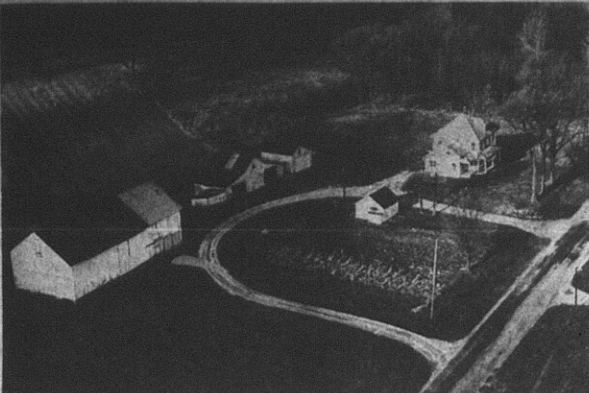

Not pigs, or from Guinea: they're cavies

The guinea pig isn't a pig and it didn't come from Guinea, says a Plymouth route 1 farm wife who's got 250 of them, and it isn't true that if you pick 'em up by the tail the eyes'll fall out.

But take it from Mrs. Bert Hunter, who speaks with five years of experience of looking after as many as 700 of the restless, grumbling little rodents, they're interesting, relatively easy to take care of, and a darned sight more profitable than rabbits.

The real name of the guinea pig is cavy. Scientific name: Cavia cobaya. It's a member of the rabbit and hare families, being covered with hair, having two long incisor teeth extending from the upper jaw, impinging on two tiny incisors in the lower jaw, reproducing at a rate that defies comparison.

These talents are what make the little beasts so valuable to science. Females reproduce about three times a year, Mrs. Hunter says, and carry their young 65 days.

THE SMALL CAVIES ARE

born alive, about four to a litter, eyes open, in a nest hastily constructed by their mother. They exceed the infant rabbit in size and motor ability at birth. Their skins are covered with hair and while the babies will nurse from their mothers, they will also take vegetable nourishment at once. Cavies — well, guinea pigs — do not eat meat, vermin or non-vegetal food matter.

Mrs. Hunter's adults — she lets 12 does run in a pen or cage with a single boar, whose servability kind of wears out by the time he's two — are husky, active animals.

"They're easy to feed, we just give them these commercial pellets specially made for guinea pigs," she asserts, "and I add Vitamin C supplement to their water, especially in the winter when they can't get leafy green things to eat."

And, believe it or not, aside from their proclivity to procreate, the cavies are a clean meat dry and easy to manage. Cavies are habitually cleanly in their persons.

At about three and a half weeks, a batch of guinea pigs

is ready for market.

WHERE TO? RIGHT NOW, Mrs. Hunter sends her guinea pigs-for-market to a Tiffin jobber. He distributes them to hospitals and laboratories throughout Ohio and Michi- gan.

Confined as they are in cages perhaps four feet long by three feet wide, and running at least 11 and sometimes 30 to the pen, aren't they subject to disease?

"I've been told that guinea pigs are subject to pneumonia, but — knock on wood — I haven't had any yet," she ex- plains. "But you have to be careful with them. So long as you give them adequate food and water and keep them warm, I think they're all right."

To prevent the respiratory ailment that could wipe her out, Mrs. Hunter maintains barn temperatures in the guinea pig room at 50 degrees Fahrenheit, "when I can. Some- times it drops below that and I worry about them. That's

Monroeville mayor pays for Yule 'bonus' hams

Mayor Clayton C. Lord of Monroeville paid for \$45 worth of Christmas hams for employees of the village after the village clerk declined to approve an official voucher for payment.

"Effort has been made in the past," says the Monroeville Spectator of Jan. 8, "to give Christmas gifts to employees from village funds. In each instance the state examiners have held such spending of village funds to be illegal. Money received by the village cannot be spent for anything but village expenses."

(Ed. Note: The "Christmas bonus" given to employees of the Village of Plymouth, totalling nine in all, was approved over the objection of Village Solicitor Joseph F. Dush. It was dealt with as an end-of-year increase in salary, obviously a euphemism for "Christmas bonus".)

REVOCATION OF THE temporary charters of North Fairfield and Greenwich High schools was held likely Monday as the state board of education convened to consider lifting of charters of almost a

dozen schools. James P. Lavey, Milan, 13th district member of the state board, told a North Fairfield civic group "in my opinion the charters will not be renewed. I cannot support the renewal of the charters without a concerted effort being made by both communities for consolidation."

A state inspector found 17 deficiencies in the North Fairfield school, only slightly fewer at Greenwich.

A \$780,000 bond issue for a new high school has twice been defeated in South-Central district.

Revocation of the charters means pupils will receive no credit for their studies and cannot obtain admission to colleges or universities.

LICENSING OF BICYCLES seems certain in Greenwich, the Greenwich Enterprise-Review reports. An ordinance so providing has been passed on second reading. Inspection for adequate brakes, horn or bell and safety equipment and a knowledge of safety laws will be conditions precedent for issuance of a license. Annual fee: 50 cents.

Mrs. Bushey, child escape severe injury when car overturns en route from Shelby

why I have these high wattage lamps on all over the room, to keep it warm."

THE CAVY CAME TO EUROPE from South America — the Guianas, Bolivia and Brazil, specifically — in the 16th century. It was a novelty animal until laboratory technicians discovered late in the 19th century that its life cycle, frequency of breeding, ease of propagation, and relative small size were ideal for controlled scientific research.

Time was when scientists, in researching the teachings of the Austrian friar, Gregor Mendel, who discovered the influence of genes in heredity, employed guinea pigs to develop fixed theories of dominance and recessiveness in genes.

In guinea pigs, for example, they found that black fur is dominant over white, and that short hair is dominant over long.

"But they don't do that any more," Mrs. Hunter explains. "They're not interested in what color they are, only if they're lively and healthy."

Which explains, in part, why Mrs. Hunter's herd of guinea pigs are of the English variety — with a smooth coat and in all colors, solid browns, whites and blacks and parti-colors. Fanciers breed the Abyssinian, with a rough coat arranged

in cowlicks or rosettes; the Angora, with smooth, soft long hair, and the Peruvian, with long hair in rosettes. 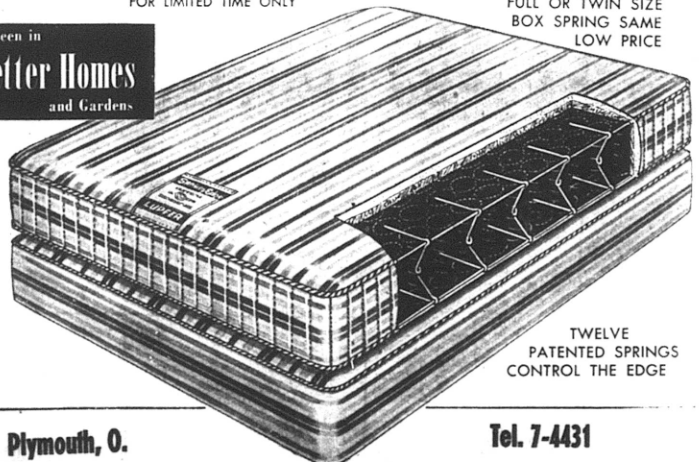
