"The combined slogan was very effective last year," he said. "It helped us alert the families of Shelby area to the silent and insidious ways of cancer, and to methods of safe-guarding the family against the hazards of this disease.

"The Cancer society supports more than 1,000 scientists who are trying to defeat cancer for all time. But there is so much we can do about this disease right new. Rightnow, we con, and must, try to save the lives thaf are wasted every year, I refer to the 85,000 people who die of cancer simply because they don't get to the doctor in time.
