

Local man, two others die in collision at Rome

A 45-year-old father of five, an ex-Shilohan and a Willard man, died as the result of a head-on collision in Route 613 near Rome at 5:45 p.m. Friday.

Lawrence Robinson, 27 Sandusky street, who had lived here only a short time, was the passenger of 26-year-old Fred W. Jacobs, Town Line road west, Willard, who drove left of center and collided with Kenneth J. Noble, 36 Crestline, son of W. H. Noble of Shiloh.

Robinson and Jacobs were killed instantly. Noble was rushed to Shelby Memorial hospital, where his condition was judged "very critical," and moved by ambulance to Mt. Carmel hospital, Columbus, where he died at 10:20 p.m. State highway patrolmen of the Mansfield post said Jacobs was proceeding west in Route 603. He and Robinson were employees of F. E. Myers & Bro. Co., pump manufacturer, Ashland.

NOBLE WAS SAID TO

have been all but stopped when Jacobs crashed into his car. Patrolmen said Jacobs was speeding at 65 miles an hour at the moment of impact. The two cars were fused, head to head, after the collision.

Noble received a fractured skull, fractured jaw and crushed chest. Jacobs died of a crushed skull, dislocated hip and fractured knee. Robinson's death was attributed to a crushed chest and fractures of both legs.

Robinson, born in Floyd county, Ky., Feb. 1, 1915, moved here five months ago. His wife, Ruby, two daughters, Letty and Patricia, at home; three sons Larry and Richard, Plymouth, and Pvt. Tom, in the Army in Germany; his mother, Mrs. Eliza Robinson, Shelby; his father, John Willard; Willis, Shelby; Hansel, Monroeville; and six sisters, Mrs. Claude Cooper, Petersburg, Mich.; Mrs. Press Conley, Bremen, Ind.; Mrs. Ellis Rose, Orland, Ind.; Miss

Pearlene Robinson, Pomeroy, Ind.; Mrs. Lee Spencer, Willard; and Mrs. Norman Miles, Shelby, survive.

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Direct distance dial to begin Aug. 7

Plymouth telephone subscribers will have direct distance dialing Aug. 7, William C. Henry, president of Northern Ohio Telephone Co., announced.

Direct distance dialing is the latest development in long distance service. Subscribers may dial directly to millions of telephones over the nation.

Equipment to provide this service has been purchased at a cost of \$447,286.41 and a crew of factory engineers is making the installation now.

All telephone numbers must conform to the DDD numbering plan, which consists of either two letters and five numbers or seven numbers. Since the latter plan will eventually be the only one in existence, NOTell Co. is adopting it. Plymouth numbers will consist of seven digits. The change to the new numbers will occur June 19. Inauguration of direct distance dialing will come Aug. 7, Henry says.

A program explaining the details of direct distance dialing has been developed by the company and is available to all groups, schools and organizations. Dates can be arranged

through Paul H. Kaufman, Director of Public Information, Northern Ohio Telephone Co., Bellevue.

Pollution board attitude may be just as Greenwich

Attitude of Water Pollution Control board toward an inquiry by the Village of Plymouth whether to permit use of the present sanitary sewer system by a laundromat store may have been indicated in its reply to Greenwich.

Engineer Bruce M. McDill told Greenwich:

"The wastes from laundromat installations present a difficult problem of satisfactory treatment unless they can be handled with normal municipal sanitary sewage. A septic tank installation for discharge to misused storm sewers or drains is not satisfactory."

"This department cannot approve disposal of wastes to such storm sewers as are maintained within your village."

Status of Greenwich's sanitary sewer system is identical with that of Plymouth: non-existent.

Nevertheless, village council there, by 5 to 1 vote, approved installation.

Council re-seated, still wavers on water

First realignment of council seats was executed by Mayor William Fazio last week.

Formerly, mayor and clerk sat side-by-side along south edge of council table, with councilmen seated on ad hoc basis around table.

Now, Mayor Fazio occupies chair along narrow edge, at east side of table. Clerk Ellis sits opposite at west side of table. Councilmen are supposed to be seated in alphabetical order along long edges, at north and south sides of table, with Akers at right of mayor, Levering at left.

It didn't work quite that way last week, but Fazio has high hopes.

5. "Replacement families have considerably lower standard of housing and living than those which left."

Registrations must be turned

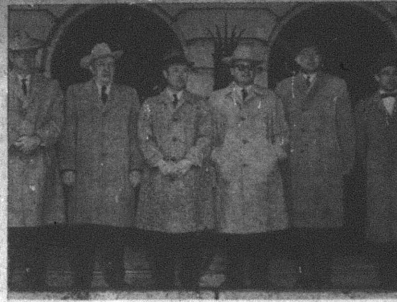
in to Brownie or Scout leaders by May 16. Mrs. Robert L. McIntire is the registrar for the camps.

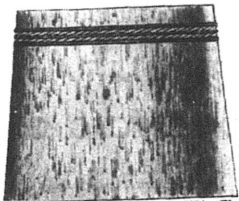

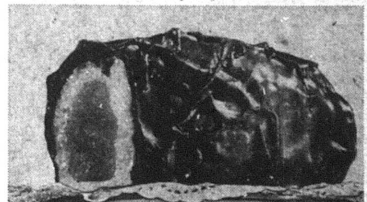

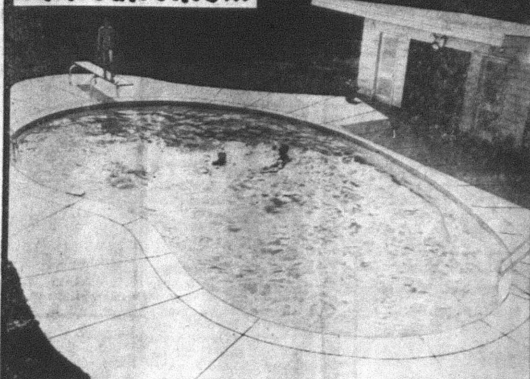
