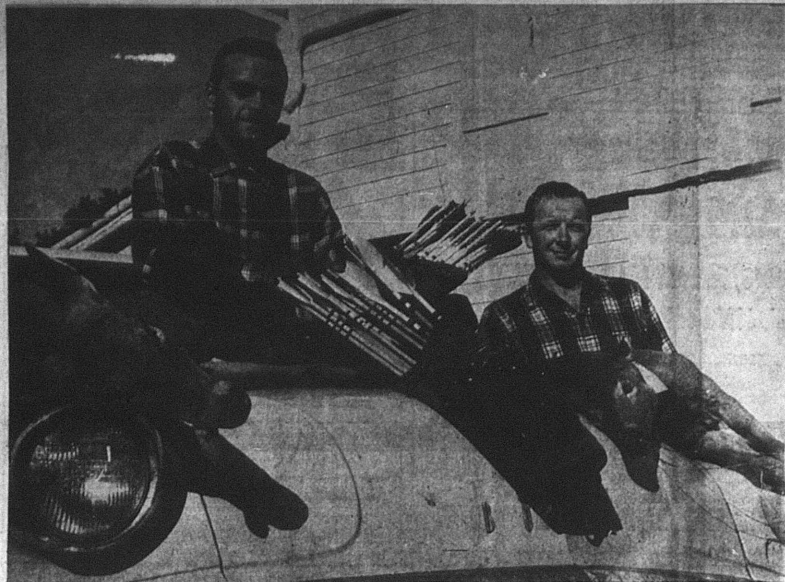

Plymouth underdog at Lodi

Lodi's pennant-bound Tigers, scared out of a year's growth by Berlin Heights last week, will be hosts to Plymouth in their annual Homecoming game at Richman field, Lodi, this week.

The Tigers are favored by at least three touchdowns over the up-and-down visitors.

Rumors were thick this week that Coach Lew Pettit, peeved with his first string for letting him down against injury-mangled Seville, will start the scrubs, who showed well in the final period against the Barbers.

BUT HELL HAVE TO come up with more than that to upset the Lodi apocryph, which seems well on the road to its first undefeated, untied season in history.

Pettit was on hand Saturday when Lodi barely squeaked

through over Berlin Heights and implies he "learned something about Lodi". To this Coach Ben Spechalke answers, "We'll play a better ball game against Plymouth than we showed against Berlin Heights. But I don't want to take a thing away from Berlin Heights — they played a terrific game, especially on defense."

From signs so far, it'll have to be a ground game. Neither team has shown well in the air although Lodi has needed an air attack less than Plymouth.

The pressure, if any, is clearly upon Lodi, which has an undefeated record to maintain. Plymouth isn't going anywhere, and if being relaxed is any help, the Big Red ought to have this advantage.

IF THE VISITORS CAN hold the score down to under 20, it'll be a moral victory for

them. Berlin Heights had one try at the infamous Sing Sing shift, made famous by the late Alabama Pitts when he played for the prison team at Ossining, N.Y. The center and quarterback scurry from the huddle toward the ball, the remaining nine dash to the sideline and form a flying wedge. The quarterback pitches out to the fullback, secure behind eight unguarded blockers, who seeks big yardage.

It fizzled Saturday, because the fullback stepped out of bounds.

Lodi'll be watching for this one. But Phil the Filbert said Monday, "It figures that Plymouth will be trying harder, but so will Lodi. Only way to cut down the horses is shoot 'em and that's forbidden by the OHSAA. On form, then, I pick Lodi by three TD's."

The Enderbys are staying temporarily with her mother, Mrs. Scott Hartz.

The loss was fully covered by insurance.

Fazio implies plank of another industry

New industry upon which to build steady growth is a plank in his platform, William Fazio candidate for mayor, implies in a statement to The Advertiser this week.

His statement, all but verbatim, follows:

"As a lifelong resident of this community, I have grown increasingly interested in its affairs and because I share the same feelings as many of the voters, availed myself of the opportunity to become a candidate for mayor.

