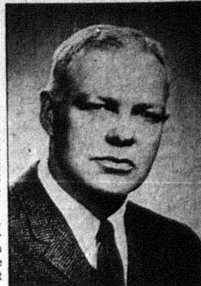

For over 40 years a public school teacher before she retired during World War II, Miss Jessie I. Cole died in Shelby Memorial hospital early Sunday.

She had been a patient there six days, for treatment of a stroke of apoplexy.

Born May 17, 1882, Miss Cole taught at New Haven, where she acquired the reputation of thoroughness and fairness that became a byword in hundreds of households in New Haven township.

Well beloved by her former pupils, she always pointed with pride to her success in convincing the community of the need for an auditorium, which was finally erected in 1923.

A sister, Margaret, with whom she lived at 66 Portner street, and two brothers, Clarence V., Akron, and Dr. Arch E. Louisville, Ky., survive.

Miss Cole was a faithful servant of her church, Plymouth Methodist, which she lately served as treasurer and a member of Plymouth Chapter 231, Order of Eastern Star, which conducted a lodge service Monday at 7:30 p.m.

as S. Taylor, conducted the funeral service Tuesday at 2-30 p.m. from the McQuate Funeral home. Burial was in Greenlawn cemetery.

Street repair agreed by council, residents

Huron county road department will proceed with resurfacing of Parkwood and Willow drives as soon as feasible, village council ruled in special session Friday night.

Property owners' petition carried the names of all abutting residents, committing themselves to a pro rata share of the cost of gravel and hauling involved. Estimated amount is \$800, an average of \$60 each.

Councilman Omer G. Burkett said he'd go along with the arrangement but he urged the council not to forget other streets needing repairs quite as much as these two.

TO THIS THE STREET committee said it had been some time since repair had almost all of them are two-car homes, whose gasoline tax payments have been committed to other street expenditures in past years.

Burkett retorted he didn't

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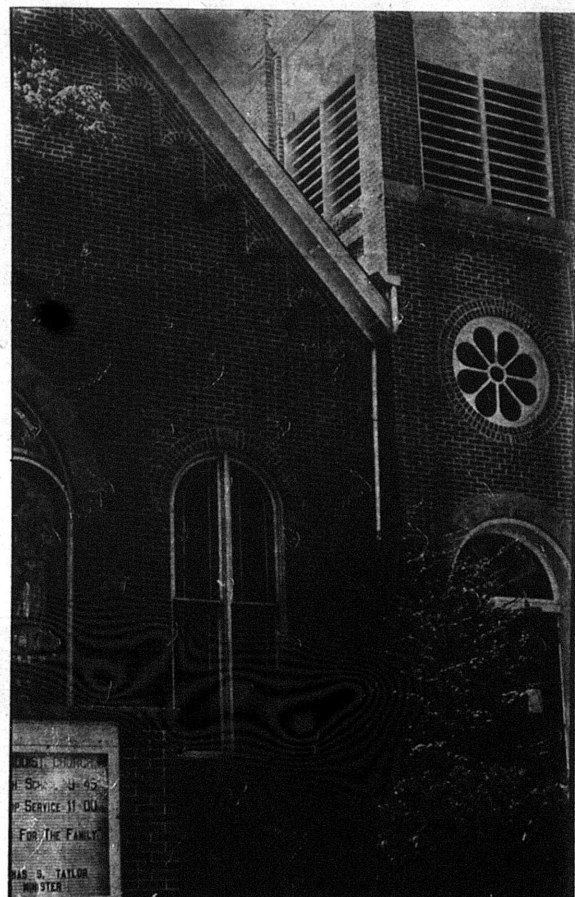

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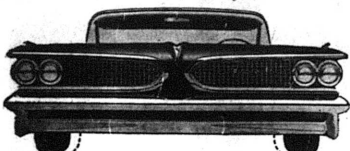

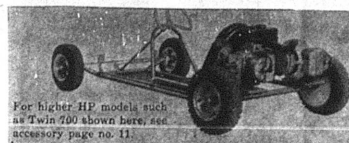

He mailed a letter with one stamp fastened to it to everybody he thought would be a good prospect. He promised if they brought the stamp to Sunday school, he would give them two more just like it.

