Born in Richland county, Mrs. Ockley lived in Lucas until 1932, when the family moved to Marysville.

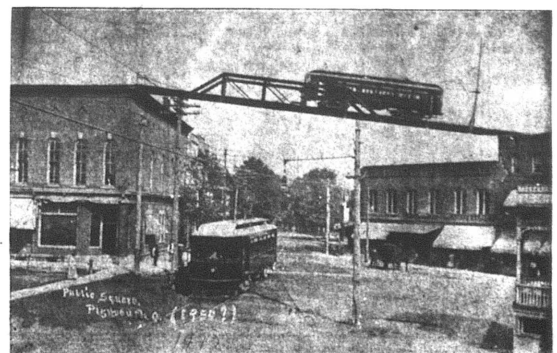
