## Four teachers quit, remainder of staff gets token raise

Only four teachers of Plymouth public schools will not return next year. Supt. M. J. Coon told the board of education Apr. 13, as a salary schedule calling for payments of \$217,929 to 50 teachers for 1960-61 was approved.

Salary boosts of from \$50 to \$100 annually were provided for each instructor.

Elmo Fruth, Mrs. Sonia Hill Lloyd Mathies and Mrs. June Handshoe will not return. Each was self-terminated. Mrs. Hill for family reasons, Mrs. Handshoe because she is moving to Dayton, Mr. Mathies because he is being married in Illinois, Mr. Fruth because he wishes to return to West Virginia.

The 1960-61 salary bill is \$2,467 over the current figure, slightly over one per cent, and reflects in-grade raises under the existing schedule.

Zimmerman Plumbing & Heating, Bellevue, second low bidder, was awarded a contract to furnish heating and ventilating for the high school addition on a bid of \$47,001.

A 178-day school calendar for next year — 176 days required by the state plus two days of teachers' meetings — was approved. Sessions will open Sept. 6 and close May 26, 1961.

Enrollment in the system as of Monday was 1,143, a decrease of 16 from the previous six-week period.

Contract to teach in Shiloh Junior High school will be offered to Dwight Rothhaar, a graduate of Heidelberg college, now teaching at Chatfield, and to teach in Plymouth High school to Philip Workman, a graduate of Ashland college, now teaching at Perryville.

## Laundromat gains council's approval

A demonstration purporting to show that effluent from a laundromat store is cleaner and less objectionable than wastes from the household washing machine prompted village council Tuesday night to approve installation of a laundromat in the old theatre building.

The demonstration was conducted in two small bottles.

The demonstrator, employee of a firm which sells laundromat equipment, placed two drops of liquid soap in sample of water used by a laundromat. After vigorous agitation, the latter stood perhaps half an inch high and the base liquid cleared promptly. He was required to put five times as much soap in the untreated sample of Plymouth water before he was able to obtain the same lather. The base liquid did not clear promptly.

He asserted this showed the laundromat will be a better user of the village sewers, such as they are, than domestic washing machines, because laundromat water requires less soap and the effluent is cleaner.

After some debate, installation was approved by a 4 to 1 vote. It came after a letter from G. A. Hall, secretary of the Water Pollution Control board, was read aloud.

"Adding the discharge from such an installation to a receding stream without treatment would give rise to considerably greater pollution than now exists," he said.

It was pointed out this is because the WPCB considers household drain water as industrial waste because the detergent cannot be filtered out.

Hall's letter contained a hidden bombshell. He told the village its sewer permit may be in jeopardy unless it adduces a plan by which to finance the entire sewer project, estimated to cost \$600,000.

The matter of voting this November on a portion of the financing costs is insufficient. It would seem prudent to have a financial consultant advise the village as to various phases of financing available. Some

methods available would not require a vote in November. Recommendation for renewal of your permit cannot be made without specific information as to the steps that will be taken for compliance, including both financial and construction. The requested information should be submitted prior to the next board meeting May 10."

J. Emerson Davis, Youngstown, a self-styled municipal income tax expert, will convene with the mayor and council informally at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday to discuss possibilities of establishing a municipal income tax here. Mayor William Fazio said "we want to make it clear that if we do install a municipal income tax here, we would want to reserve some of its proceeds for other things besides sewers, such as recreational facilities and streets."

Policy on installation of water mains in new areas where no water has ever been supplied was laid down after long debate. The village will require developers or customers to pay 60 per cent of the cost of six-inch pipe and installation and will pay the remaining 40 per cent itself.

Securities Properties, Inc., will print the councilmanic bonds to pay for the new fire station on a bid of \$118.

Mrs. Helen Isaman's complaint that she fell on a village street in January, 1959, lodged by her attorney, Robert L. Ross, Mansfield, was answered with a letter saying the village has no insurance but doubts any liability since she failed to report the incident officially.

Although there was no release of data in violation of the law, the informant upon whose statement last week's item relating to the census was based was NOT resident nor domiciled in the village of Plymouth. Any implication or conclusion to the contrary is inaccurate and unwarranted.

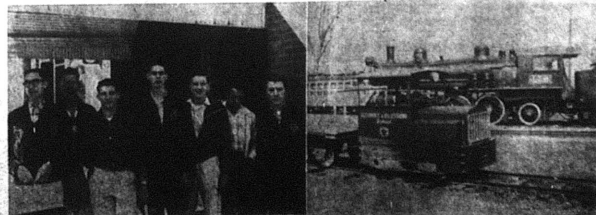
