Krugers to mark golden anniversary

"Cooperate and give in at least half the time" is the prescription of the Martin H. Krugers for keeping a marriage together for half century.

Tomorrow, at the home of their only daughter, Mrs. James J. Ryan, 223 Sandusky street, they'll receive friends and well-wishers in observance of their golden wedding anniversary. Hours are 3 to 5 and 7 to 9 p.m.

The Krugers — she was Gertrude Niehoff, employed as a mattress and cushion maker — were married Dec. 18, 1909, in the Dutch Reformed church, Hoboken, N. J.

"In those days," Mrs. Kruger

recalls, "it wasn't considered proper for a married woman to hold a job. But we needed the income and so instead of getting married in New York, where we were known, and the newspapers would print the news of the license being issued, we went across the river to Hoboken."

THIRTY-SEVEN YEARS later, the Krugers migrated across that river and kept going until they stopped here, where they lived until recently at 57 Plymouth street. Mr. Kruger, a machinist by trade, retired in 1945.

Their only son, John H., a master sergeant in the Air

Force, approaching retirement, is here for the occasion. He is assigned to Hickam field, Honolulu, Hawaii, but has recently been attending a service school at Orlando, Fla.

Mr. Kruger says he's sure he had to "go halfway more times than Gertrude did, but if you believe in being married, why not?"

His wife and helpmeet of half a century says for her part she never believes stories that married couples of long standing never have differences — "we've had them every day" — but she asserts they can be overcome by "cooperation and cooling off."

the school board would have to condemn it to get it.

A strongly worded statement from the school administration accompanied the recommendation to negotiate for the Dickerson property.

"The old chestnut that all of the building should be done at the high school level is constantly being aired," the statement said. "The board's attention is drawn to the fact that the ballot called for a vote on a high school addition and a new elementary school. Regardless of what any person might suggest, it is only legally possible to build what was voted on at the last election, namely an elementary building and a high school addition."

THE STATEMENT WAS apparently directed to on-the-street talk and a meeting called in Shiloh Saturday, Dec. 5, to discuss how the building plan might be upset, on the grounds that it is not sound policy for the district to build elementary facilities now.

Choice of the Dickerson site was made, the administration said, because it would allow for one central cafeteria to serve all pupils in Shiloh and it would provide for enlarged recreational space so that junior high football may be undertaken.

FEDERAL FUNDS ARE available to pay for counseling and guidance services, Supt. M. J. Coon told the board. He recommended appointment of Frank Garber, present industrial arts instructor, for the assignment, based upon "considerable experience as a teacher, a master's degree, experience with a number of colleges, experience in industry or in fields outside education and maturity of growth as a person."

Garber is, Coon said, much interested in boys and girls from the standpoint of helping them find their place in life. It was proposed he be assigned on a half-time basis. Kent Knaw, industrial arts teacher at Shiloh, would even-

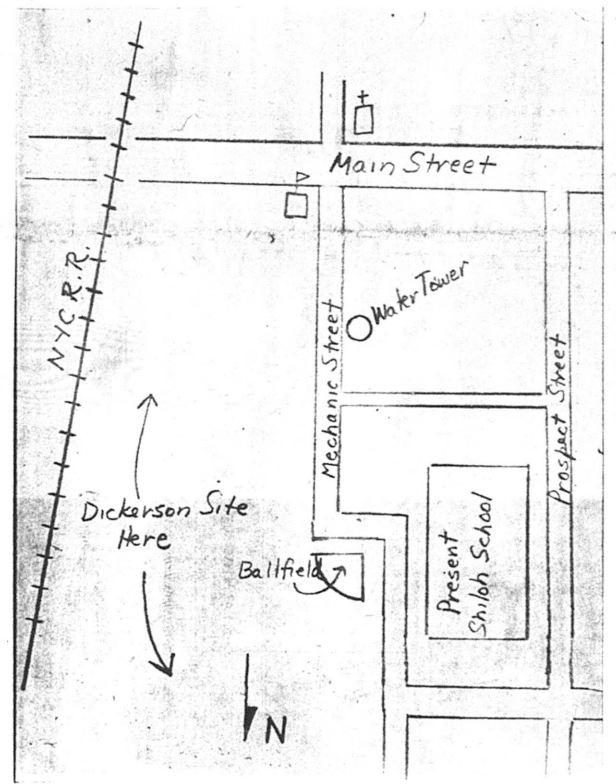
tually assume Garber's teaching load.

