

Man plays 'piggy in parlor' with Postemas

Rumors rumbling, council caucuses on police matters

Henry Trauger resigned his post as special policeman, effective Mar. 1, at Tuesday's village council meeting.

He said he didn't like the job and wished to be rid of it. His contract as street supervisor, at the same salary, was renewed by Mayor Thurman R. Ford.

APPARENTLY DONE with police matters, the council turned to other routine business.

But for most citizens, a caucus which convened after the meeting had adjourned was more revealing than what the council did in regular session. The entire council, save Donald E. Akers, who went home, and Whitney J. Briggs, who was absent, discussed rumors of complaints about the police department.

It was said there is substantial objection to the extending of police protection outside the corporation limits. Reference was made to several calls made by the department in the muck lands west of the village and some north of town.

Village Solicitor Joseph F. Dush was a party to the caucus and would say much afterward. He told the council and Mayor Ford the village is morally obligated to cooperate with law enforcement agencies in neighboring villages and in county seats. But there is no obligation, he said, to give any smaller political sub-division, such as a township, free police protection.

IT WAS SAID SOME TAX- payers have bleated that Police Chief Robert L. Meiser was remiss in answering calls at New Haven — notably fights in a bar — and elsewhere out of town.

Back on the job after a painful foot injury, Meiser was said to have stoutly defended his actions on the grounds they "pay off to the village in the long run because we get the cooperation of other police departments."

Nevertheless, he was said to refrain from leaving the village except in hot pursuit of one who has committed or is suspected to have committed a felony or misdemeanor and to cooperate with neighboring police departments in arrests of a clear and present danger to the village, such as a fleeing bank robber.

Plymouth's Scouting program has received a shot in the arm over the past year.

Thirteen older boys have organized an Explorers troop. Fourteen boys between 11 and 13 are associated with the Boy Scout troop. Cub Scouts number 29.

To these young men are added eight adult Scouters, seven adult Explorers and 14 Cubbers.

The total is 85.

SINCE INCEPTION OF Scouting formally in 1929, 551 persons have come under its influence.

In the past seven years, the figures is 227, an average of slightly under 33 annually.

Mayor Thurman R. Ford called attention to these facts in proclaiming next week as official Boy Scout week. "The movement, through its four-year program, 'Onward for God and My Country,' is training more of our youth in character and qualities of good citizenship," Mayor Ford asserted.

Sexton confesses bad check racket

The checkered career of Donald B. Sexton, 30, self-styled "private detective" and convicted burglar, has run a-foul of the law again.

The bemustached dandy, who is married to the former Joan Ruckman of this place, and whose home in Willet road was destroyed by fire a week ago Monday, was arrested by Chief Jerrold Henry of Monroeville police Saturday on a charge of passing worthless checks.

CHIEF HENRY TOLD THE

Advertiser that Sexton, his business partner Donald G. Swert 32, Shelby, and Raymond E. Pfeister, 31, proprietor of Ray's Electronic Service, Shelby, confessed to him their roles in a scheme to bill merchants of nearly \$3,500. The three are in Erie county jail, Sandusky.

Here, said Henry, was their plan: checks drawn by the trio on non-existent accounts or on accounts whose signature was forged were to be passed wherever possible. Thereafter, the two proprietors of the Mid-West Detective Agency, with offices in Willard and Shelby, specializing in collecting unpaid bills, would report that these checks, allegedly given to them in pursuit of their trade, had been stolen.

They readily confessed, Henry said. They started the racket in Galion and had swept through Toledo, Milan, Norwalk and Sandusky.

Swert, they explained, would present his own identification to cash the checks. Later, it was his plan to flee this

part of the state until the furor died down.

Various described by neighboring police as a "bad actor" and a "no-good", Sexton was sentenced in 1947 to a 1 to 15 year term in Mansfield reformatory on conviction of breaking and entering at Heister's, Inc., Willard airport, on New Year's day. He was paroled after a year.

Big Red blows big lead at Madison, loses by one; downs Lucas

A second venture by Plymouth's Big Red into Class A competition Saturday night started well, then fizzled and fell.

With a comparatively safe halftime lead of 43 to 39, built on the drive series, the Big Red apparently left its forceful attack in the dressing room when the second half started.

It was able in the third period to score only eight points, 17 less than the Madison Rams, who all but matched the Plymouth output of 16 in the final quarter with 14.

THUS PLYMOUTH WENT down to its third, and closest, defeat of the season, 68 to 67. About 1,000 wildly partisan fans watched.

It was the failure of heretofore solid attackers to convert from the floor that cost the Big Red its chance of winning.

The Big Red scored a phenomenal 47.2 per cent of its tries from the field, 29 of 61. But the Rams did even better — 53.3 per cent.

But Craig Harnly, who only the night before had dumped in 35 markers got only a dozen against Madison, on a scor-

ing percentage of 29.4. Steve Patterson scored another dozen on a record of 35.6 — more than par for the course on another night.

And the Big Red kicked away 10 free throws, whereas their hosts missed only seven.
