# Boy, 4, killed by car

Four-year-old Gregory Glo-rioso was killed instantly at 2:30 p.m. Saturday when he darted from behind a tree in-to the path of a southbound station wagon in Sandusky street opposite the high school.

street opposite the high school. The boy had been with his father, popular S. J. (Sam). Glorioso, manager of a team in Plymouth Midget league, in the PML stadium behind the high school. With his elder brother, Michael, six, he went to Curly's Dari-Bar across the street from the school for refreshment. He was returning to the field when he died.

The boy was struck by John Forrest (Peanuts) Rowe, 47, 811 Center street, Ashland, held blameless by police for his part in the tragedy.

Rowe was accompanied by a Spitz dog. He told police he did not see the boy dart out in front of him. He estimated his speed at 30 miles an hour.

Police Chief Robert L. Meiser, who investigated, said he was proceeding in the village cruiser north in Sandusky street at the time of the accident "It heard a thurs and deat."

eruiser north in Sandusky street at the time of the accident. "I heard a thump and when I stopped I could see what happened," Meiser said. "I knew the boy was dead the minute I saw him. Neither he not the driver stood a chance." The Rowe car traveled 92 feet 4 inches from the point of impact and over 60 feet after the application of brakes.

Gregory's skull was crushed and his neck broken.

His parents — his mother, is the former Sallie Fennere, who was at her employment in the restaurant of Mansfield-Le-land hotel when the tragedy occurred — and his grandparents, the Mike Fenners, and a sister, Sharon, and his brother, Thornas, and "thalf-sister, Sandras, survive.

## For the Ohio Senate

When Ohio doesn't choose a U. S. Senator or a governor local interest in an election tends to diminish.

But there's much at stake this year, and every citizen ought to be told about it.

The census now being carried out will show Ohio's population to be so large that the state is entitled to another member of the House of Representatives.

And when the governor is so informed by the secretary of the interior, the Ohio legislature will proceed to re-district the state so that new congressional districts obtain.

It follows that if Republicans control the legislature, they'll do their darnedest to insure that boundaries are laid to give advantage to Republican candidates for Congress. The same holds true for Democrats.

The Republicans will certainly organize the lower house. With some luck in the November polling, the party could win control of the Ohio Senate, or at least hold an 18-to-18 stalemate.

So it's extremely important how you vote for candidates for the Ohio Senate in the May 5 primaries.

The voter must choose not only a flag bearer for his party but one who will stand a good chance of downing his opponent in the fall.

This district will elect two senators. None of the candidates, whether for the four-year or the two-year term, is of the stature of Charles A. Mosher, who's running for Congress. But nevertheless one of them must

John W. Brown of Medina county, who served 11 days as governor, is unopposed on the GOP ticket for the two-year term.

John J. Pappas, Lorain; Alfred J. P. O'Donnell, Jr., Elyria; Roy B. (Mud) Gardner, Mansfield, and Harold E. Gibson, Mansfield, are the GOP candidates for the four-year

Because we believe it's time the lesser populated areas of the district deserve representation, and because we respect "Mud" Gardner's integrity and character, we believe he is entitled to wide support.

It wouldn't be fair for an editor who's a registered Republican to interfere in a Democratic primary (although he won't hesitate to cross party lines when the sceret ballot allows) and so we won't recommend a Democrat candidate.

But we do think it's important that Ohio's legislature be organized by Republicans next year, and for this reason we think a strong candidate who can appeal to his whole district ought to be chosen. "Mud" Gardner is that man.