Board unanimously authorized Coon to work with Richland county authorities and the federal government to ascertain if part-time guidance and counseling, to which the federal government would contribute half the funds, can be established.

A citizen's committee on instructional materials and equipment said it noted "great improvement in textbooks... and in science and chemistry laboratories... reference books are still needed as visual aids, however, these needs can be corrected in the coming year. The committee commends the board on the handling of the funds provided by the three-mill levy."

Mrs. Edwin Beeching was chairman. Other members: Mrs. H. James Root, Mrs. Donald Dawson, John Reynolds and Dr. P. E. Haver.

Salary of Superintendent Coon was brought up to the formal schedule, effective Jan. 1.

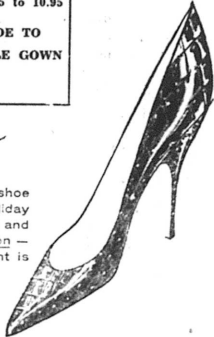

Political kettles began to simmer this week as candidates circulated petitions to qualify for their party primaries and sought party endorsement for their candidacies.

State Senator Charles A. Mosher, (R-Oberlin), incumbent in the senatorial district which includes Lorain, Ashland, Richland and Medina counties, put an end to speculation about his intentions in the 13th district if he gets the endorsement of his party's central committee, which was to have met with its leaders yesterday. Mosher didn't say if he'll run without the endorsement.

Central Committeemen Arthur Henry, Monroeville, and Mrs. Lila Black, Lorain, were to poll their colleagues in the GOP yesterday.

If Mosher runs for Congress, seeking the post to be vacated by Republican A. David Baumhart, Jr., Vermilion, he'll leave two local vacancies in the Ohio Senate, one four-year term and one nonrenewing two-year term.

Three Democrats and four Republicans have so far said they'll seek seats on the Richland county board of commissioners. Incumbent John C. Friday heads the GOP contingent. Clerk Earl C. Pollock, Paul W. Baumberger and Virgil L. Yarger are the other three. Both Baumberger and Yarger have been unsuccessful candidates in the past. The former is a Mansfield auctioneer and realtor, the latter a Springfield township farmer.

The three Democrats are Fred J. Tonnemacher, a 48-year-old Mansfielder, Dr.

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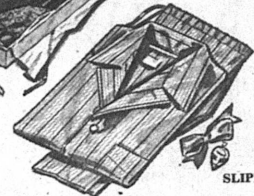
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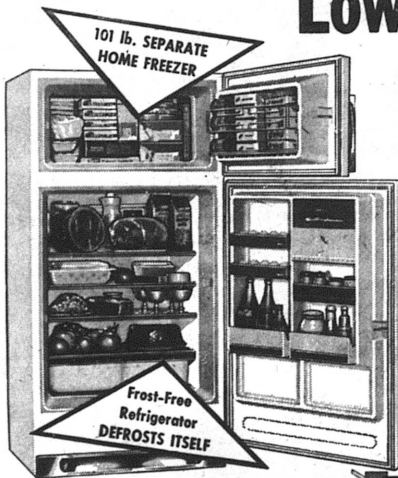
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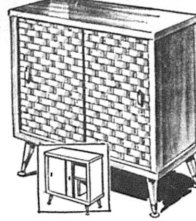


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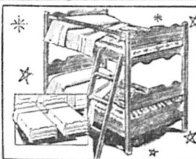
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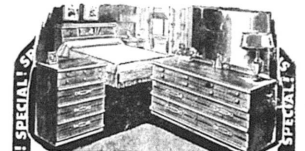
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Red loses first, 41-33, to Rams after swamping Lucas in RCL
