Inactive funds do not represent surplus funds of a subdivision but rather the overlapping of receipts and expenditures, says treasurer H. B. Collier. 

War II widows set for better benefits under newest law

Widows of World War II and Korean conflect veterans can qualify for pensions on the same basis as widows of World War I veterans starting July 1,

Previously a widow of World War II or Korean conflict could only establish eligibility for a pension if her husband had some degree of service-connected disability at death. After July 1, 1960, a widow need only show that the veteran was in active wartime service for 90 days or more and was discharged under other than dishonorable conditions.

The new law allows a gra-

The new law allows a gra-The new law allows a graduated monthly payment of \$60, \$45 or \$25, depending on whether the widow's outside annual income is \$600, \$1,200 or \$1,800. Above \$1,800 no pension is allowed.

pension is allowed.
Widows with children are
permitted higher pension and
income limitations. For a widow with one child the monthly benefit is \$75, \$60 or \$40,
depending on income limitations of \$1,000, \$2,000 or \$3,
000. For each additional child
another \$15 a month is allowed.


