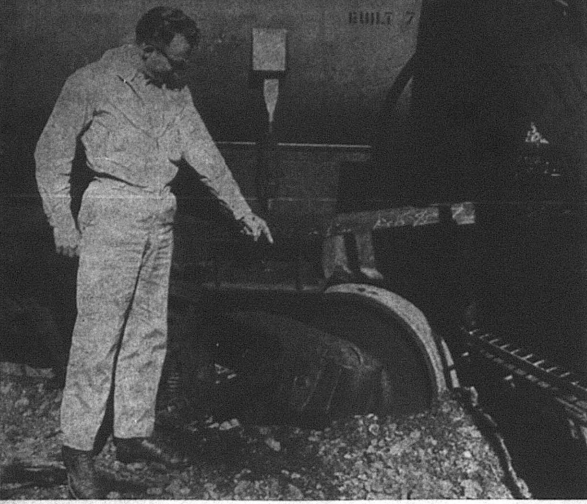

Clyde Lasch dies of acute leukemia

Stricken only three weeks ago with acute leukemia, Clyde Lasch, 38, a barber here for many years, died in University hospital, Columbus, about 9 a. m. Monday.

He had been away from his barber chair only two Saturdays when he died. The illness came upon him suddenly and mysteriously, and he steadily deteriorated after being admitted to the Columbus hospital two weeks ago.

His wife Madeleine, a French girl whom he married when over seas in World War II; two daughters, Jean Ann and Phyllis, and a son, Clyde, Jr., at home; his father, Joseph A. Lasch, his twin sister Mrs. Max Smith, Plymouth route 1, and a brother Joseph J. Lasch, survive.

A graduate of Plymouth High school, where he played basketball, Mr. Lasch served in a medical unit during World War II. He was a member of First Evangelical Lutheran church, of Ebreth-Parsell post, American Legion, and of Plymouth Cub Scout council, which he served as treasurer.

He was widely known and universally liked. His appalling illness and sudden death shocked this village to the toes of its shoes.

Funeral services will be conducted today at 2 p. m. from his church by the Rev. Robert F. Hall, his pastor. Burial will be in Greenlawn cemetery, in charge of McQuate Funeral home.

Effort to upset school decision in November beaten by Saxbe

An apparent effort to upset the right of Plymouth school district voters to decide the fate of the administrative assignment of the public schools was defeated by Attorney General William Saxbe last week.

It came in the form of an advisory opinion to Richland County Prosecutor Theodore Lutz, who appealed to the attorney-general to decide whether the ballot could legally provide for two decisions affecting the same school district.

He said in his petition to the attorney-general that Plymouth school district seeks to cross the county line to join the Huron county system — and ultimately Huron Valley district — while Huron Valley district seeks to annex itself to Willard exempted village district.

HE QUESTIONED WHETHER the two decisions could be made on the same ballot, since they reflect upon the same territory.

Saxbe said in his opinion he could find no obstruction to such action in the statutes and presumably the decisions could be taken at the same time.

Why Lutz should have asked for the decision was unclear. He did not clarify the reasons.

MEANWHILE, PLYMOUTH Board of Education issued a statement appealing for broad, effective support of the three-mill operating levy which would provide about \$27,000 in fresh funds included:

1. About 100 tablet arm chairs in the high school, to replace some equipment that is 75 years old and to provide additional classroom seating.

2. About 75 folding chairs in the high school, to replace some borrowed from the elementary school.

3. About 15 tables for typing classes, which are using unsatisfactory equipment.

4. Six sewing machines to replace out-of-date treadle machines for junior high and high school girls.

5. Large number of desks for Shiloh elementary school. About 30 old desks from country schools were returned to use this year in the emergency.

6. All but desperate need for maps, charts visual aids, science

equipment, notably in physics and chemistry, vocational agriculture and industrial arts equipment.

