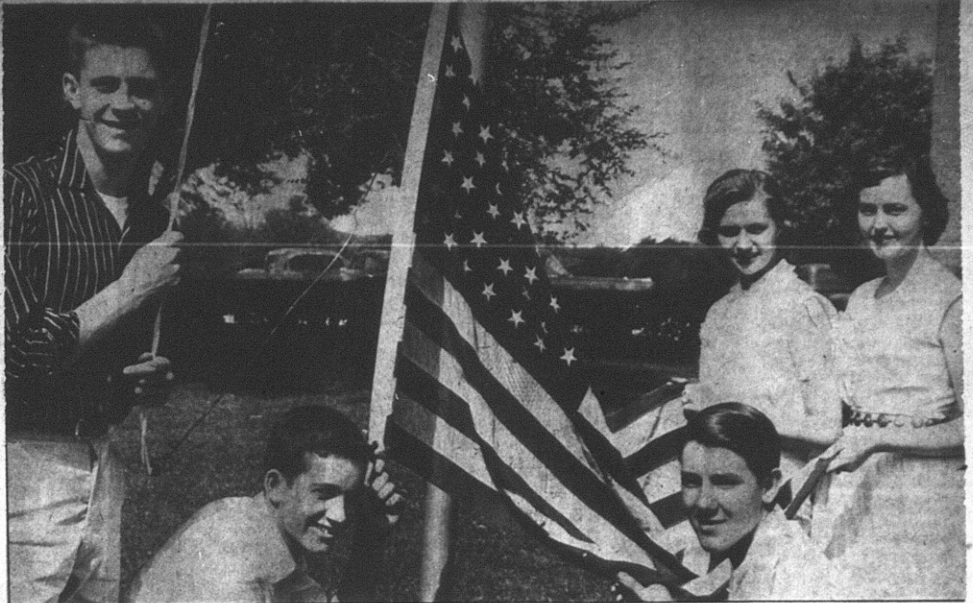

A LIABILITY INSURANCE policy has been obtained to protect spectators in Mary Fale park, Supt. M. J. Coon told the board.

No new development have occurred in the \$25,000 bond mix-up at Shiloh, the board was told. Squire, Sanders & Dempsey, bonding attorneys representing the board, say that a declaratory judgment must be sought by First National Bank of Mansfield to determine whether the bonds can be validated. The bank is willing to undertake such litigation, but only at the board's expense.

Negotiations between the board and the bank are still going on.

On verbal petition of half a dozen parents, Plymouth Board of Education Thursday night hired a bus driver of 15 years' tenure. Edwin McBride's contract was not renewed. The parents complained of reckless and heedless driving. The board was told McBride had been warned by administrative officers of the school several times.

What brought the move to a head now was a report that a child's nose was broken because she was flung against a seat when the bus was halted abruptly. This, apparently, was McBride's way of disciplining occupants of the bus.

REED NOBLE WAS HIRED in McBride's place. Salaries for other bus drivers were set as follows: Paul Kranz, Don Barnes and Chester Van Scoy, \$100 monthly; Hobart (Kid) Garrett, Lyle Hamman and William Van Wagner, \$120.

Noble's wages will be determined after his route time has been fixed.

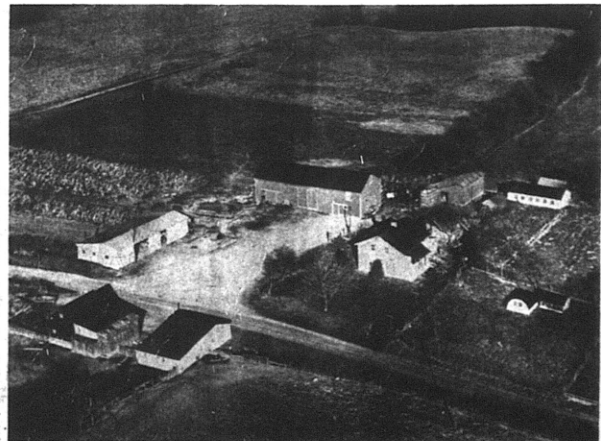
At 8, both organizations will conduct separate business meetings.

A gift of \$35,000 by Mr. and Mrs. John F. Ernsthausen of Norwalk will enable the Norwalk City Hospital association to complete remodeling plans to convert the old Norwalk hospital into a convalescent home.

Remodeling is expected to be completed by Nov. 20.

Warriors disregard fundamentals, drop opener to Gibsonburg, 30 to 8

With deep disregard for the fundamentals of the game, Plymouth's Warriors were savagely clawed by Gibsonburg's Golden Bears before 500 fans in Mary Faye park Friday night.

The final score, 30 to 8, only partly indicated the superiority of the visitors, who out-charged, out-tackled, out-ran and out-smarted the Plymouth eleven.

THEY DID SO WITH A MINIMUM of substitutions until late in the fourth period, chiefly under the command of Andy Ruggiero, a senior quarterback, who ran for two touchdowns himself and set up four others, two of which were called back.

The visitors broke the ice midway in the first period. After Weigman returned Dick Akers' Bears began to move. Only a fumble by Joe Mathna in the shadow of the Plymouth goal posts stopped them.

