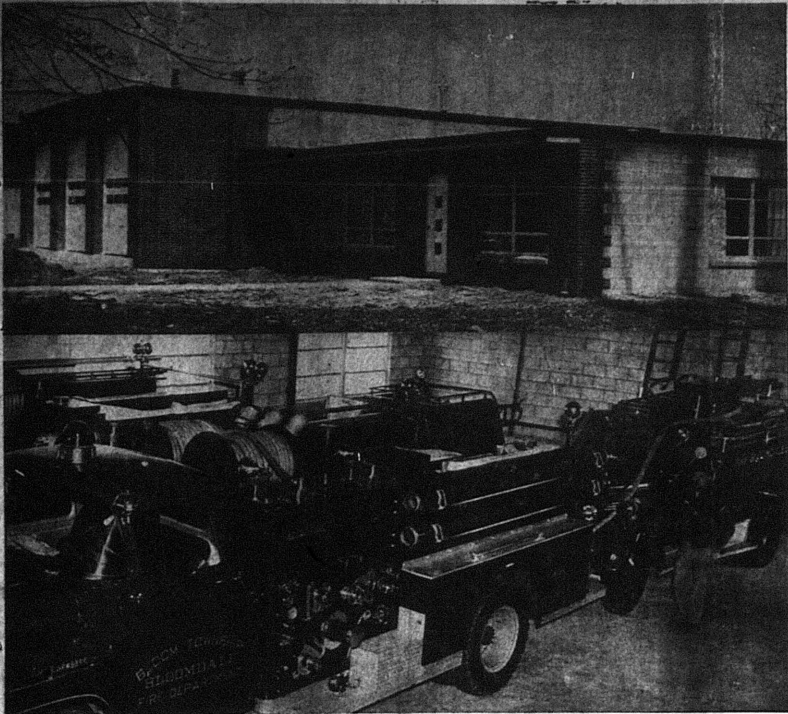




BLOOMDALE'S new fire house-municipal office cost village \$32,000 — about \$53 per head.

Teacher salary schedule revised upward; increases conditioned on more training

To prevent another mass exodus of financially disgruntled teachers, Plymouth Board of Education in special session Monday night raised the salary schedule.

"The new schedule, which Supt. M. J. Coon said puts Plymouth "about in the middle" of Richland county school districts, is laid upon a starting salary of \$3,900 for inexperienced teachers with a B. A. or B. S. degree.

Contracts were authorized for 13 teachers. Resignations were received from two. Superintendent Coon said he anticipates a loss of about nine more.

Renewals of contracts were approved for Mrs. Fred J. Port, Mrs. Kenneth D. McGinnis, Frank Garber, A. E. Strickland and Lloyd B. Ray, five years; Sidney Stettler, Mrs. Frank Fenner, Lawrence J. Root, Harold Davenport, John Arndt, Jordan Holthous and Mrs. Guy Flora, two years; Mrs. Cecil Smith, continuing.

A half-time teacher will be assigned, the board ruled, to Plymouth Elementary school to relieve the principal, Lloyd B. Ray, from full-time teaching. That teacher may be Elizabeth Grimes, high school English instructor, whose resignation as such was accepted.

Marion Whitehead resigned because he faces military service and said he prefers to be near his home until called.

The salary schedule was adjusted after recommendations by a special citizens committee — Homer V. Beard and the Revs. Robert F. Hall, Moss Rutan and Thomas S. Taylor. Only Beard and Rutan were present Monday.

DETAILS OF THE SCHEDULE:

For teachers with from two to 2.9 years of training, nine brackets ranging from \$3,000 to \$3,800 annually;

For teachers with from three to 3.9 years of training, nine brackets ranging from \$3,400 to \$4,200 annually;

For teachers with baccalaureate degrees, 13 brackets ranging from \$3,900 to \$5,100 annually;

For teachers under five years contracts, 14 brackets ranging from \$4,100 to \$5,400 annually;

For teachers with master's degrees, 16 brackets ranging from \$4,300 to \$5,800 annually.

Effective Sept. 1, teachers may advance only to the fifth increment upon completing six hours of training. To be

eligible for further increase, they must complete six hours every five years.

IN OTHER ACTION, THE BOARD:

1. Passed a resolution submitting to the state board of education a request that approval be given to issuance of \$23,000 in bonds to pay for the Shiloh annex.

