Library to observe open house here

Patrons of Plymouth Branch library may participate in a prize money competition in observance of National Library week, which begins Sunday, Mrs. Harold Shaffer, librarian, announced yesterday.

Gift certificates worth \$30 will be awarded adult competitors and \$15 for student writers during the week's competition, she said.

"All a reader need do," Mrs. Shaffer announced, "is write a letter, 'Why I Like to Read,' and address it to Lois MacKellar, librarian, Mansfield Public Library, Mansfield, O. It can be any length, short or long, but it must include the name, address and telephone number of the writer or, in the case of a student, his grade and school."

DEADLINE FOR THE CONTEST, she said, is midnight Wednesday. For the Monday prizes — an award of \$10 for an adult winner and \$5 for a student winner will be made on each of three days — letters should be mailed no later than tomorrow.

Plymouth Branch library will hold open house to its patrons throughout the week. A new collection of outstanding non-fiction and some light fiction has been assembled for the event. It will be on display for inspection and perusal by readers, but loans will not be permitted during Library week.

"We will be glad, however," Mrs. Shaffer said, "to reserve any of the new collection during Library week so that the reader may have first chance at it when the celebration is over."

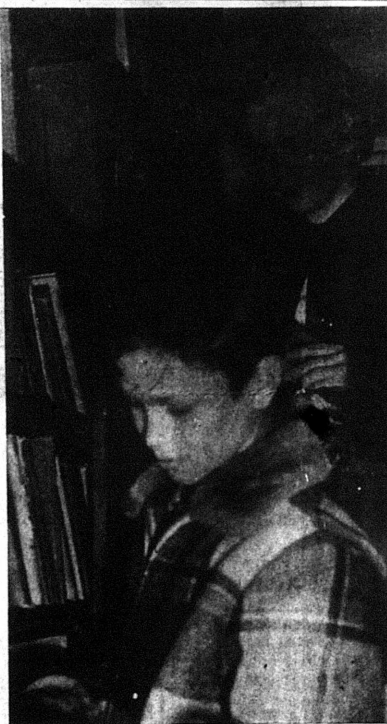
Man apprehended for molesting girls

Plan protest meeting

Opposition to the \$525,000 school bond issue grew apace this week.

William B. Ross, chairman of the citizen's committee to oppose passage of the issue, called a mass meeting of supporters for 7:30 p.m. tomorrow in the armory in Sandusky street.

"We know there are many who will have questions, and we will have the right people there to answer them," Ross said. "I want to make clear that we have nothing to hide, and we are not ashamed of this meeting, but that it is especially for those patrons of the

school district who are opposed to passage of the bond issue."

Whether the Board of Education will take action to choose a site for the proposed school before the day of election was still problematical at press time.

Fire house pot starting to boil, council can issue bonds itself

The village fire house pot is beginning to boil.

Temperature of the pot Tuesday night was:

1. Councilmanic bonds up to a value of \$30,000 — one per cent of the tax duplicate — can be issued by the council without popular vote. They would be paid for out of current revenues, without increase of taxes.

2. Present feeling is to issue about \$25,000 worth, when the legal advice saying they can be sold is in hand.

3. In special meeting Friday the council was to offer \$16,375 for the old theatre building to Edward O. Ramsey, its proprietor. This he was said to have rejected. A compromise offer of \$18,000 was then said to have been made.

(Ed. Note: None of these data derives from a reporter's attendance at the village council meeting Tuesday night. The information was acquired ear-

lier. Consequently, the reporter feels no compunction about publishing information in the public interest which he has acquired outside the council chamber.)

Attitude of the council now seems to be "we were elected not only to do what the people wish, but to do what's good for the people."

Reliance upon methods of finance which do not require popular vote is the present means by which the council seeks to do what it believes "is good for the people."

If councilmanic bonds are issued, the council can do so by its own vote. Thirty days after the enabling ordinance is passed are required to allow a referendum petition to be filed. If it is unsuccessful, the bonds could then be sold.

Estimated time interval for this to take place: about 60 days.

Plans as they are now laid

call for construction of a new building on the site at Portner and East Main streets to house fire equipment. The theatre building would become a municipal hall.

POSTMASTER RAYMOND L. Brooks appeared briefly to complain that an alley connecting Trux street and Main avenue, supposed to be 30 feet in width, has been encroached upon by four abutting property owners.

He asked that immediate steps be taken to rectify the condition, which he said includes free passage of motor vehicles and the public to a new post office site.

All of the east side of Portner street will be reserved as fire lane and no parking will be permitted, the council ruled.

Lakewoodite to erect USPO

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A Lakewood contractor will erect the new United States Post Office here. The Plymouth Advertiser learned this week.

He is Albert J. Stankie, 158-19 Detroit avenue, Lakewood, who will lease the building constructed to post office department specifications for 10 years, with two five-year options to renew.

SINCE RATE OF RENTAL

will be about \$4,200 annually, post office authorities figure the value of the building at about \$40,000.

The new structure, to be erected on the south portion of the premises now occupied by William C. and Doris Enderby and immediately north of First Presbyterian church, will be completely modern in design and construction. It will be air conditioned.

Inside dimensions will produce 2,880 square feet of work space. There will be a 216

square foot platform for loading and service. A maneuvering and parking area totalling 4,292 square feet will complete the project.

