

Laundromat leases theater!

Plymouth theatre has been leased for 16 years to an automatic laundry firm. Mayor William Fazio confirmed yesterday morning.

The action by Owner Edward O. Ramsey precludes its sale to the village as a site for a village hall.

The village council met Tuesday in secret session in the village hall — the meeting was called "a committee of the whole" and Clerk Carl V. Ellis was excluded, as was a newspaper reporter — to discuss plans to erect a fire house on the unoccupied portion of the Ramsey site, which he has said he will sell separately, and on other sites.

Plans drawn for a fire house maybe utilized on the site initially intended or another site.

The council was taken completely by surprise and oppo-

nents of its proposed course of action were jubilant that the council has been prevented from spending \$12,000 for a

white elephant" by Ramsey's action. Ramsey had no option or

contract with the village binding him to keep the property available for it.

Lutz to run for common pleas judgeship

Three more candidates want to be sheriffs.

"Eddie" Steel, retired Mansfield police captain, reputed to be "completely incorruptible", has thrown his hat in the ring for the Richland county sheriff's job. He seeks the GOP nomination.

Incumbent Raymond B. (Bus) Bliss, Shelby Democrat, says he'll run for reelection.

In Huron county, Marlen (Mike) Rose, 33-year-old former professional boxer, seeks the Democratic nomination.

Roose lives in Willard, once served as patrolman in Willard, now serves as assistant to U. S. Marshal Sam Crepes in transporting federal prisoners.

Deadline for filing petitions is Wednesday at 4 p.m.

George Kokinda, Lorain county Democrat who waged an unsuccessful fight to unseat Sen. Charles A. Mosher in the 27th-29th district last time, says he's a candidate for the Democratic nomination for the same post now.

CARLETON R. BISHOP, rural Monroeville, will seek the post of Huron county engineer on the Democratic ticket. No opposition is anticipated in the primary.

Incumbent Wilbur R. Terry, Republican, plans to seek reelection.

Charlotte Sims, unsuccessful in an effort to unseat incumbent Harry V. Jump as Huron county representative to the General Assembly, will seek the Democratic nomination again.

Revision of the present replacement-cost-new formula of determining public utilities rates, is a goal of Richard M. Christiansen, 31-year-old Mansfield city solicitor who seeks the Democratic nomination for representative to the General Assembly.

He announced his candidacy Tuesday.

"Many public utilities are charging unreasonable rates and have obtained exorbitant profits at the expense of the public," he says.

A graduate of Madison High school and of Ohio State university, where he obtained his law degree in 1951, Christiansen served three years in the U. S. Navy as a lieutenant.

He resumed law practice in the county seat in 1955.

Married and the father of one child, he belongs to First Methodist church, Mansfield; McVey Post, American Legion; Robert Sprang Post, AmVets; University club, Exchange

club, and is president of Carpenter school P-TA.

He is now in his second term as city solicitor.

Walter Rusk, county engineer, will be his opponent in the primary.

Record tax bill set for Collier's office on first half of 1959

First half of 1959 real estate tax collection is due this week, H. B. Collier, Huron county treasurer, says.

After Jan. 31, the consistent closing date for the past 16 years, a 10 per cent penalty provided by law is mandatory.

The treasurer reports the 1959 tax being collected this year as largest in history. The current full year tax is \$2,326,562.10, one half of which is changed to the treasurer for each half tax. Total delinquencies of former year for the January collection total \$69,281.49. Special assessments for ditches, sewer and water lines, sidewalks, street improvement and such total \$32,802.83.

Total amount charged to the treasurer for January collection is \$1,354,365.37.

Of the delinquent parcels, only 14 are eligible for regular foreclosure, and 18 are eligible for foreclosed land, leaving most offenders in the six months to 24-year bracket.

Foreclosure proceedings are started on those eligible and a forfeited land sale will be in line about June.

Rusk has a common opponent, C. W. (Bud) Remy, 32, Belleville, treasurer of the Mansfield Tire Co., employee credit union, who seeks the nomination.

Prosecutor Theodore Lutz, 54, will file nominating petitions for common pleas judge on the GOP ticket. He's served three terms as prosecutor, only two of them consecutive, and would oppose incumbent James Mayer, Democrat, in November.

J. William McCray, beaten by incumbent A. D. Baumbach, Jr., for 13th district Congress two years ago, will seek the Democratic nomination. The Ellyrian would probably oppose State Sen. Charles A. Mosher of Oberlin in November.

Red whips Ontario for 9th RCL victory

Red-hot Plymouth swept to a 73 to 62 victory over Ontario in Richland County league play here Tuesday night. It was the Big Red's 12th win in 14 starts and ninth straight in conference play.

It was no contest until the final period, when Ontario began to apply a full-court press.

Within four minutes left, and Plymouth leading by 11 at 66 to 55, Jack Lanzan converted a pair of free throws. A minute later, after a wild scramble that saw possession change five times, Don Bowman — he of Butler High school football fame — dropped another pair of free throws.

