



# Red gives 64-pointed answer to question: 'Who's Plymouth?'

To 1,400 fans who wanted to know, "Where's Plymouth?" Coach Harold E. Daup's Big Red delivered a pointed answer Saturday night — 64-pointed, that is.

Plymouth swamped Bellevue, 64 to 39, in the second round of the district AA basketball tourney, taking a lead with the first basket that was never relinquished.

Dick Bookwalter, who was to score 19 points this frosty night, broke the ice for the Big Red. He took a pass down the middle from Jim Russell and laid one home. Craig Harnly hit a corner shot and the Big Red was off and running.

**THE RED THREW A MODIFIED** zone defense against the Redmen, which simply couldn't get going. There were those who said Bellevue left its journey on the floor, having eked a two-point win over Clyde the night before.

Only Dave Hutchins, giant center, could score with any consistency against Plymouth. He had five in the first eight minutes, half of Bellevue's total.

What beat the Redmen more than anything else was what the basketball technician calls turnovers. During the first half, Bellevue got off a shot from an offensive maneuver starting in its backcourt only 52 per cent of the time. Plymouth's figure was 86 per cent, a total which fell substantially because Plymouth was a different — and a poorer — club in the third quarter.

Bookwalter scored seven of his 19 during the first period, when Plymouth seized a 16 to 10 lead, and added eight in the second. He was double-teamed in the last half and got only

four points.

Steve Patterson broke Bellevue apart in the closing minutes of the second period, when for a moment it appeared the Redmen might find themselves. After Phil Beachey had banged one home from the penalty stripe, after a hacking job by Marv Cok, Patterson swished three in a row. Plymouth went to the dressing room at half-time with a 35 to 16 lead, having bagged 15 of 40 tries from the field. Bellevue had such a cold second quarter — one of 17 — that a superhuman effort was required after the half.

The Redmen came out and shot six for 17 in the third can, while Plymouth was bagging only three of 10. Leading 64 to 30 at the third-quarter stop, the Big Red poured it on during the final canto, shooting eight of 13 tries while the Redmen were doing badly with three of 24.

When the issue was no longer in any doubt, Daup cleared his bench. Jerry Daron, a part-time reserve player, scored a varsity bucket.

**IT WAS A GOOD PERFORMANCE** by the Big Red, especially in view of its long layoff. Coach Daup's charges had gone 15 days without competitive play.

It was plain the coaching staff was concerned before the opening tip-off. Could this team find itself soon enough to hold on while it contained the Bellevue offense? For a minute or so, there seemed some doubt. But then it began to be clear that Beachey and Jerry Crosby, the two big guns for Bellevue, simply weren't going to enjoy success this night.

It was only the second time

this season that Bellevue's acts were held to single-figure scoring.

The play of Bookwalter was, as usual, a standout in Plymouth's success. But the performance of young Russell and the post play of Cok also contributed remarkably to the Big Red's victory.

Ninety-one eleventh graders are already enrolled for the 1960-61 school year. Only ten of these students will not have received credit for four years of English by graduation; while eighty-one students will have had four or more years of English. Nineteen high school boys and girls are carrying two senior English courses, which means they will graduate with the equivalent of five years of English. Seventy-four students out of ninety-one are enrolled in English IV.

**ORDINANCE NO. 9-60** AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE INVESTMENT OF FUNDS IN THE TREASURY OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO, AND TO DECLARE AN EMERGENCY BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Council of the Village of Plymouth, State of Ohio:

Section 1. Whenever there are moneys in the treasury of the Village of Plymouth, which will not be required to be used by the Village for a period of six months or more, such moneys may, in lieu of being deposited in a bank, be invested in obligations of the Village of Plymouth, Ohio, and in such other bonds or other obligations specified in Ohio Revised Code Section 731.66, as now in effect or as the same may from time to time be hereafter amended.

Section 2. Such investment shall be made in the manner and pursuant to the terms and provisions set forth in Sections 731.56 to 731.59, inclusive of the Revised Code, Ohio.