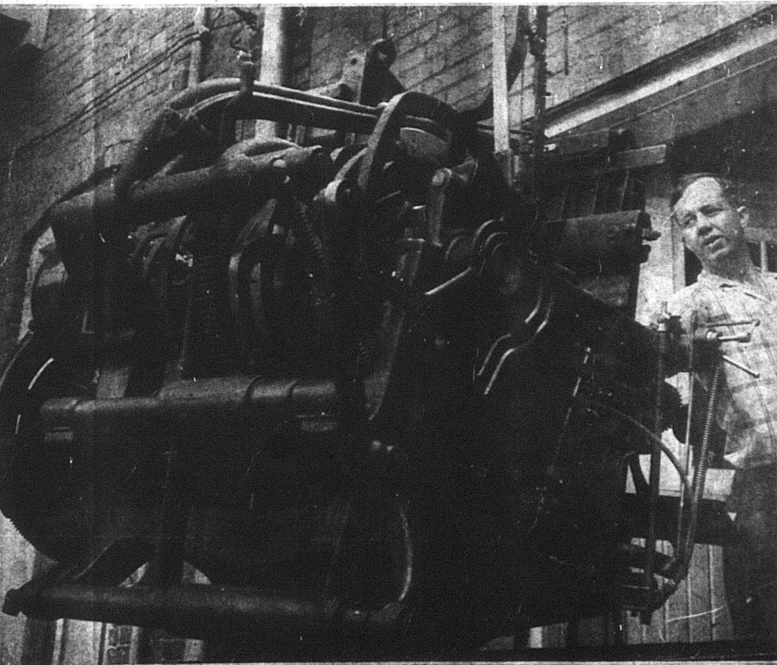

Cub Scouts will resume their regular monthly pack meetings in the elementary school at 7 p. m. today.

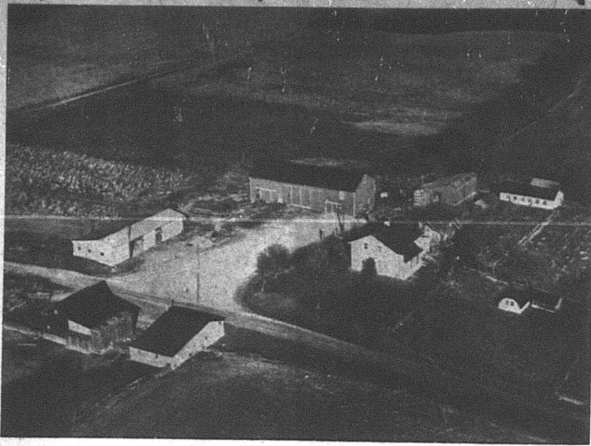
Theme for this month is "Fun-o-Rama" and the pack will present skits in keeping with it.

Gates hill has fond memories of when car was a man's tool

The Albert Gates farm in Bauman road, Greenfield township, marks the site of a favorite testing ground for automobiles of the 1925 vintage.

That was Bauman hill, which has been partly channeled off in recent years. But time was when owners of new cars drove to Bauman hill to see how far they'd go in high gear. It was a favorite pastime of motorists in the '20's, and a mark of favorable performance of one's machine if it's negotiate the hill in high.

THE FREDERICK GATESES occupy the place now. Albert Gates is an uncle of Theodore Stockmaster, whose farm was featured last week.

But Gateeses have lived on the farm for three generations and it's known throughout Greenfield township as the Gates place. Old-timers recall with warmth

the days when of a Sunday afternoon automobile salesmen would have farmers out in demonstration models, inching up and down Bauman hill and another nearby, Glick hill, highest point in Huron county.

BAUMAN HILL — MORE properly Gates hill, because it abuts the Gates property — was once the scene of a friendly wager that developed into a celebrated incident in the common pleas court.

A Norwalk automobile dealer, marketing a lower priced car, boasted his product would equal or surpass any other sold in the county seat. A rival salesman took him up on it, and on a Sunday afternoon in May, 1926, they repaired to Gates hill to test both machines.

It was decided to start the two cars side by side, proceed in low

gear for a specified distance, shift to second gear for another, and then settle in high gear for as far as they could go.

For some yards, the story was told in court (and the witnesses never were quite clear about this), they matched hubs. Then the rival salesman's car inched ahead. Mr. Dealer would have none of this and he pressed the accelerator. He regained what he had lost, and in a fit of glee loudly shouted to the other that he was winning.