He got lots of attendance the next week.

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Ex-Shilohan says ex-Plymouthite's book not in same class with runaway 'Lolita',

(The reviewer, the former Martha Arts of Shiloh, is the wife of the publisher of the Wellington Enterprise. She has reviewed books of every nature for 28 years — a total of 440 books.

Mrs. Ockerman, the author, formerly lived at 54 Plymouth street. — Ed. Note)

"Beyond the Hills" by Dell Ockerman was published Monday by Comet Press. This

is a first novel by a woman who now lives in Mansfield, Richland county, the home also of Dawn Powell, "She Walks in Beauty" and the late Louis Bromfield, who topped them all.

This is a remarkable first book. Either Mrs. Ockerman is a born writer or she is telling, in part, the story of someone very close to her.

Briefly, Julie Courtney is a beautiful but poor girl from

a dilapidated cabin home in southern Indiana. Finishing high school, she ran away to work in a war office and marry the nephew of a wealthy contractor. Julie was soon wearing mink in a convertible and making the fast moves and quick friendships of war time. Strong and weak characters weave in and out and the locale goes from Ohio to Paris to Florida and Jamaica. Five years later, still childless, Julie discovers that her husband is a homosexual. By that time she is an alcoholic. He meets death in a plane crash and she returns to the

cabin home, empty now by the passing of both parents. Here she recalls the words of her tobacco-chewing father about having everything there without going beyond the hills. She resumed her painting until she met death by lightning in a storm.

Unless the incident of homosexuality is greater than we think this book won't go far on that note because it is not quite a "Peyton Place" nor a "Lolita". Its publication comes too closely in the wake of such giants ("Mistress of an Age" by J. C. Herold, which just won the National Book Award in non-fiction. This astonishing madam of the French Revolution is being written about 141 years later).

Another great book is "Green Grows the Ivy" by Ivy Baker Priest. She was a poor girl from a western mining town. She had an unhappy first marriage. But she was a very happy second marriage. She became active in the Republican party and six years ago went to Washington, D.C., where she is the Treasurer of the United States.

Mary Margaret McBride was a poor farm girl from Missouri who has just written "Long Way from Missouri", which tells of her becoming a world known reporter and radio star for 25 years. Tough competition for any girl in fiction.

"Beyond the Hills" proves beyond doubt that Mrs. Ockerman is a gifted writer. Her word pictures are clear, sharp and unforgettable. We impatiently await her next book.

It was R. L. Taylor's ninth novel, "The Travels of Jamie McPeters" that just won the Pulitzer prize. We would like to see Mrs. Ockerman tackle the apathy of the American voter or community, real cause of juvenile delinquency. Her gifted pen is needed many places.

The jacket of the book carries her picture: a truly beautiful woman. "Born and reared on a farm in Greene County, Indiana. A housewife, addicted to domesticity, she finds time to paint as well as write."

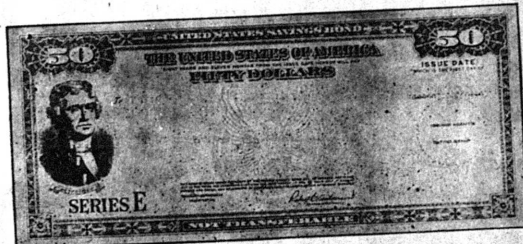

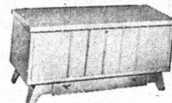

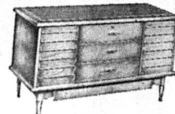

Seven Navy ships to visit bay

Seven ships of the Navy's Atlantic amphibious force will visit Sandusky July 18-20, it is announced by the U. S. Navy Recruiting station.

