Morrison, Bright agree to wait a bit

Fire committee will attend the regular monthly fire drill at 7:30 p.m. today to endeavor to find successors for Fire Chief Judson A. Morrison and his assistant, Ray Bright.

Their resignations amended to read "as soon as practicable", the village council accepted them with regret and an expression of appreciation for services rendered Tuesday night. Both Morrison and Bright agreed to serve until successors can be found.

Why it is difficult to find men willing to serve was developed at some length by Chief Morrison and amplified by Mayor Thurman R. Ford. "Firemen don't enjoy public criticism of their efforts when

they work so hard and long under dangerous conditions, yet the public persists," Morrison said.

He added efforts have been repeatedly made to obtain young men in the department, "but we simply can't get them."

It was here Mayor Ford observed, "I think the reason is simply they don't want to tie themselves down."

An effort was made to induce Lester Shields to accept appointment as fire chief. He declined.

Street Supervisor Henry Trauger reported repair of eight catch basins at an average of \$15 in materials and labor each.

HE WAS AUTHORIZED to mow noxious weeds on property in Trux street owned by C. R. Suttles.

Trauger said he has refused to mow weeds for resident taxpayers, on the grounds the village isn't in business and the fee for mowing is seldom enough to cover damage to the mower.

How, he asked, could he mow the Suttles weeds and still be fair?

The council ruled that under the circumstances, the village will mow weeds belonging to out-of-state residents and the expense will be certified on the tax duplicate.

A used tractor has been purchased for \$400. Councilman Lowell Keith was instructed to approach Ray E. Dinger to ascertain if he will sell the building at 38 Sandusky street to the village and if so, for how much.

Board of Public Affairs was empowered to sue F. J. Ervin,

Pupils need not submit certificates of immunization at once, Coon said. A survey card will be sent home with children to seek this necessary data.

Motorcyclist severely injured; Shiloh charged in collision

A 24-year-old Plymouth youth rode a British motorcycle into the side of a station wagon in Trux street at 7:30 p.m. Aug. 26 and received serious head and face lacerations and a compound fracture of the left leg.

Robert Jan Fogleson, employed by McPherson Motor sales, was testing a Triumph motorcycle taken in trade by the firm earlier that day. Headed south in Mill street, he found the brakes inoperative. He collided with the station wagon owned and driven by Donald E. Fettes, headed east in Trux street.

He was thrown from the motorcycle, horribly cut about the face and all but unconscious.

He was rushed to Willard Municipal hospital, where under emergency surgery the wounds were closed and the leg set.

Fettes was held blameless.

Milford Sexton charged

A charge of reckless operation will be laid against a 31-year-old Shiloh man as a

result of the two-car collision in Route 61 north of here at 3:40 p.m. Sunday.

Milford Sexton, driving south, endeavored to overtake a car driven by Parker Graham, 26, 29 West End boulevard, Shelby. Finding this impossible, he turned back into the west lane, striking rear of Graham's car as he did so.

Graham lost control, then went off the west side of the road, rolled over and demolished his car.

Sexton also lost control and careened into the ditch on the east side of the highway, overturned and demolished his car.

Graham and his wife, Shelly, 23, were treated at Willard Municipal hospital and released. Mrs. Graham for contusions of the back and Mr. Graham for bruises of the neck and shoulder.

Parker Graham 2nd, two years old, and Jennie Graham, five, were not injured.

Sexton's passenger, Harrison Reed, 19, Shiloh, was treated for injuries to his right shoulder. Sexton received treatment for laceration of the

face and multiple contusions. State highway patrolmen of the Norwalk post said they would file charges against Sexton Tuesday.

Richard Bisel, 19, Shiloh, received facial lacerations when his car went out of control in Route 96 near Route 13 at 6:35 p.m. Sunday. Headed west in Route 96, he struck a power pole.

All junior high pupils must eat at the school, Supt. M. J. Coon announced Tuesday.

They may use cafeteria services or carry their lunches, he said.

After careful study, we conclude the department of highways ought to:

1. Apply yellow paint in the west or southbound lane of Route 61 so that overtaking by southbound traffic is prohibited in the area of Maple Grove cemetery, the John McKown property and the Bachrach farm.

2. Erect a more substantial sign to the south of the intersection of Route 194 with Route 61 notifying trucks of the extreme low clearance of the un-

derpass a short distance to the north.

If these things had been done at the beginning of the spring, we'd have had less news to print, true. But we'd have been happier, because this is what wouldn't have happened:

1. A 17-year-old girl killed in a head-on collision.

2. A railroader injured when his car collided with a truck which was backing up because it couldn't clear the underpass.

3. Damages which may, after litigation, exceed \$300,000, incurred in six collisions.

The expense to the department of highways would be quite small. The saving in lives and property would be proportionately large.

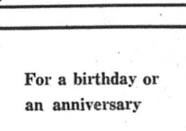
R. F. Hall named by church parley