Plymouth returned the courtesy five plays later. Phil Jones carried from the Warrior 25 to the 12 but the Bears were penalized five yards. Ruggiero tossed to Larry Fehlhaber for a first down on the Warrior seven, whereupon the Bear quarterback rolled out to his left for the score. The punch for conversion was not successful.

If there was a bright spot in the whole contest, it came on the next play.

RUGGIERO KICKED OFF and the ball kicked deep into Plymouth territory. Dick Akers picked it up on his 16 and threaded his way behind sturdy downfield blocking along the south sideline 84 yards for a touchdown.

It was a thing of beauty, and when Dan Carter sneaked in for pickup, the conversion, the two-point lead gave rise to hope the hope might be upset.

But it was not to be. In the second quarter, after Carter's fumble — the second of four such losses — Ruggiero eluded four tacklers, each of whom had hands on him, and sped 24 yards for the second score.

Jones plunged for the point after touchdown.

The Bears never were in trouble thereafter. Plymouth tackling broke down and there was no primary defense. Eighty-two per cent of the tackles were made in the secondary and tertiary in the second half.

Offensively the Warriors sputtered and showed inconsistency in blocking.

EARLY IN THE THIRD canto, Billy Strine punted to Ruggiero on the Bear 15. That doughty fellow ran it back 25 yards. From this point the Bears marched in 12 plays for a third touchdown, scored by the flanker Jones from four yards out. Ruggiero

passed to Fehlhaber for the conversion.

It was only two minutes until Gibsonburg was in the Plymouth end zone for the last time.

Duane Utis fumbled on his own 21. The Bears recovered and in six plays had a touchdown, this time by Mathna. Jack Belcher took a pass from Ruggiero for the conversion.

The Gibsonburg was as soundly coached and drilled eleven as Plymouth fans have seen since 11-man football was installed here. In Ruggiero and Jones, the Bears have two backs whose deceptive ball-handling and speed would win them places on almost any Class A team.

But it was in the forward wall where the Bears won the game. They consistently charged low and hard and opened vast holes that required little or no evasiveness to penetrate.

A substantial crowd drove the 65 miles from the Sandusky county town to support the Bears and the Gibsonburg band, led by half a dozen juvenile Marilyn Monroes, put on a half-time show.

If the Plymouth team could match its band in precision and excellence, its coach would have few worries. The red-and-white clad aggregation comported itself with favor and approval during its brief performance.

Stockmasters avoid painting, build in brick

After nearly 20 years of marriage, the Theodore Stockmasters, who live in Egypt road, Greenfield township, decided to build a house.

And when they did so, says Ted Stockmaster, "we built one out of brick — I was darned if I'd be bothered with painting."

THE STOCKMASTERS have lived in this tidy, comfortable one-floor plan home heated by electricity since June 6. If there is a more pleasant home in more attractive surroundings in all of Greenfield township, you'll have to show where it is.

The house lies in the south half of a 141-acre spread on two sides of the road. Only 80 acres of the

land are arable. Down the center of it runs a ravine, glacial in origin, and in its bottom flows a rivulet that never runs dry.

Not within the memory of man has the ravine ever flooded for more than 30 minutes except by design.

Time was when the ravine was a mill race. In the south portion of the Stockmaster place you can still see where the foot-thick timbers lay to dam up the water and provide a head of pressure to float timbers and turn a mill wheel. But it's almost 100 years since a mill operated there.

THE STOCKMASTERS keep a tidy, neat place. The buildings bespeak care, constant work and

In them they keep about 130 head of chickens — egg prices aren't bad, 45 cents the dozen in job — and 30-odd head of Corriedale sheep. There are a couple of cows with calves and two young steers, which will be butchered for table use later this fall.

Ted Stockmaster has been employed since 1927 by a Willard firm which supplies ice to the Baltimore & Ohio railroad and vegetable growers in Celeryville. And he frankly is not sanguine about the prospects of a revival of the railroad.

"Why, they're laying off men with over 30 years of seniority investment to keep them up, who'll never get their jobs back,"

he observes.

FOR ONE WHO HAS LIVED two generations in Huron county's southern tier of townships, Ted Stockmaster looks to the Donnelley operation in Willard as a hopeful development for the future.

"They'll offer employment to the young folks, and that's good for the town, to keep the young folks in."

Meanwhile, the Stockmasters enjoy life and a new house in Greenfield township, secure in the thought they're set for this generation.

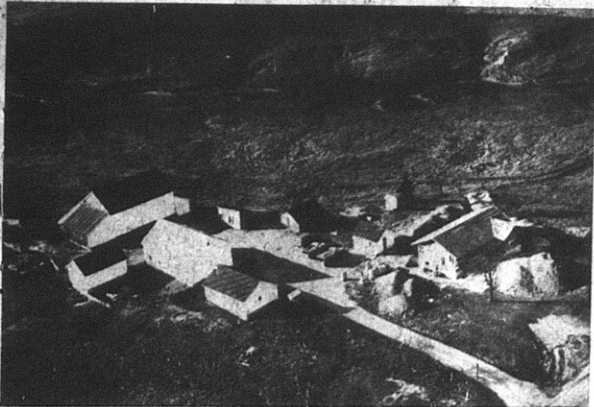