The lead cut to seven, Plymouth fought back. Dick Bookwalter, who had a big night with 26 points, canned two charity tosses. Lanzan retaliated with one of two and Bookwalter dumped another pair — he was to get 10 of 11 all night — to bring it to 79 to 60 with half a minute remaining.

Roger Walters dumped a twist shot after Craig Harclay converted the first of a duo of free throw tries and that was it.

Ontario outscored Plymouth in the final period by eight. It was apparent that for several minutes the Big Red didn't know how to, or at least wasn't able to, cope with the full-court press.

Bookwalter's rebounding was what established the Big Red lead, although Steve Patterson's quarter-court shots astounded the visitors.

The former Plymouth boy, Jack Gage, accounted for 16 points for Ontario. Vaunted

Rick Rupp was held to a paltry field goal.

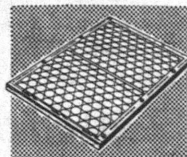

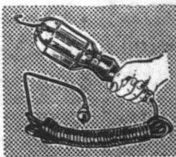

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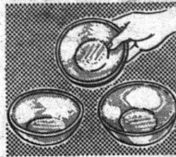

ROUNDBALL HAS ETHICAL QUESTIONS, OLD TIMER SUGGESTS

An effort to interest Plymouthers in the delights of golf as a healthy recreation is being launched by Don Baker, new pro at Willard Golf club.

He's undertaking a series of lessons for tyros and inexperienced players. If he can develop sufficient interest, he'll stage them here. Cost: \$1 per player for five lessons, totaling \$5.

Clubs will be furnished for those without clubs.

An eight-town inter-city league will be organized to play Wednesday evenings and Fridays, Baker says. Republic, Attica, Bellevue, Greenwich, Plymouth, Norwalk, Monroeville and North Fairfield are included.

Persons who may be interested in learning to play golf are invited to say so by tele-

phone or postal card to John F. Root, Tel. 7-5284, or to the Old Timer by postal card only.

THERE'S BEEN SOME talk about ethics in roundball. Is it ethical for a coach to teach his players to draw fouls? Is it ethical for a player to foul deliberately to obtain possession in a close game? Is it ethical for a coach to direct his team in a slowdown of play, called a stall or ball-control type of play, to cope with a racehorse, high-scoring outfit? Is it ethical for a coach to instruct his team to "freeze" the ball during the ultimate minutes of a close contest?

A good many parents, many of them not familiar with the game, are beginning to show some alarm because they hear their sons — and daughters, too, in some cases — talk about steps to win at all costs.

From our standpoint, the object of the game is to win. If it is not, then why keep score?

But just where does sportsmanlike conduct stop and unethical conduct start? The rules of the game, as developed by Oswald Tower, don't make that crystal clear.

WE HAPPEN TO THINK it is unethical for a player to draw a foul, or to foul deliberately to gain possession.

We do happen to think it isn't unethical for a coach to direct his team to slow down, or play ball control, to beat a racehorse outfit. And we think it isn't unethical to "freeze" the ball in the last minutes of play.

The professionals have coped with the last technique by

requiring a shot at the basket within 24 seconds. Whether this would help or hinder schoolboy ball remains to be seen. It seems worth trying.

It's true the object is to win. But in schoolboy ball, it's also important to develop attitudes of sportsmanship and fair play. And we think the vicious approach of teaching players to draw fouls and of fouling deliberately simply isn't the kind of thing that our young men ought to be taught.

From the standpoint of the man on the business end of the whistle, it's sometimes an impossible assignment. Who can tell what's deliberate and what isn't, except in the baldest cases?

When you teach a boy to do these hateful things, you also teach him to do them skillful-

ly. Fagin taught his pocket-pickers stealth first of all.

In some cases, not in this state, but where roundball emphasis was getting out of hand, the highpowered game was dropped in favor of low-pressure basketball: afternoon games, smaller crowds, keep-

ing the game entirely for the pupils, and even dropping interscholastic competition in favor of a vigorous intra-mural program.

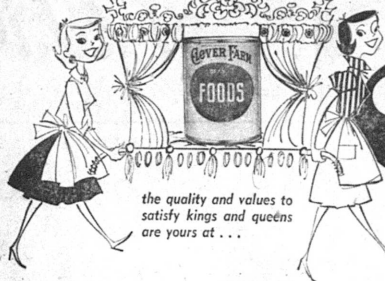
We wouldn't like to see this happen. But somewhere the line has to be drawn. Better draw it now than too late.

It's time to think about the kind of man we want for sheriff

Such a plethora of candidates has filed for the sheriff's job in Huron and Richland counties that a voter needs a scorecard to tell them apart.

Seven have filed for the post in Huron county — three Republicans and four Democrats. And in Richland county there are two, with the prospect of two more before the deadline Wednesday at 4 p. m.

As we've pointed out before, the sheriff's job is the best-paying one in the county government, so far as real income goes.

