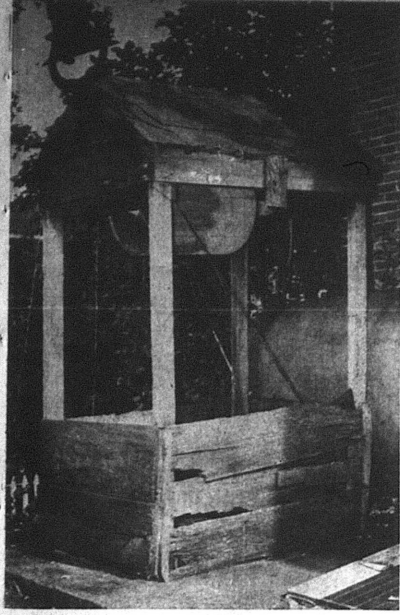

**Schools to resume
Sept. 4 for 176 days
in 1959-60 year**

Plymouth public schools will open for a 176-day school year at 8:30 a.m. Sept. 4. It is the first time in many years that school sessions have opened before Labor day. County teachers' meeting is Sept. 4. Classes will be suspended for the national holiday Sept. 7. Following table shows school schedule and number of days in session:
1st six weeks, Sept. 4-Oct. 23, 34 days; 2nd six weeks, Oct. 26-Dec. 4, 27 days; 3rd six weeks, Dec. 7-Jan. 22, 27 days; 4th six weeks, Jan. 23-Mar. 4, 30 days; 5th six weeks Mar. 7-Apr. 14, 29 days; 6th six weeks Apr. 18-May 26, 29 days. Special events and holidays are noted thus:

Boy, 11, struck by car, dies of skull injuries

A young eye that strayed along the printed page led 11-year-old Michael Cole to his death in Route 61 Friday afternoon. The boy, son of the Robert Coles, Skinner road, New Haven township, was struck by a sedan driven by Mrs. Donald Clark, 33, 38 Simeon street. Shelby, shortly after 2:30 p.m. He had crossed the highway from where he had left his bicycle to retrieve the mail from the family box. The Advertiser lay on the top of the pile of letters and

second-class mailings after he was struck. Rushed to Willard Municipal hospital, he was immediately transferred to White Cross hospital, Columbus. His family reported he succumbed to severe skull injuries about two blocks from the hospital. Police, who did not hold Mrs. Clark, said the boy's skull hit the windshield post on the right-hand side of the vehicle and jammed the elbow of a small boy riding with Mrs. Clark.

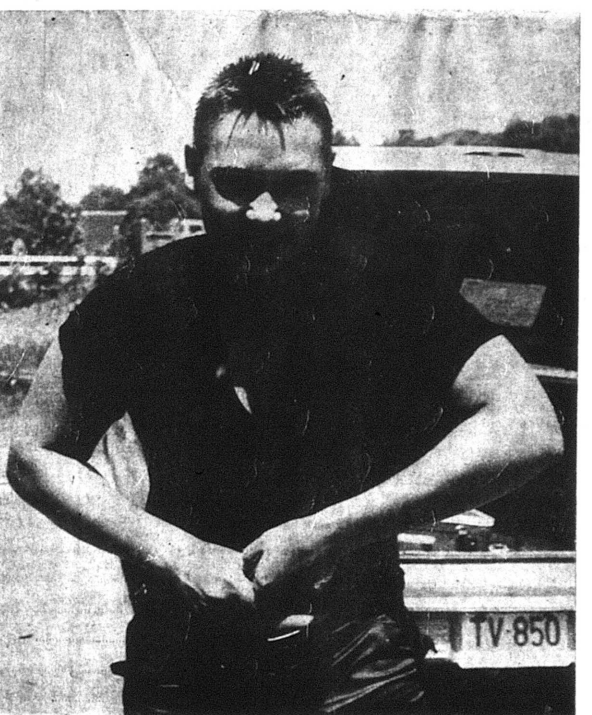
A copious quantity of blood lay on the pavement after the Cole boy was removed in the ambulance. Two sisters, Mrs. Raymond Slessman, New Haven, and Miss Shirley, at home, and two brothers, Robert and James, at home; his paternal grandmother, Mrs. George Cole, Skinner road, and his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Grace Heiteler, Berlin Heights, also survive. Burial in Maple Grove cemetery Monday followed services at 2 p.m.

McCormick out of mayor race

Because he can't have his cake and eat it too, Franklin W. McCormick is withdrawing from the race for mayor. He was told last week that Hatch act provisions prevent his making the run if he wishes to retain his employment in the U.S. Post Office. Since he can't afford to sacrifice his post office pay salary, he's giving up political ambitions. His departure leaves two candidates in the field, incumbent Thurman R. Ford and neophyte William Fazio. At press time yesterday, two hours before deadline, seven

candidates had filed for six councilmanic vacancies. They are incumbents Donald E. Akers, John T. Dick, Omar G. Burkett and Elmer E. Markley, former councilman Charles Vanasdale, Mrs. A. L. Paddock, Jr., and Donald H. Levering. Mrs. James Reynolds and incumbent Carl V. Ellis are the sole candidates for treasurer and clerk, respectively. For two school board vacancies, there are three avowed candidates, incumbent President Donald P. Markley, Mrs. Miles S. Christian and Mrs. Jesse Wayne Hamman. Incumbent Allen R. Wiles

says he won't run again for Huron Valley's Board of Education. Frank H. Burma, Celeryville, is the sole candidate whose petition is on file now. Two vacancies will occur on the board, each for two years. Arthur Cappelletti will probably run again. A. W. Penrose has filed a nominating petition for constable of New Haven township. Arthur W. Heck, local dry cleaner who is a Willard councilman, has declined to seek reelection. Neither will Charles W. Resseger, former Plymouth resident, now council president.