HERE THE RIVAL SALESMAN poured the gas to his machine and it shot forward. Steadily it inched up the hill, perhaps four feet ahead of the cheaper car.

Mr. Dealer was again incensed and when he could not catch the rival, he turned sharply into it and both wound up into the ditch.

The case was settled by private agreement after acrimonious arguments had been aired in court.

Judge Luther Van Horn declared he was as amused as he was nettled that such a dispute should reach the courtroom.

TIME HAS PASSED. The hill is not what it once was. Salesmen don't try to prove the hill-climbing abilities of their products any more. Matter of fact a demonstration ride is all but forgotten.

For automobiles today are built and marketed to please women. Yet the Huron river still bubbles along beneath the bridge at the foot of the hill, a reminder perhaps of other water that has long since flowed on, when man was king of the road with his new 19-25 machine.

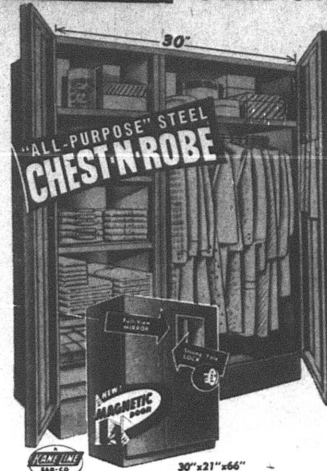

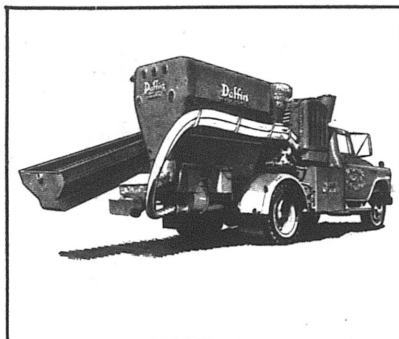

Miss Wilcox sets wedding for fall

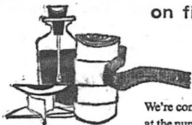

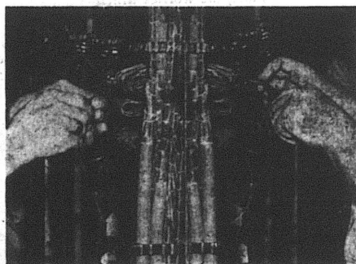

FORT LAURENS

Hostile Indian eyes watched from this hillside as a detachment of 1,000 American soldiers, under command of General McIntosh, cut trees and built Fort Laurens in the fall of 1778.

This stockade, garrisoned by a force of 150 soldiers, was the only American fort in the Ohio country during the Revolutionary War. It was an outpost and road-block defense against the British forces stationed at Detroit.

Several Indian attacks on this fort were repelled by the isolated Colonial soldiers and the fort was abandoned, after serving its purpose, in August, 1779.

Fort Laurens was one of the control points for establishing the cross-state line that divided the Ohio country at the General Wayne peace settlement at Fort Greenville in 1795 that ended the Indian wars on the frontier.

Today this is a State park where countless Ohio families picnic each year. The old Ohio Canal from Cleveland to Portsmouth passed immediately behind the site of Fort Laurens.

Fort Laurens is just off State Route 212 at Bolivar, southwest of Canton.

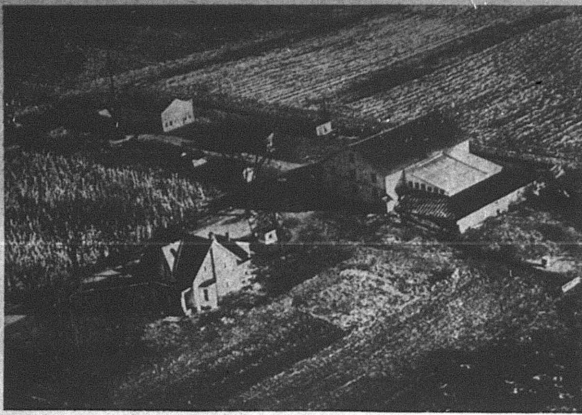

Black River passes swamp Warriors, 42-6

Tom Davenport and Bud Halada played catch with Plymouth's inept defense at Spencer Saturday afternoon and led the Black River Pirates to a 42 to 6 North Central conference victory.

