

\$45,000 firehouse to be dedicated Saturday at 2 p. m.

The new, \$45,000 firehouse built upon the ashes of Plymouth's only fire facility, will be dedicated in special ceremonies at 2 p. m. Saturday.

Built at the site of the old frame building in Fortner street just off the Square, the 60 x 58 foot concrete block structure has four bays, can accommodate six vehicles, and was designed by Thurman Peabody, Norwalk architect. It will house three units of the fire department and three

Policemen-Firemen's hall in American Legion hall at 8:30 p. m. will climax the dedication day program. The Emajns will play for dancing.

vehicles of the second platoon, 52nd Mobile Support Group, OGD.

A sub-basement of the east side of the building affords an assembly room and lavatory space.

Fire Chief J. A. Morrison will be master of ceremonies. Mayor William Fazio and Col. Leroy Johns, Chagrin Falls, director of the 5th Area, Ohio Civil Defense will speak briefly.

Other guests will include Wilson McLaughlin, Sandusky, state fire marshal; Earl Campbell, Napoleon, secretary of the Northwest Ohio Volunteer Firemen's association; James R. Logan of the Adjutant General's department of the State of Ohio, and Ralph R. Hem-

minger of Fostoria, commander of the 52nd Mobile Support Group.

The firehouse will be open before and after the ceremonies for public inspection.

ALTHOUGH A VOLUNTEER group of firemen served the village as early as 1886, the first formal organization was formed in January, 1922. W. H. Fettes was the first fire chief and Ross Sourwine the secretary.

Mr. Fettes resigned July 6, 1922, because the duties conflicted with his position on the board of public affairs. Bert S. Marvin then took over the duties and C. W. Babcock was

the assistant chief.

It was in that year that a fire siren was purchased through subscription and the volunteers joined the Northwestern Volunteer Firemen's association.

Membership roll included C. Brown, Roscoe Becker, Bert Marvin, Clayton Williams, Grover DeVier, F. B. Stewart (who later served as chief) C. W. Babcock, Luther R. Fettes, Arthur Myers, Fred Clark, Paul Russell, Clinton C. Moore, Albert Marvin, Frank Weck, Ross Sourwine and Thurman R. Ford.

Their equipment was a motless vehicle pulled by ropes.

In 1928 a Ford truck was purchased. It is still in use. In 1948 the "new" fire engine was bought. Plans are underway to purchase a newer model soon.

The present volunteer group has 20 members. Clayton Williams is the longest continuing member and Howard Miller is second. Others are Woodward Smith, deputy chief; Woodrow Utis, R. Harold Mack, Quentin R. Ream, Francis Guthrie, Percy Dean, Billy Vanderpool, Ronald Munes, C. M. McPherson, Wallace Redman, George Shesho, Harold Ross, Lester Sheld, Jerome Moore, LaVerne Moore, William Van Wagner and Labe Williamson.

Dalton McDougal, now a state plumbing inspector, served as chief for a number of years. He was succeeded by Ray Bright, who was followed by J. A. Morrison.

When a mobile unit of the Ohio Civil Defense corps was stationed in Plymouth, fire protection got a useful shot in the arm. The equipment includes a large tank truck and extremely modern fire fighting aids.

The unit was begun in August, 1954, with Police Chief Robert L. Meiser as captain. The next year James C. Davis took over the duties. For several years the vehicles were inadequately housed and there was a strong chance the unit

would be withdrawn from Plymouth. It was a forceful argument in favor of building a firehouse which would have space for this equipment.

But you've got to get your reservations in on Jan. 2 at these addresses:

Lake Hope, Zaleskie, O., 44 cabins;

Pymatuning, Andover route 1, O., 35 cabins;

Hueston Woods, 6850 Broad road, Oxford, O., 34 cabins;

Pike Lake, Bainbridge route 2, O., 11 cabins;

South Bass Island, Pt. Clinton route 1, O., three group cabins;

Maximum rental period on vacation cabins is two weeks.

Charges vary from \$45 to \$60 a week for housekeeping units. Some of these sleep up to eight persons. Sleeping cabins, with no cooking facilities, range in price from \$9 to \$20 a day, depending on size.

A \$10 deposit is required to hold the reservation.

Each of the sites is on fresh water, with boating, fishing and swimming, in surroundings maintained by the state as a park.

A 45-year-old Mansfielder en route to Plymouth to visit friends and to review guitar lessons with a 13-year-old junior high school pupil died in the flaming wreckage of his car in Route 605 east of Shiloh Saturday night.

Thomas Grohol, 555 North Mulberry street, an accomplished musician, intended to

spend the evening with another musician and his wife. Why his station wagon left the road at the small bridge east of Shiloh is unknown. It struck the bridge abutment, careened into the stream bed and burst into flames. State highway patrolmen said Grohol died instantly of multiple fractures and burning.

Shiloh firemen extinguished the blaze, too late to rescue the driver.

His mother, Mrs. Dora Grohol, two brothers and a sister survive. Mrs. James F. Hebbeler, pastor of St. Peter's Roman Catholic church, was celebrant during last rites conducted in the church Tuesday at 9 a. m.

Huron relief funds exhausted, Lawrence tells commissioners

"Poor relief situation in Huron county is worse than at any time in the past 20 years," county commissioners were told today by County Welfare Director George W. Lawrence.

"Poor relief money for 1960 is exhausted and we are overdrawn in the county auditor's office by a total of \$12,807.02. There are outstanding obligations of \$6,516.81," Lawrence told the commissioners.

Poor relief expenditures in November totalled \$22,340.54 as compared with \$14,951.40 in 1959 and \$14,229.97 in 1958. December needs are estimated at \$20,000 and the department cannot carry on its poor relief

program unless additional funds are forthcoming from the state.

Eleven months' encumbrances total \$217,159.01 as compared with \$211,637.10 for all of 1959. The case load has risen from 117 in November, 1959, to 220 in November, 1960.

Welfare department has also expended in the 12-month period \$274,786.47 for aid to dependent children, aid to needy blind, and aid for the permanently and totally disabled. A net increase of 39 cases occurred in these programs. A comparison shows payrolls as follows:

Aid to dependent children families, Dec. 1959, 8,202 — Dec. 1960, 13,175. Aid to needy blind singles, Dec. 1959, 1,780 — Dec. 1960, 1,963. Aid to disabled singles, Dec. 1959 3,824 — Dec. 1960, 5,036.

The four assistance programs cover a total expenditure of \$441,955.88. Of this amount only \$21,000, or five per cent of the total, comes from the county general fund. Balance comes from state and federal funds.

Expenditures for child welfare will total \$35,000 and operation of the building, including permanent improve-

ments, \$15,000. Included in this item are the contributions made by the commissioners for operation of three classes of retarded children, including quarters, heat, light, janitor service, gasoline, oil and repairs for three station wagons travelling almost 300 miles a day during the school year.

Federal government subsidies the child welfare program by contributing approximately \$5,000 to administrative expense.

Neither the child welfare program nor the retarded classes receive any funds from the health and welfare tax levy.