2. Asked for prices from four contractors to install a gas conversion unit in the Shiloh building.

3. Was notified that it will get only \$27,500 advance in first-half 1958 real estate taxes. It had asked for \$75,000, hoping it would get \$50,000.

Tiny town of 600 constructs new village hall, fire house

(Ed. Note: Bloomdale, community of 600 in Wood county, has erected a new fire house and village hall, at a cost of \$32,000. Because of the pertinence of its efforts to the local scene, this story by William P. Day, ace writer for the Toledo Blade, is reprinted herewith.)

For a village with a population of 600, Bloomdale likes to boast of several things that set it apart from numerous other communities of similar size and makeup in northwestern Ohio.

First of all, the residents now are talking with pride about their new fire hall and town hall which was recently completed at a cost of \$32,090.68.

Second, some Bloomdale residents, mostly the women, like to point out that there are two women on council.

Third, and probably the most noteworthy, is that Bloomdale is a community where tax levies, bond issues, school mergers and most other

proposals are always approved by the voters. Let anyone doubt that Bloomdale voters always approve proposals on the ballot, it is only necessary to state that the village's tax rate is 38.2 mills and no one seems to grumble about it very much.

ALSO SUPPORTING

Bloomdale's reputation is the new fire station and town hall. Right next to the new building is the old fire station and town hall. It is a substantial building, in need of some repairs, but structurally sound. When the bond issue for the new building appeared on the ballot several people asked why it was needed. These few were told that the other building was out of date and the bond issue sailed through.

Somewhat of a spokesman for Bloomdale is Mrs. Maxine Myers, village clerk-treasurer. Before taking over the new combined job two years ago, Mrs. Myers, who with her husband and son

run a plumbing and building supply business, was treasurer for four years.

She is somewhat at loss for an explanation, however, of why the citizens always approve tax increases and bond issues. She thinks the reason may be found in the tradition that exists here when a fellow citizen suffers a setback. At times like that, she says, everyone bands together to help out.

THUS IT SEEMS TO BE, she adds, that when the village needs more money for schools, improvements, or a new building, everyone again bands together for the common good.

Mrs. Myers says the women serving on council, Melba Wice and Clara Rager, were elected because the women in the community decided they wanted some new faces in their government.

And the belief around town, she says, is that Councilwomen Wice and Rager

This is the week when rural mail carriers will take a census of small animals and birds. Wildlife division biologist, announces all rural mail carriers in Ohio will report the number and sex of pheasants and quail and the number of rabbits seen along their routes this week and next.

Results of the count, one of several taken each year, will indicate trends in abundance and distribution of these game species, he says.

Eighty-six of Ohio's 88 counties — Cuyahoga and Hamilton are excluded — are being covered. Reason for their omission: hardly worth the trouble, says Edwards, because "there's such a small amount of effective habitat in those counties."

To the sportsman, it's important. He can help the carrier, too, by tipping him off where he may have seen coveys of quail or a pair of hen pheasants crossing the road. Says Edwards: "When you see a pair of hens, look around carefully for the cock. He'll be around somewhere, and not too far away. Cocks generally range with hens in the ratio of one to 10."

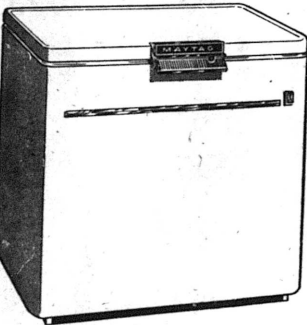

Good city boys for hire

Farmers interested in employing a "summer farmer" from the city in age ranging from 14 to 19 years are asked to call Huron County Agent John Wells at Norwalk or Miss Ruth Luckens, 15809 Edgelynn avenue, Cleveland 11, who has begun screening applicants who want to spend the summer on a Huron county farm.

These city boys, according to Miss Luckens, who operates Summer Farmers, a non-profit organization dedicated to furthering rural-urban understanding, realize that farm work not only offers them a priceless education but also a real challenge.

EACH APPLICANT IS interviewed by Miss Luckens at his home and also discusses the program with his parents.

"Miss Luckens," Mr. Wells states, "is mainly concerned with the boy's willingness to work, his ability to listen and learn, accept responsibilities and be trusted."

The boys are required to give four references, two of whom are asked to give written recommendations.

Farmers who made application for a summer farmer prior to Apr. 1 will have the opportunity to interview the boy who has been selected to work for him.