It was a dismal exhibition by the Warriors who showed signs of coming to life only once in the contest. This was during a magnificent sustained drive of 91 yards that wound up with burly Duane Utiss plunging into the end zone from a yard out in the third period.

THE WARRIORS TOOK 21 plays to cover the distance, were helped by a 15-yard unsportsmanlike conduct penalty against Art Wiedrick, and racked up six first downs en route.

But during the first half, and throughout the remainder of the second, the Warriors made every mistake in the book.

The statistics tell a sorry tale of missed tackles, poor blocking, ev-

en a bad pass from center that forced Billy Strine to step out of the end zone to retrieve the ball, resulting in an automatic safety.

The visitors fumbled and lost possession thrice, had a key pass intercepted that led to a touchdown, lost a brilliant 88-yard run for a touchdown on kickoff by an illegal block, and wound up their first half operations with an 11 yard rushing deficit.

HERE IS HOW THE SCORING went:

Despite two penalties, the Pirates moved smartly behind Davenport's throwing arm after the opening kickoff and Larry Haswell hanked in for the TD with two minutes gone. Tom Pifer added the extra point.

Strine stepped out of the end zone to give up a safety.

Black River came back in the next series of downs to score through the air Davenport to Halada, good for 19 yards.

BY NOW DEEP INTO THE second period, the Warriors seemed defenseless against the big 210-pound Pirate end. In two minutes he scored again, this time with a 23-yard heave from Davenport.

The Warrior drive, quarterbacked by Dan Carter and featuring tremendous drive off tackle by Utiss, followed.

The last period was complete rout. Bill Benford rounded end for 18 yards Davenport bootlegged for 27 yards and Benford converted, and Tom Johnson, who

played at Lodi last year, pounded in from the three for three quick touchdowns.

Coach Lew Pettit wasn't kidding himself after the game. He frankly admitted his hopes had been higher prior to the Black River contest. "I'll go one more week in an effort to snap 'em out of it, but believe me, if those upper classmen don't play football at Seville we'll forget all about this season and build for next year with the green kids."

On the Sidelines

By THE OLD TIMER

What's the matter with the Warriors?

Nothing, replies their coach, that some hard tackling and a little snap won't cure.

Admittedly, the grasp of fundamentals hasn't been strong with the squad this season. Part of the trouble is that many of the players are green, inexperienced. Some of them never played football, even in backyards or on corner lots, when they were younger.

But it's not to say they haven't been told what to do, or shown how to do it.

THE COACH IMPLIES HE considers some of the experienced hands have turned prima donna. "Tight Hubbard" he calls it. One of them he told us confidentially, hasn't played a good game of football since he was a yearling.

It is difficult for a coach to enforce discipline of the right call with such a small squad.

Pettit had 25 men in uniform for the Black River game. This is about 10 percent of the enrollment, about 17 per cent of the male enrollment. This is ridiculous. With half the enrollment, Black River had 50 per cent more in uniform.

WERE PETTIT TO BENCH some of the laggards, he wouldn't have enough to play a game, since the younger boys are light, green and unable to stand the gaff over long periods.

But benching may be what's required. Leadership entrusted to older hands has not been what it ought to be. Line play is demoralized and disorganized. Young Duane Swartz has played

well and so has Dennis McGinnis some of the time. But of the others the less said the better.

TOMORROW'S FRAY AT Seville could very well be costly. With Doug McQuate out for the season, Dick Akers down for at least a week and Dayton Reed out for the year, Pettit's forces are hardly at satisfactory strength.

Nobody expects miracles. These players were sized up early in the season as green, inexperienced, somewhat deficient as to speed. But it is not too much to expect they should show respect for what they have been taught and to follow orders. To defeat Seville is hardly possible; to make a respectable showing, to play sound football, is the demand of the backers of the team, and the obligation of every player.