Section 3. ### ORDINANCE NO. 9-60

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS OF THE VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH, OHIO FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING LAND AND CONSTRUCTING A FIREPROOF MUNICIPAL BUILDING THEREON AND MAKING SITE IMPROVEMENTS, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Clerk as fiscal officer of the Village has had the estimated life of the improvement and the maximum maturity of the bonds proposed to be issued, which estimated life is at least five (5) years and which maximum maturity may not exceed twenty-three (23) years;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY the Council of the Village of Plymouth, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That it is necessary to issue the bonds of the Village of Plymouth in the principal amount of \$38,000 for the purpose of acquiring land and constructing a fireproof municipal building thereon and making site improvements, and that the bonds shall be issued in one lot, and notes shall be issued in anticipation thereof.

Section 2. That said bonds shall be in the denomination of \$1,000 each, numbered from 1 to 38, both inclusive, shall be dated the first day of March 1960, shall bear interest at the rate of four per centum (4%) per annum, payable June 1, 1961 and semi-annually thereafter on the first day of June and the first day of December of each year until the principal sum is paid; provided, however, that if said bonds are sold bearing a different rate of interest than hereinbefore specified, such bonds shall bear such rate of interest as may be provided for in the resolution of Council approving the award thereof.

Section 3. Said bonds shall mature as follows: \$4,000 on December 1 in each of the years from 1961 to 1970, inclusive, except that \$3,000 shall mature on December 1, 1961, which maturities are hereby determined to be in substantially equal annual installments.

Section 4. Said bonds shall be executed by the Mayor and Clerk and shall bear the corporate seal of the Village. The interest coupons attached to said bonds shall bear the facsimile signature of the Clerk printed or lithographed thereon. They shall be designated "Village of Plymouth Bonds" and shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the office of the legal depository of the Village, presently, The Peoples National Bank of Plymouth, Plymouth, Ohio.

Section 5. That for the purpose of providing the necessary funds to pay the interest on the foregoing issue of bonds, promptly when and as the same falls due and also to provide a fund sufficient to discharge the said serial bonds at maturity, there shall be and is hereby levied on all the taxable property in said Village of Plymouth, in addition to all other taxes, a direct tax annually during the period said bonds are to run in an amount sufficient to provide funds to pay interest upon said bonds and when the same falls due and also to provide a fund for the discharge of the principal of said serial bonds at maturity, which tax shall not be less than the interest and sinking fund required by Section II of Article XII of the Constitution.

Section 6. Said tax shall be and is hereby ordered, computed, certified, levied and extended upon the tax duplicate and collected by the same officer in the same manner and at the same time that taxes for general purposes for each of said years are certified, extended and collected. Said tax shall be placed before and in preference to all other items in the full amount thereof. The funds derived from said tax levies hereby required shall be placed in a separate and distinct fund, which, together with all interest collected on the same, shall be irrevocably pledged for the payment of the interest and principal of said bonds when and as the same fall due.

Section 7. Said bonds shall be first offered at par and accrued interest to the officer in charge of the Bond Retirement Fund in his official capacity, and the same shall be sold at public sale and sold in the manner provided by law.

Section 8. It is hereby determined that all acts, conditions, done, precedent to and in the issuing of these bonds in order to irrevocably pledge for the binding obligations of said Village have been done, happened and performed in regular and due form as required by law; that the faith, credit and revenue of said Village are hereby pledged for the prompt payment of the principal and interest thereof at maturity; and that no limitation of indebtedness or taxation, either statutory or constitutional, has been exceeded in issuing these bonds.

Section 9. The Clerk is hereby directed to forward a certified copy of this ordinance to the County Auditors of Richland County and Huron County.

Section 10. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, safety and welfare of said Village and its inhabitants, and for the further reason that immediate action is required for the improvement to be financed by the issuance of these bonds is urgently required to afford necessary facilities for the proper conduct of the affairs of the Village and the inhabitants thereof; wherefore, this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from an immediately after its passage.
