Mrs. Harry Broome will be appointed sheriff to fill the unexpired term of her husband, three-term veteran law enforcement officer who died in Fisher-Titus Memorial hospital, Norwalk, of a heart ailment Saturday.

Mrs. Broome will assume her duties as soon as the legal technicalities can be completed, commissioners said Monday.

Sheriff Broome, who had been ill several months, was 70. He was completing his third term. Owing to ill health, he had planned to retire and was not a candidate to succeed himself.

Born in Greenwich, Sheriff Broome went to Norwalk 39 years ago. He was for many years employed by Norwalk Produce Co., predecessor of Norwalk Truck Lines, Inc.

In 1943, he became a deputy sheriff. He was elected sheriff on the Republican ticket in 1948.

A member of Norwalk PBOZ, Buckeye State Sheriffs association, Huron County McKinley club and Broome-Wood Post, American Legion, New London (named partly for his late brother, Lawrence E.,

World War I), Sheriff Broome is also survived by a daughter, Mrs. Robert Dent, a brother and a sister.

Nimmons wins Lofland award, DiSalle warns taxing to go up

"Do we want to balance budgets at the expense of people who can't take care of themselves?" Gov. Michael V. DiSalle asked a packed house in Plymouth Elementary school Thursday as the Chamber of Commerce celebrated its fourth birthday.

Gov. DiSalle, the first incumbent governor to pay a formal visit to this community of 1,625, dwelt at length upon the cost of government programs demanded by the people.

He said Ohio's past record "is very poor" and called upon better standards of decency and develop a better society, the kind of society we'll be proud of, in a state living up to its responsibilities where brotherhood means just what the word implies."

supporter of civic organizations, a former school board member, Nimmons served in the army of occupation in Germany in 1918-19. He is a member of Elmer-Parson Post 447, American Legion. Married to the former Ruth Fintrock, he is the father of a daughter, Marian R., now Mrs. Earl C. Cashman.

Franklin W. McCormick, past president of the Chamber received from its executive secretary, Miss Madeleine H. Smith, a special award for his leadership over the past two years. Miss Smith was surprised when President Ross handed her a plaque inscribed "in testimony of devotion above and beyond the call of duty."

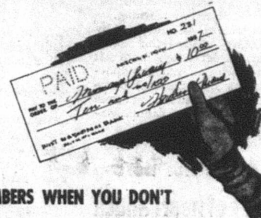

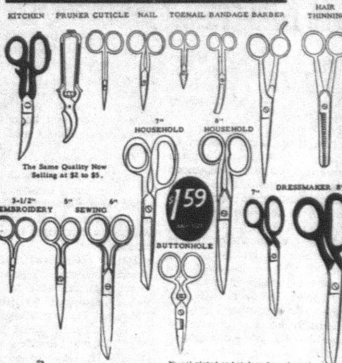

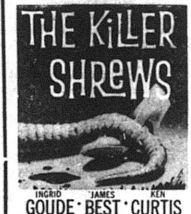

DiSalle defends deficit financing for welfare needs

DiSalle related at length his experiences in inspecting state mental institutions and seemed on occasion, anguished by the recollection of the sick he saw and the inmates he detected. "If you could have come with me, I feel sure that if we asked you to pay double what you are paying now, you would think it's too little," he said.

The governor cited statistics relating to penal institutions: 28 per cent of the inmates in the Mansfield Reformatory have been at Lancaster; 22 percent of those at Marion have been either at London or Mansfield.

"Professional people in the mental health field and in criminology stayed away from Ohio in droves," the governor asserted, "because they saw we were a state going nowhere in these important fields."

Part of the climate for healthy industry, he said, so that industry can grow to produce the revenues needed by improved welfare programs demanded by the people, "is established by simply improving what programs we have now."

NEW RUMLEY
Under an avalanche of charging Indians along the Little Big Horn river in far off Montana, ended the life of one of Ohio's most famous Generals, George A. Custer, 11 years after the close of the Civil War.
Today this monument marks the site of his birthplace in the hamlet of New Rumley in Harrison County.
In 1861 when there was a great need in the Union army for trained officers, Custer, then in his third year at West Point Military Academy, was commissioned a Lieutenant of Cavalry in time to serve in the first battle of Bull Run.
He rose rapidly in rank and at the end of that war was the youngest Major General in the Union forces and a division commander under General Grant other Ohio cavalry leader, Gen. Philip H. Sheridan. It has been said that during the Civil War, General Custer had 11 horses shot under him but he lived to serve for a decade on the Indian frontier in the West.

Best kept secret of the week was the award of the Carl M. Lofland Memorial plaque to J. Elden Nimmons. His associates in Peoples National bank wished for photography in color. His best-red face would have contrasted, they said, with the St. Patrick's day green.

Mr. Nimmons insisted he was bowled over by the award, although coffee klatch speculation was that he would be its winner.

ALTHOUGH GOVERNOR DiSalle's appearance was billed as nonpolitical, a strong contingent of candidates running under the Democratic banner was present. Applause for the governor's entry was led by Harlow Stapf, Huron county Democratic chairman. Not a single GOP office holder or candidate was noted among the 200 diners.

GOVERNOR DISALLE'S ready wit won prompt laughter. He said he noted President McKinley was the last great figure to visit here — and he was assassinated. "They asked me why I should come to Plymouth," the retort chief executive said, "when on St. Patrick's day I had invitations from several Irish societies. Plymouth is a small town, they told me, and almost wholly Republican. But I said, 'I've got to do something, and if Plymouth is almost entirely Republican, what've I got to lose?'"

NEWSPAPER COVERAGE of the event was broad. One seasoned newspaperman who came here asked the Plymouth editor how many people live in the town. Some 1,625, he was told. "There's more hard news of a genuinely interesting character coming from

Plymouth than from any town in our four-county area," he said.

KNOWING 'TEEN-AGERS took issue with advertisements by Supt. M. J. Con that both musicians are bachelors. "One of 'em," they said, "is gonna take the b.g. step this summer — she's blonde and teaches in Youngstown." Confirmation couldn't be obtained, but the accused blushed.

APPEARANCE OF JUNIOR sheriff's deputies in uniform delighted the boys and some of their friends.

TUESDAY'S VOTE IN Huron Valley district was labelled by one man who's lived in it half a century as a "choice between leprosy and cancer". The best solution, he argued, wasn't offered to Huron Valley voters. He said he'll work for shearing off of contiguous territory so it can join Plymouth district.

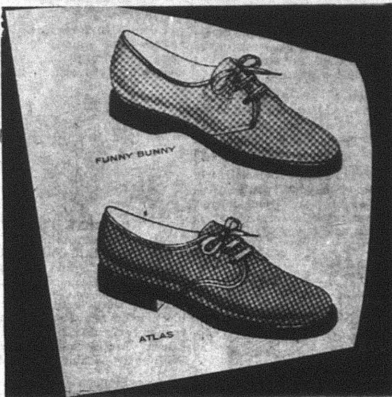

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, ESTABLISHING A MUNICIPAL PLANNING COMMISSION FOR THE SAID VILLAGE, DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL, VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, THAT: SECTION 1. A municipal Planning Commission is hereby established under the terms of Section 713.01, Ohio Revised Code, to consist of five (5) members, the mayor or member of the legislative authority to be elected thereby for the remainder of his term as such member of the legislative authority, and three (3) citizens of the Village, to be appointed by the mayor for terms of six (6) years each, the term of one of the members of the first commission to be for four (4) years, and one for two (2) years. All members shall serve without compensation.
