Plymouth's up-and-down Big Red closes its 1960 home season in Mary Fate park to night versus Colonel Crawford of North Robinson, a vastly improved team from what appeared here in the preview.

Coach Lew Petit's outfit has to lay its all-even record on the line, favored by eight points to send that record to four wins and three defeats.

Crawford defeated Mt. Vernon St. Vincent, 22 to 12, in Galion last week.

To win, the Eagles will need a sterling performance from Bill Cook, a 17-year-old senior who weighs only 142, the spark plug who fires the four cylinder Crawford attack. Gary Walker, Crawford coach, thinks his outfit may do well despite its relative inexperience. "At least," he says, "we aren't downhearted because some obviously superior clubs

like Crestline walloped us but good."

This will be the final home appearance for eight Big Red seniors. Dayton Reed, Jim Russell, Dan Carter, Ken Van Loo, Ben Root, Fate Christian, Noah Sammons and Gary Fletcher wind up their schoolboy careers this season.

The road after tonight begins to get rough. Western Reserve would rather whip Plymouth than eat and Bellville has a long-standing superior-

ity over the Big Red on the gridiron.

Petitmen wallop winless Milan, 40-6

Dayton Reed passed Plymouth to an easy 40 to 6 win over Milan in a North Central conference game here Friday.

It was no contest, really, before the game was two minutes old. The Big Red scored 22 points in the first period and never was in danger. The single Indian score came with five seconds left.

Plymouth moved smartly from its 35 into touchdown territory after the opening kickoff. Seven plays covered 65 yards, the last one a 12-yard heave from Reed to Jim Russell. Reed hit Ken Van Loo for the PAT.

Van Loo intercepted Ohlemacher's pass on the Red 47. After Riedy had advanced from the Indian 35 to the 43 on the first play after Bob Young's kickoff. He got 23 yards into Milan territory before being felled. Then Reed threaded the needle with a toss down the left sideline and Plymouth had another score. The play covered 30 yards.

Reed passed to Carter for the PAT.

Dick Lewis threw a downfield block that sprung Russell loose for the third touchdown of the period after Mi-

lan had intercepted a Reed toss intended for Van Loo. Milan ran out of gas on the Red 42. Carter and Reed punched up to the Indian 44 and Reed threw to Russell, who surely covered 60 yards on his 44-yard jaunt to the goal. Lewis' block cleared the last two Indian defenders from the route.

Reed failed to convert on a rollout.

THREE EXCHANGES Later, with sophomore Jim Hamman running the team, the winners had another touchdown. Hamman sent Russell through tackle for 10 and then hit him with a flat pass. Russell threaded his way through a broken field to score. The play covered 31 yards.

Hamman's pass for the PAT was blocked.

Miln could not move. But in young Ohlemacher it presented a schoolboy punter whose peer has seldom been seen in Mary Fate park. The boy booted for a 39-yard average during the first half.

The second half was much as the first, although Plymouth's second string played much of the time.

Dag Carter staged a magnificent 54-yard dash down the

far sideline after taking Ohlemacher's 37-yard punt from scrimmage. With possession on the Milan 27, the Big Red had a score in three plays. Russell bucked for eight, Reed pitched to Van Loo for 18, the big end falling out of the playing field before catching the ball, and then the Red quarterback tossed to Russell for the score.

The pitchout to Carter for the PAT didn't connect.

Milan couldn't get off a dime in the next series and relinquished possession on its 40. Russell dashed 31 yards off tackle and then Reed turned the touchdown duties over to Fate Christian, who required only three shots for the score.

Roger McQuown was spilled on the try for PAT.

Bibb's pass to Mansfield, good for 22 yards, produced the only Milan score, late in the fourth period.

Six in Ferguson Family on State Payroll,

Draw \$50,484 Annually

State Treasurer Joseph T. Ferguson and five members of his family are on the state payroll at salaries totaling \$50,484 a year.

The records also show that a seventh member of the Ferguson family, James D. Ferguson is on a leave of absence from his \$5520-a-year job in the State Welfare Department to run for state auditor.

In addition, two members of the family have been drawing overtime pay in the treasurer's office.