The building will remain property of the contractor. It will pay real estate taxes on it. It will be a part of the villa, tax duplicate.

Annual rental for the inside space will be at the rate of \$1.15 a square foot, of outside space at the rate of 40 cents a square foot.

On the Sidelines

By THE OLD TIMER

Big fish stories are an important part of American folklore. In the past, it hasn't always been possible to check 'em.

Now there is an official list of record fish taken in Ohio, put out by the Outdoor Writers of Ohio. All records must be witnessed and vouched for before they appear in this list.

Biggest fish recorded is a 82-pound blue catfish taken from the Ohio river in 1911. Larger catfish have been reported but never officially authenticated.

Records are being broken all the time. The state small mouth bass record was broken twice in one week in October by the same man. It now stands at six pounds, three ounces.

Buckeye fishermen who plan to shoot for any of these records this spring may get a copy of "Fishing's Fun for Everyone," published by the Fish Management section, Ohio Division of Wildlife. It's available for 25 cents from the Information and Education section, 1500 Dublin road, Columbus.

AN ERROR IN COMPUTATION has caused a revision of the 1957 and 1958 deer kill. Recent news release reported that the 1958 computed kill totaled 5,138 deer compared with a total computed harvest of 5,004 in 1957.

Eugene Knoder, forest game specialist, Ohio Division of Wildlife, now reports that Ohio hunters bagged about the same number of deer in 1958 as in 1957. The revised 1958 computed harvest totaled 4,413 compared to 4,786 the previous year. On rechecking, Knoder found that the success rate was also the same for

Peoples Federal business up

First quarter of 1959, ending Mar. 31, 1959, was another banner period in the long 67-year history of Peoples Federal Savings & Loan Association, John G. Routzon, vice-president and sales manager, reports.

During the first three months of 1959 a total of \$5,120 million was received as deposits to savings accounts and 1,189 new accounts were opened. 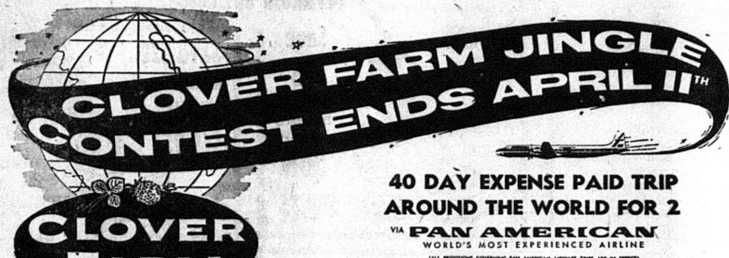

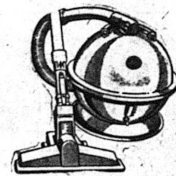

Newspaper's way of saying it 'style'

Even now, after nearly five years, the editor receives inquiries about dates, names and times.

How a newspaper publishes them is governed by its style book.

For the benefit of the most recent inquirers, here is a brief rundown of how The Advertiser always does it:

Since the newspaper is officially a Thursday journal, "today" means the day of official publication. Use of the days of the week — Friday, Saturday, etc. — is governed by the tense of the verb; when the tense is past, the Friday immediately preceding the date of publication is meant; when the tense is present or future, the Friday after date of publication is meant.

Hours are always referred to by "p.m. or a.m.", to avoid the incongruity of "tonight at 7:30 p.m."

Married ladies, whether widowed or not, are always referred to by the names of their husbands, in accordance with proper social etiquette. Divorced ladies are referred to by their Christian names and the surname of their former husband.

Dates preceding the ultimate date of publication are referred to as "Mar. 25," not "last Wednesday," or "last week Wednesday."

Dates more than seven days in advance of publication are similarly referred to.

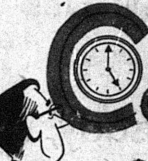

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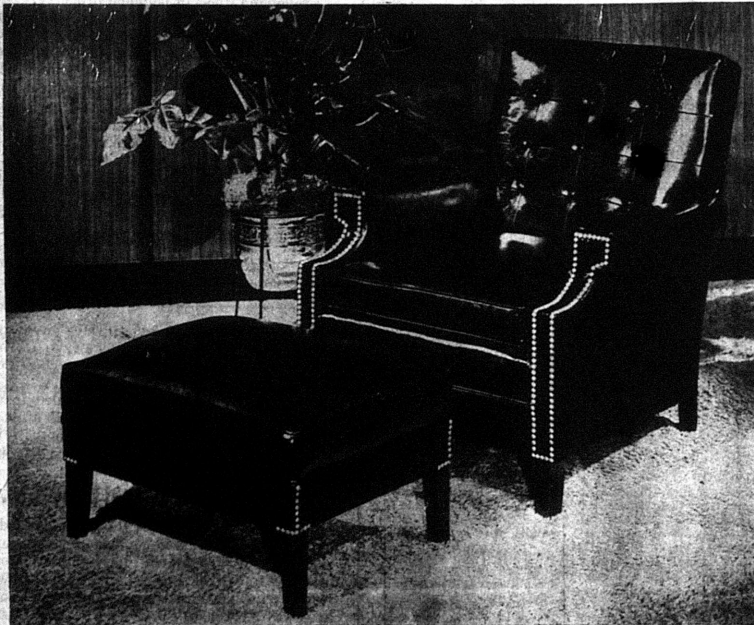