Minimum starting wages for inexperienced first-year summer farmers are \$12 weekly, plus room, board and laundry.

One would hardly expect, in a community such as this, that much notice would be taken of the 150th anniversary of Miami university at Oxford, this year, and the celebrations next year of Kent State and of Bowling Green State universities.

Where it has not been the fashion for young people to go on to college in great number, and where the programs of the universities do not reach in great strength, folks tend not to know much about them.

Everybody has nice, new red-on-white automobile license tags by now, yet few realize the color scheme this year (and next year's too) was chosen in honor of a state university — Miami's sesquicentennial this year, Kent State's anniversary next year.

Young people hereabouts are beginning to gravitate toward Bowling Green, an up-and-coming institution only now beginning to come into its own.

The citizen ought to drive to Bowling Green to see what is being done to, by and for these young people, Ohio's richest resource. He ought to inspect the campus, to talk with faculty and student alike, to see for himself if his tax dollar is being wisely spent.

The university was organized in 1910. It now numbers about 5,750 students on a full-time basis. Its academic standards have steadily advanced. We hope the Ohio legislature will soon authorize for the university the privilege of granting doctorate degrees.

We are, frankly, considerably impressed with what is being done at Bowling Green, despite our personal dissatisfaction with the report submitted by its top educator with regard to our difficult school situation.

The distance is 72 miles. The scenery, of a spring afternoon, is entrancing. The campus is quite attractive. The buildings are especially suitable to their surroundings.

But the real satisfaction is in seeing these 6,000 young people working and living in an atmosphere best calculated to develop — Doyt Perry, Mr. Anderson and the coaching staff to the contrary — the minds and characters of the folks who, in another day, under considerably different circumstances, will be paying the bill for the mistakes we make today.

Drop in on Bowling Green. The university staff will be glad to see you. Find out for yourself what your tax dollar is doing.



A statement of holdings

Senator Young has come forward with what he calls a complete listing of about \$300,000 of his personal stock certificates, so that "anyone may judge in the future whether there is any conflict of interest" in his voting as Ohio's junior senator.

A man in our kaffee klatsch said he thought it would be a good idea for the editor to expose his holdings in some similar manner, so that readers may judge for themselves whether there is ulterior purpose when the editor plumps for one thing or another.

We are happy to comply.

A careful perusal of the one safe deposit box to which the editor has any title or access will reveal these certificates:

1. One birth certificate, proving acquisition of citizenship of the United States by birth therein.
2. One sheepskin issued by the Un-

iversity of Iowa, attesting to satisfactory completion of requirements for the baccalaureate degree.

3. One honorable discharge from the Army of the United States.

4. One receipt, marked "paid", that shows settlement in full for personal property taxes due as of the last bill.

5. One dog-eared copy of the United States Constitution, fingered and bedaubed considerably in the region of the first 10 amendments, particularly so in those which deal with the freedom of speech, of assembly, of the press, of religion, and of the right to trial by jury.

There may be some other certificates lying about, but thy have no value to speak of.

The editor stands on these. If ulterior purpose can honestly be alleged by his ownership of these certificates, then so be it.

The new fire station and town hall is constructed of cement block and brick. It contains a room for council chambers, an assembly room for use of the firemen and possibly in the future for other groups if arrangements can be worked out. Also it has room for at least six pieces of fire equipment.

The department, which also serves and houses the Bloom Township equipment, now has two men and two old trucks. But one of the old trucks is soon to be taken out of service.

MEMBERS OF THE DEPARTMENT, proud of their modern equipment, recently finished a training course where they studied the latest in fire fighting techniques.

Dedication for the new building will be held as soon

as the landscaping work can be completed and a program arranged.

Bloomdale is now seeking some way to dispose of the old fire station. The community would like to lease it, sell it or rent it to a small industry and efforts are now under way to find an occupant.

Main industry in Bloom-

dale is the Great Atlantic and Pacific Co.'s tomato ketchup plant and the Quaker Maid firm. Many residents work in Fostoria, Findlay and Bowling Green and others are retired farmers.

A group which has done much to aid the commercial and economic picture in the village is the Bloomdale Community Improvement as-

sociation.

Since its inception, it has been instrumental, through the sale of stock, in remodeling a building for a physician and for a bank. The money received through the sale of stock has all been repaid.

Residents now hope the association can help interest a firm in moving into the old fire station.