In addition to his salary, which has recently been raised, to go into effect with the coming term, he has perquisites which are worth real money. And they're tax free. His lodging, utilities, clothing, transportation and food are paid for at county expense.

We've not had time to investigate the qualifications of all of the candidates, something we intend to do before election day in May. But there are some observations that occur to us which we think ought to be considered by every voter, regardless of his political party membership.

One is that the job of law enforcement shouldn't be affected by one's politics. The laws are drawn by Republicans, Democrats and independents and they apply to all residents, citizens and non-citizens, voters and

non-voters, with equal effect.

And a sheriff ought to enforce the law without fear or favor, with no reference to one's politics, at all times.

Another is that a sheriff really isn't a policy maker — the policy he pursues is laid down by higher authority — and so it doesn't matter really whether he's a Democrat, a Republican or a Prohibitionist.

Life in each county has ceased to be essentially rural in its nature. The sheriff's department has a bigger role than ever before. It must cope with a different kind of society, and therefore a different kind of offense, than was the rule a generation ago.

Thus the sheriff nowadays must be a sound administrator, a good public relations officer and something of a transportation expert.

So when a voter chooses a candidate, he should look for one whose character and ethics are of the highest order and whose technical abilities show signs of being able to cope with the changing nature of the society to be served.

We shall look carefully into the records of each candidate and in time submit recommendations. The standards upon which they shall be judged will be those which we have set forth, with absolutely no reference to their political party affiliations.

Hooray for Jimmy!

Our good friend Jimmy Fettes gets his Eagle Scout badge at Mansfield tonight.

We join with his many friends in congratulating him and wishing him well in the future.

He becomes the seventh Eagle Scout, if records available to long-time Scouters are correct, among the 576 boys in Plymouth who've been members of the Scouting movement since it was organized here 31 years ago.

It's not easy to become an Eagle Scout, and it's no less easy to be one. In the true sense of it, that is.

Last week, Johnny Appleseed council honored a man who is and has been a real Eagle Scout for longer than many of us can remember. Floyd Dent served Scouting well and deserves every honor that has come to him.

We are not without Scouters in this community who've given their

time and effort to make the program work, men such as Don Einsel and Jim Root. The former is less active than he was, but his interest is not dead. Not by a long shot. Only last week he handed us a story about reorganization of the Scout committee.

Mr. Root has been elected chairman of the Black Fork organization, which has jurisdiction over Shiloh, Plymouth and Shelby Scouting.

Elsewhere today we report Scout committees doings. And in still another story, we report that Community chest funds have been authorized for payment to the Boy Scout and Cub Scout organizations.

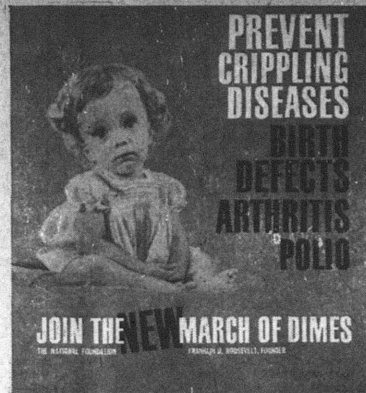

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, FIXING THE SALARY OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE WATER AND LIGHT PLANT, THE SALARY OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF THE WATER AND LIGHT PLANT, THE SALARY OF THE ASSISTANT CLERK OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS, THE SALARY OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE, THE SALARY OF THE STREET SUPERINTENDENT, THE SALARY OF THE CEMETERY SEXTON, WAGE RATES TO BE PAID UN-SKILLED LABOR, WAGE RATES TO BE PAID SKILLED LABOR, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT:

SECTION 1. Beginning on the 16th day of January, 1960, the following salaries and wage rates shall apply to salaried positions and labor in the service of the village:

(1) The Superintendent of Water and Light Plant, \$5400 annually, payable semi-monthly.

(2) The Assistant Superintendent of the Water and Light Plant, \$5000 annually, payable semi-monthly.

(3) The Assistant Clerk of the Board of Trustees of Public Affairs, \$2400 annually, payable semi-monthly.

(4) The Chief of Police, \$4580 annually, payable semi-monthly.

(5) The Street Superintendent, \$3750 payable semi-monthly.

(6) The Cemetery Sexton, \$3750, payable semi-monthly.

(7) Semi-skilled labor, \$1.65 per hour.

(8) Unskilled labor \$1.50 per hour.

SECTION 2. This ordinance is an emergency measure, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety and shall go into immediate effect, the reason for this emergency being that the salaries and wage rates herein provided are necessary at this time to keep and have qualified employees to operate the various departments of the Village for the protection of the lives and health of the people.

This ordinance is an emergency measure, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, welfare and safety and shall go into immediate effect, the reason for this emergency being that the funds herein appropriated are necessary to be appropriated for the operation of the departments of the village directly concerned for the protection of the lives and health of the people of the village.