"For many years I have observed . . . that little has been done toward expansion and growth . . . the village of Plymouth has made no really noticeable progress in the past 25 to 30 years. We still have but one industry, and during this period have seen only two new business buildings, one new street, one new school building and possibly 30 new homes. The fire station, such as it is, remains the same. So do the police station and jail, the municipal offices and the sewer system, and until recently the water extension program was stifled, all of which are not typical of a progressively thriving community."

"Those communities that plan for future development and growth will survive with the fittest, but those that merely sit back and wait for better things will not survive.

"New industries, new businesses, good schools and expanding residential districts form the nucleus of a progressive community . . . More industry means more jobs for local inhabitants and more money to be spent in local businesses. More jobs and more money would attract other businesses that would give us a selection of the goods we need at lower cost . . . the lower cost of living and improved economy would then ease the burden caused by taxation necessary in support of bigger and better schools and other services to which the public is entitled.

"The village has done well considering the limitations forced upon it by the limited budget . . . which this year approximates \$36,000. Most, if not all, will be expended for current operations and expenses. If I am correct, there was no allowance for expansion or growth, leaving much to be desired in that respect for the next year.

"I am certain that the majority of the public would appreciate and enjoy all the good services a thriving community would afford. With the proper support of the voters, these things could also become realities."

Fazio said he would have specific recommendations to make later, but in ample time for them to be discussed publicly.

Dinner date set

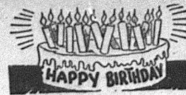

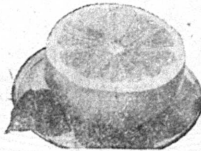

It's time to give --- give plenty

It's Community chest time again. This newspaper was instrumental in encouraging and organizing the chest and isn't bashful about taking some of the credit for it.

Yet, as the chest starts its third year, we would hope for some important changes.

First, a broader base seems called for. The ludicrous situation by which funds allocated to the Salvation Army and appropriated for local disbursement by a local committee can't be applied to school pupils who don't live in Plymouth but attend Plymouth schools needs correction.

It isn't logical or right that chest funds should be given to the high school band, which has a number of non-Plymouth pupils in it, but denied to needy children for eyeglasses, shoes and such.

The chest ought to be expanded to the entire school district and efforts made to extend its services throughout the district.

Second, more local agencies should be brought into the chest so that the burden of support falls more equitably upon all contributors. Right now the businessman supports the chest. Without substantial contributions by half a dozen businesses, here, the chest would founder.

School activities ought to be brought into the chest. The yearbook, in particular, and perhaps some other activities, seem appropriate for this. This week, high school pupils are soliciting advertising at stiff rates for the yearbook. As one businessman said, "It isn't the ad you take in it that counts, it's the ad you DON'T take."

He's right. If school activities were included in the chest, these

advantages would obtain:

1. The ridiculous situation of the public schools competing with the businessman who's their main support would be eliminated.

2. The schools would have an opportunity to concentrate upon their major function -- education -- instead of dissipating their forces upon such activities as supervision of advertising solicitors.

3. Business houses could afford to increase the size of their contributions to the chest.

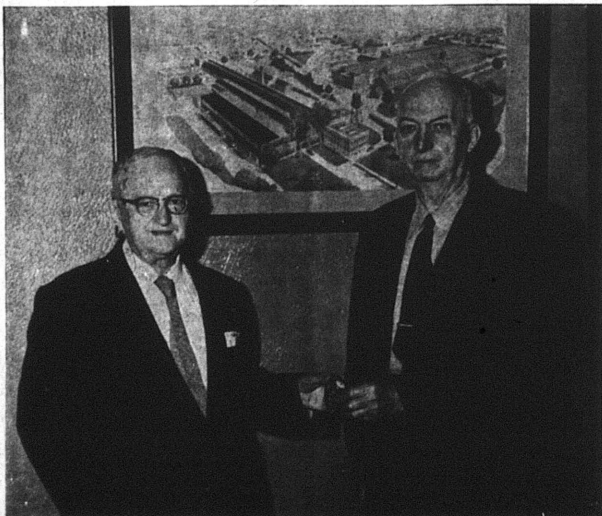
4. The chest's support would become more democratic -- more citizens could be brought within its scope of contribution.