Ships coming to Sandusky are:

The U.S.S. Cambria (APA-36), an attack transport ship built to carry troops and equipment to invasion beaches. Weighing 16,000 tons, it draws 25 feet of water, has a beam of 89 feet, a length of 492 feet, carries a crew of 350 and can carry an additional 500 troops.

The U. S. S. Oglethorpe (AKA-100), an attack cargo ship built to carry supplies and equipment. It weighs 14,000 tons, draws 28 feet of water, is 459 feet long, has a beam of 63 feet and has a crew of 300.

The U. S. S. Kleinsmith (APD-134), a destroyer con-

verted to a high speed transport. Weighing 1,400 tons, it is 306 feet long, has a maximum beam of 37 feet and draws 12 feet of water. With a normal crew of 200, it can carry an additional 162 troops. This ship also has an underwater demolition team, more commonly referred to as "frogmen".

The U.S.S. Donner (LSD 20) and the U.S.S. San Marcos (LSD-25), combination dock-landing craft carriers. These ships are built with a well deck which can be flooded. Smaller craft may then enter through stern gates. The gates are closed and the water pumped out, lifting the small craft from the water, so they may be worked on as in dry dock or transported from place to place. These LSD's weigh 4,000 tons, are 457 feet long,

have a beam of 72 feet, a draft of 14 feet and carry a crew of 250.

The U.S.S. Terrebonne Parish (LST-1156) and the U.S.S. Suffolk County (LST-1173). These vessels are built with a tunnel-like hold in which to carry tanks, vehicles, or cargo. They have a flat bottom and are able to run their bow on to a beach to discharge cargo. They weigh 3,776 tons, are 327 feet long, have a beam of 50 feet and carry a crew of 150.

These ships will hold open house for the public. Because of their size, the Oglethorpe and the Cambria will anchor out in deeper water, but boats will be made available to carry visitors to the ships. The other five ships will be moored at piers in Sandusky.

Interest grows in kiddie photos as parents ask about attire

Interest is growing in the forthcoming feature series of children's pictures to be published in The Advertiser shortly.

Since all pictures will be taken in natural color, many mothers are calling to ask what is the most suitable clothing for color. Richard Blosser, Findlay, who will take the pictures, says pastel colors are best if the child's coloring is light.

Brunettes and redheads are favored by darker dress. Often small areas of bright color will favor this type.

"Deep dark red will photograph all right, but brightness sometimes detracts from color of hair and skin," he says. "If

in doubt, have your child dressed in neutral colors. It is best to stay away from large areas of white unless it is mostly hidden with coat or jacket."

A picture of each child photographed will be published in the "Kids of the Week" series to appear during the summer. This is a public service for parents and readers. "You do not need to be a subscriber or even a reader of The Advertiser to participate in this event," the publisher says. "Everyone is welcome to bring any pre-school age child or children. "Natural color pictures at

low cost are something of a rarity since the color process is involved when on an individual basis," Blosser says. The methods used in the production of school pictures have served to bring the cost down.

No one is under an obligation to buy any pictures or to pay to have pictures taken. All will have the opportunity to see finished pictures in color and to purchase at low cost if they so desire. This is entirely up to the parents.

"Nothing is so fragile or fleeting as childhood," the publisher claims. "Capture it forever with portraits. Take advantage of this free offer, at The Advertiser June 1 from 1 to 7 p.m."

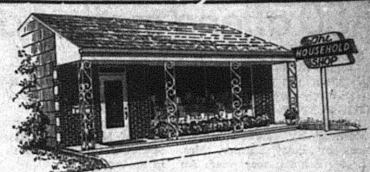

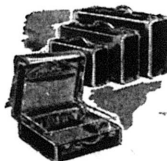

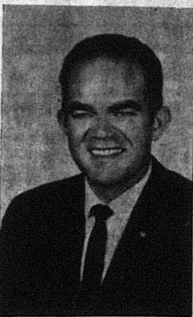