Opposition threat to fire house told

Opposition to purchase of the former theatre building and site for use as a municipal enclave and fire house has retained attorneys to prepare its case, village council learned Tuesday night. Solicitor Joseph F. Dush told the council he learned that Young & Young, Norwalk attorneys, have been retained to oppose acquisition of the site. Their principals were not disclosed. Dush said the pattern of inquiry so far suggests the opposition will resort to a referendum petition to submit to the electorate. IT WAS HERE THE DRAMATIC portion of the meeting occurred. Elmer E. Markley said "some of us were mulling it over and we'd got to the idea that after we found out what we could build we'd submit it to the people." John T. Dick retorted, "That may have been YOUR idea but it was never MY idea. If you put it to the voters you'll never get a fire house."

Thurman Peabody, Norwalk architect, presented two sketches of prospective plans for a fire house. The council will meet today at 8 p.m. in special session to discuss them. DONALD B. SHAVER presented a second time the proposal of Teen-Time Rendevous to build its own headquarters in Mary Kate park. He got a green light to go ahead with drafting of a contract in an informal poll of the council, although Markley bluntly said he knows of substantial opposition to the plan and considerable pressure had been applied to him to obstruct it. Nay vote by Councilman Lowell Keith prevented passage of an emergency measure of an ordinance to reduce rates for pavilion tables in the park. It was approved on first reading only, three-fourths majority being necessary to carry in emergency. Proposed rates: Plymouth residents: 75 cents weekdays, \$1 weekends; Out-of-towners: \$1 daily

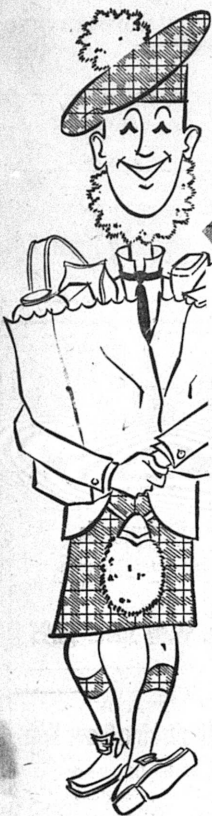

We are delighted that the distaff side has been induced to run for policy-making office.

It's high time a capable woman should be elected.

Women have served in administrative post, and in jobs which require honesty, accuracy and diligence, with much credit to their sex, to themselves, and to their fellow citizens.

And why should they not be elected to policymaking offices?

Consider the facts: that we have more women than we have men, that women own and pay taxes upon more property than men, whether in large cities or in small towns. And when you consider that the American female, over 25 and under 85, owns by far the greater share of the American industrial establishment, there should be no reason to deny her the right and the privilege of making

the policy of the government under which she and her property live and grow.

Each candidacy should be decided upon its merits. If a woman is not level-headed, is not intelligent, alert and fair-minded, then defeat her.

But do not support her opponent merely because he is of the male species.

By the same token, if a woman tosses her chapeau (we think it's a more decorous word than "hat") into the political ring, she should not expect special treatment.

The very nature of politics, whether partisan or non-partisan, is such that candidacies will be cussed and discussed, sometimes impolitely, by voters of every stripe.

We feel sure the lady candidates this year will abide by that rule.

Was he close to the truth?

Effect of the steel strike isn't likely to be felt hereabouts unless and until it runs over a couple of months.

But as citizens we're concerned, just as we're concerned over what may happen in West Berlin, or in Cuba.

From our standpoint, it seems the issues are really not those which have been cussed and discussed by the negotiators for a new contract, but more basic and deep-rooted.

For one, whether the rank and file of the steel unions really want a strike, now, and if the rank and file really controls their unions.

And for another, whether there shouldn't be some means of submitting the claims and counter-claims of both sides to some unbiased, impartial agency for adjudication as to their true merits BEFORE either

protagonist gets a chance to seize the communications media to influence public opinion one way or another.

Such coverage as we've seen leads us to believe there is considerable chaff in the wheat offered for consumption across the bargaining tables and publication in the communications media

We're not necessarily taking any sides. Both industry and the MacDonald gang have made, to our way of thinking, false claims not justified by facts.

And we wonder if our colleague in the communications media wasn't getting pretty near the truth when he asked MacDonald a question that incensed him so much he ordered a couple of goons to destroy the man's camera

It was: "Is your future at stake over this strike?"

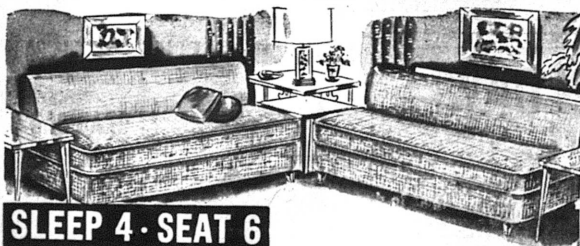

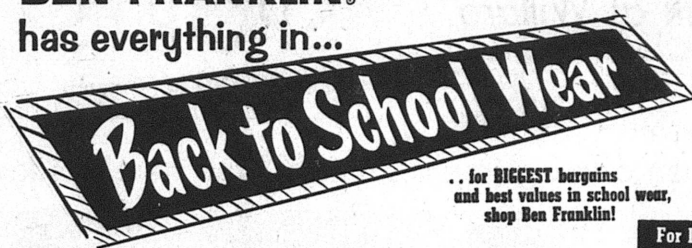