We've heard some talk that the goal this year is too high. Frankly, we think it's too low. There is no reason why it shouldn't be \$6,000 if all of the agencies seeking funds locally were included within its jurisdiction.

The official title of the thing is "Plymouth Community chest" and it ought to be just that -- supported by and speaking for the Plymouth community, which to our way of thinking reaches to the edge of the Plymouth watershed, more or less. It doesn't stop at the corporation line.

We call upon the board of directors to give serious consideration to these suggestions and to explain to the public, in due time, the results of its deliberations.

But let nobody think that because we find what we think are shortcomings with the chest that we aren't going to support it. Quite the contrary. Needs are greater now than ever. We urge the whole community to give to the chest as it richly deserves.

Seville stomps Red, 44-12, as locals fail to display effort or spirit; scrubs shine

Seville wanted to play 48 minutes of football here Friday night and, capitalizing on a couple of breaks, swamped Plymouth, 44 to 12.

It was a miserable exhibition of football by the local entry, which put the ball in play only nine times in the first half and gained only 39 yards.

Russ Hewitt and Bill Oberli were the big guns of this crippled Barber team. The wonder is what would have happened if Coach Dick Brockett's eleven had been at full strength.

Seville scored on the seventh play of the contest, having moved 75 yards in a sustained drive helped by a 15-yard penalty against the hosts.

HEWITT WENT IN FOR THE TD from 11 yards out after Oberli had turned Plymouth's right end for 33.

Fifteen plays later, Seville had another score. Billy Strine

quick-kicked on second down after the Big Red had been penalized 15 yards. The Barbers took over on their own 40 and went armally to the two, whence Bob Chidsey sneaked for the touchdown.

Oberli rushed for the extra points.

The Barbers all but had another score in the first period but time ran out. They ran it in on the first play of the second quarter, Oberli turning right end for 20 yards. Hewitt rushed the extra points.

By half time it was 30 to 0. Oberli again scored to climax a 32-yard push after Chidsey intercepted Strine's pass. Devore rushed for the extra points.

THE LESS SAID ABOUT the Plymouth performance during the first half, the better. There was neither offensive nor defensive blocking. One fan, an organizer of Ply-

mouth football after World War II, probably as much responsible for its inception here as anyone, walked out in disgust just before the halftime whistle.

Admittedly, the Big Red got a couple of bad breaks. There were two 15-yard penalties early in the game and with the score 14 to 0 against them, the Big Red spung Duane Baker down on fourth down to receive a pass from Strine. Receive it he did, but he dropped it. He was all alone and would have brought the Big Red back into the ball game. It was one of three crucial tosses he dropped all night.

Hewitt counted from five yards out in the third canto and Oberli ran the extra points.

ON THE ENSUING KICK-off, the Big Red resorted to the handoffs which are characteristic of Petit-coached teams. This one seemed destined to wind up as the others had — a wide-ranging display of lateral running without much forward motion. But Fate Christian obtained possession and he stormed 82 yards down the near sideline untouched. It was Baker's block that sprung him loose.

If there was a bright spot all night, it was the performance of the second stringers in the late moments of the game. Directed by Jimmy Hamman, who connected for some aeri-als, the reserves pounded to the Seville six and sent Dayton Reed over for the TD.

But such as Gary Utiss,

wearing his brother's old number, and Hamman showed some signs of desire to play this game, a quality in which the Plymouth squad is remarkably deficient.

Petit cleared his bench when the issue was no longer in doubt and every player got in for some action.

The size of the crowd was less than a third of that which attended the Black River contest. If the team continues to perform in such manner, by season's end it may be hard to find a fourth for bridge.
