

Shilohans testing sentiment for secession, eye Union

Strong sentiment for secession from the school district, to 1 rejection by Plymouth said to be fanned by the 8½-voters to the \$750,000 high school building plan, was reported in Shiloh this week.

Opinion leaders there were understood to be working hard for support of a secession from the district and transfer to Union district.

A postal card survey of the anticipated strength of such

sentiment was to be taken this week to enable these opinion leaders to chart their course.

MEANWHILE, UNDER URGING of David E. Cook, the board of education agreed to convene two committees of five members each with the Richland county board of education, in order to compose differences among the three factions.

Homer V. Beard, formerly

executive head of Shiloh schools, was named to appoint the Shiloh delegation, William B. Ross, chairman of the Civic Committee for Better Schools, will name the five Plymouth consultants. Ross named J. Benjamin Smith, Thomas F. Root, Miles S. Christian, Wayne Ross and Richard Fackler. These committees will meet in caucus with the Richland county board Monday at 8 p.m. It was understood the move

to transfer the former Shiloh district out of the present Plymouth district and join it with Union would result in:

1. Ultimate construction of a new high school at Shennadoh, nearly six miles east of Shiloh.
2. Freeing of the old Plymouth district to resume the ill-fated consolidation with Huron Valley.

OWING TO AN UNSETTLED legal question about prior-

ity of issues on the general election ballot, Willard's board of education said it will continue to accept tuition pupils from the Huron Valley district for the 1959-60 school year. Previously the Willard board had said acceptance of these pupils would be conditioned upon a favorable ballot in Huron Valley district of annexation to Willard.

The Huron Valley board will certify to the county board of

election an 11-mill levy to pay for this tuition. It enlarges an 8.5 mill levy now in effect, and would yield \$18,715 based on the present valuation of \$7,498,000.

This would bring total taxation for school purposes in the district to 20.6 mills.

James Wasserman won an Ohio Academy of Science scholarship to a school of his choice, but has opted for a \$700-a-year stipendium from Western Reserve university, Cleveland, renewable annually subject to maintenance of high scholarship standards. He will study medicine.

Duane Utiss has been offered athletic scholarships by the University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wis., and Kent State university.

Poppy day set

Saturday has been proclaimed Poppy day here by Mayor Thurman R. Ford.

His proclamation, issued Monday, says, in part: "Remembrance of those who gave their lives in defense of our country and its freedom being an inspiring part of our heritage, and all of us having personal memories of young men of Plymouth who died in war service, it is fitting that we keep those memories bright by wearing on one day each year the memorial poppy."

Council determined to build firehouse, will seek Board aid

"We're going to put up a firehouse this summer if kids us," the village council said Tuesday night, "but we're also going to give the Board of Public Affairs a chance to say if it wants to throw in with us."

The Board will be summoned to meet in special session with the council next week, probably Tuesday at 8 p.m., to express its views.

Second-handedly, the council heard Tuesday the Board is divided — one favoring slightly, one opposing strongly, one still on the fence.

Bonding attorneys Squire, and Dempsey will be told the council intends to sell \$35,000 in general obligation bonds of a councilmanic nature.

OF THIS AMOUNT, AN ESTIMATED \$16,810 will be available for building a firehouse. A part of it — probably seven per cent — will go for architects' fees and an additional sum will be paid to attorneys.

Whatever happens from here on, the council said in effect, the value of the land at Porter and East Main streets is \$12,000. The value of the building is only \$6,000.

And this opinion will be stated to the bonding attorneys as a basis for planning issuance of the bonds.

Some members of the busi-

ness community argue that putting any funds in "white elephant" — so-called because the theatre building would stand idle with no foreseeable opportunity to improve it for use — is not wise in view of the straitened fiscal situation.

But they were told emphatically Tuesday night, with some heat and not much light that the site is final. The businessman had suggested an investigation, at least, of the possibilities of destruction of the present village hall and jail and of the house between them for the purpose of erecting a fire house and village hall on that site.

In any case, the council doesn't plan to run risk of condemnation proceedings. It has been led to believe that a jury in a condemnation case, despite the fact it would be approving expenditure of public funds, would display the same largesse that juries in civil damage cases have been displaying with respect, or lack of it, to insurance company money.

The businessmen argue that a condemnation jury would not approve \$18,000 as the price for the theatre site.

New gas proposal a real gasser!

Troubles pile up for the Shiloh resident.

Atop re-evaluation of real property resulting in higher taxes, special assessment for installing sanitary sewers, affixing of sewer use rates and higher school taxes, the Ohio Fuel Gas Co. wants more money for its services.
