Prosecutor in the case was Attorney Henry E. Young, who was appointed to the case as assistant counsel to Prosecutor Bernard W. Freeman, who was absent from the city at the start of the trial Thursday.

Mrs. McKown was indicted by the grand jury with the charge stemming from a head-on collision in Rt. 61 south of New Haven, which took the life of Miss Ryan.
