Council looks toward purchase of vacant land behind theatre

Acquisition of a fire house site moved a step nearer fruition Tuesday night when village council looked with favor on an offer by Edward O. Ramsey to sell 1.06 acres of vacant land in East Main street for \$5,000.

The council will meet in special session Tuesday to debate the issue. Ramsey was invited to be present.

Ramsey said he wishes to retain seven feet at the east edge of the Gleason property to accommodate Mrs. Karl

Gleason. He said he would deduct the selling price of this parcel from the 5,000.

Councilman D. H. Levering said he still leans toward the Hubach site, which Mayor William Fazio said had been informally negotiated for at a price of \$5,000.

It was a remarkable session, and the council seemed disposed to consider a new firehouse with less impatience than heretofore.

By the time it had turned to other discussions, these trends were clear:

1. Although a new firehouse is of vital importance, the council wants a little time to consider Ramsey's newest offer.

2. Funds available won't permit construction of a new municipal building and firehouse simultaneously.

3. Two other sites have been considered, seem impossible of acceptance, but are not ruled out.

4. Fire department is impatient with the council's delay.

BOARD OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS plan to install a six-inch water main from Park avenue through Walnut street to West Broadway fell on deaf ears, at

least for the time being. In absence of Luther R. Fetters, Elmer E. Markley presented the Board's plan to establish a ring of water service from the eight-inch main in Park avenue to West Broadway.

Councilman Charles Vansandale said the plan doesn't answer the need as set down by petitioners, although he thinks the plan is "all right if we had enough money to do it".

By the time Donald E. Akers had expressed in measured tones his doubts that the council should approve the plan without more details, this was the sense of the meeting.

Vansandale struck at the Board in one mild sally. "My idea is the Board will spend us out of money, then go to assessment for the new water line, which is what the Board has wanted from the very beginning."

Street Supervisor Henry Trauger declined to execute his new contract with a clause that he must report to the police chief. Although the council was firm that some channel of responsibility must be

Census of 1,812 claimed for here

Anticipating the 1960 decennial census, Ohio Division of Vital Statistics estimates Plymouth's population has increased about 20 per cent since 1950.

According to the division's estimates, Richland county residents now number 1,041, an increase of 172 since 1950, or 17.9 per cent. Huron county residents total 771, according to the estimate, an increase of 130, or 20.28 per cent, since 1950.

Shiloh's population advanced by only 10.69 per cent, from 855 to 725, an increase of 70, says the division.

The figures are only estimates and stand to be corrected late in April when the head count in connection with the federal census is completed.

By the estimates, Plymouth village has a population of 1,812. An ad hoc count by an Advertiser reporter Sunday showed only 1,628.

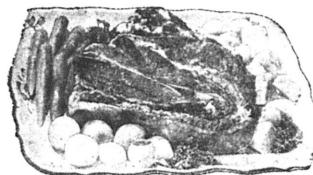

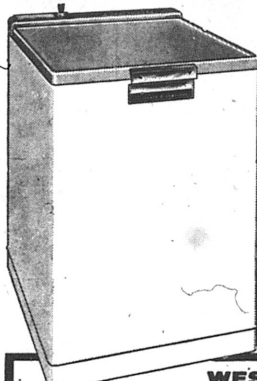

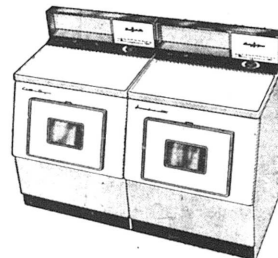

Mayor Fazio instructed the solicitor to prepare a resolution establishing a municipal planning commission.