The roster of the Fergusons on the state payroll, their jobs and salaries:

Treasurer Ferguson, \$15,000.

Thomas Ferguson, his father's administrative aide, \$34,400.

LEO FERGUSON, Joe's brother, treasurer's office, \$7200. Mrs. Joan Gotherman, Joe's daughter, treasurer's office, (part-time) \$3960.

Elizabeth Ferguson, Joe's sister, Bureau of Motor Vehicles, \$3024.

Joseph T. Ferguson, Joe's son, highway department, \$6,900.

THE RECORDS disclosed Administrative Aide Tom, considered a likely prospect to run for state treasurer two years from now if his father retires from the active political field, has drawn \$271.83 in overtime pay so far this year and in the last two weeks of 1959.

Rhodes Over Ferguson

It's still three months until Election Day and there's still much campaigning to be done, but there's no reason for anyone to take more time to make up his mind how to vote in the state auditor race.

There the incumbent, James A. Rhodes, is opposed by James D. Ferguson. Rhodes not only deserves re-election wholeheartedly on his excellent record in office. He deserves it additionally because of a special condition involving Ferguson.

Under the Ohio Constitution, the auditor is the state's chief accounting officer, and it's his main duty to keep full and accurate accounts of all moneys, bonds, stocks, securities and the like paid in or out of the treasury, or deposited in or transferred out of the treasury.

So who is the state treasurer now? Joseph T. Ferguson Sr., the father of James D. Rhodes' opponent.

Besides the matter of principal involved here, there's the elder Ferguson's philosophy to be considered. Joe Ferguson always has liked to get as many of his immediate family on the state payroll as possible. According to the latest list we saw, two of his sons, a daughter, a sister and a brother are so employed now, at annual salaries totaling more than \$35,000.

Would another Ferguson in a top state office break ground for the hiring of another batch of Ferguson relatives on the state payroll? We see no reason to doubt that this would happen.

The best way to keep it from happening is to vote against James Ferguson and for Auditor Rhodes who, as we said in the beginning, deserves re-election anyway.

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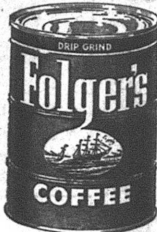

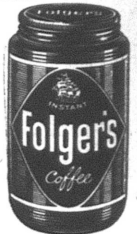

Where we stand --- and why

Some important issues appear on the general election ballot. Electors should give them serious thought.

To one of them, it is plain to us that a favorable vote should be accorded. It is the 10-mill operating levy for the public schools. Only half of one mill is new taxation. The remaining 9½ mills are a renewed tax, a continuation of a tax now in force.

Some patrons of the district may believe there are some economies to be made. We think there probably are. But it would be wrong to vote no on this issue because of this fact. Press for economies at the budget hearing and during regular board meetings. Don't burn down the barn to make roast pig. Vote yes on the school operating levy issue. Figure on closing the schools if you don't.

The initiative referendum on purchase of the Hubach site requires no support. Vote no.

The two mill village operating levy doesn't expire this year. It is a precept of good government that legislative bodies should ask for and be given moneys as and when they are needed. The council admits it needs the moneys in 1962 and 1963. When that time comes, every citizen will review the council's record with the moneys already authorized and decide whether to continue them. That is what we shall do. And it's why we urge every voter to say no to the two

mill operating levy.

For six years we have vigorously supported the sanitary sewer issue. We have been instrumental in developing plans and in making them intelligible to the electorate. If the issue failed of passage, it wasn't because we didn't try.

The village council this year has, we think, been remiss in its management of this problem. There is no plan nor reasonable presentation of costs or financing of the sanitary sewer system. We don't even know what kind of system will be installed, or where.

Would you run your business this way? Would you send Junior off to college with a blank check, a sort of "Let me know what it costs when you get there", when Junior might buy a new convertible?

We think not. It pains us to say so, but we think a no vote is in order. Vote no on the sewer bond issue.

Richland county voters have a health levy and a special tax to finance a new court house addition. The health levy isn't new, the addition levy is. Both are entitled to support.

Huron county voters have a health and welfare levy on their ballots. Although we feel there have been some abuses of the welfare part of it, it does not seem proper to us to defeat the renewal.
