Publisher to talk Memorial day

Ernst L. Henes, since 1924 publisher of the Wellington Enterprise, the only weekly newspaper editor in America to win twice the coveted National Editorial association award for community service, will be principal speaker during Memorial day exercises in Greenlawn cemetery Monday.

A veteran of World War I, having served in France with the AEF, Mr. Henes became publisher at Wellington at the age of 24.

He is a director of the Buckeye Press association and of the Ohio Newspaper association. Married to the former Martha Artz of Shiloh, he has a daughter and twin sons.

Mr. Henes is a past commander of Wellington Post, American Legion, and a past president of the Buckeye Press association.

Annual parade will form before the elementary school at 10:15 a.m. Monday. Vance C. Hoffman, Sr., will be parade marshal.

Plymouth High school band directed by Harold R. Davenport will head the marching units.

Elmer-Parcel Post, American Legion, and its auxiliary, Esther Taylor Bricker Tent 87, Daughters of Union Veterans, Girl and Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts and Bpwnies, Plymouth Midget leaguers, local unit, Ohio Civil Defense corps, Co. A, 863th Engineer Battalion (Heavy Construction) and Junior Deputies will complete the column.

Mayor William Fazio will be master of ceremonies in the cemetery. The Rev. Moss Rutan, pastor of First Presbyterian church, will deliver the invocation and benediction.

DUV unit will lay the symbolic wreath in memory of those who gave their lives in defense of the republic.

B&O asks to halt passenger service to, from Plymouth

Petition to discontinue Plymouth's last passenger train service has been filed by Baltimore & Ohio railroad with Public Utilities Commission of Ohio and in West Virginia.

Trains Nos. 345 and 246, operating between Willard and Wheeling, W. Va., have been losing money. B & O officials said here last week. The railroad's biggest brass — its general passenger agent, general freight agent and the superintendent of the Newark division — were here May 18 to explain why the petition was filed. They were armed with printed broadsides stating minimum actual loss from operation of the trains between Wheeling and Willard is \$160,000 annually.

The trains now carry less than 18 passengers each trip. A prime reason for operating the trains in the past was the need to carry sleeping car passengers between the service area and Chicago, Ill. Competition by other modes of travel, including airlines, has reduced sleeping car passenger load to less than seven a day.

No. 245, westbound, clears Plymouth at 12:55 a.m. daily. No. 246, eastbound, stops here at 4:33 a.m. It carries mail.

Pool, zoning aims of new commission

A swimming pool in Mary Fate park approval of a zoning ordinance and establishment of a new industry in Plymouth are the immediate goals of the new planning commission.

First formal meeting took place Thursday night. J. Elden Nimmons, representing the Community club, and John Kleer and Paul Lake, representing the Chamber of Commerce, appeared as consultants.

Sub-committees to investigate the three projects were appointed by Mayor William Fazio, ex officio chairman.

George Lesho, Kleer and one other Chamber appointee will develop swimming pool plans. Alfred Parkinson and Lake comprise the industrial development committee.

Hugh M. Washburn and three Chamber appointees will develop a zoning ordinance.

Commission will meet regularly on the second Thursday of each month, in the village hall.

Population set at 1,809, you

Plymouth's population advanced 19.8 per cent in the 10-year period since the 1950 census, Leo A. Reichert, district supervisor of the census, told The Advertiser this week.

Total population of the village is 1,810, of whom 757 live in Huron county and 1,053 in Richland county.

Official census in 1950 showed 1,510 persons. Net gain is therefore 300.

Detailed statistical data of the nature of the population, as to age and sex, are not now available, Reichert said. The census bureau has a target date of December, 1960, to provide these data.

Ayler, instructor in the experimental mine, says there is no noticeable air contamination in the mine when the locomotive is in operation.

Credit where it's due

It is good to note the board of education is going ahead with recommendations to improve the mathematics and science curricula in the high school.

Those who prepared the recommendations deserve commendation of everyone honestly interested in better schools.

And there's hardly a better time to be thinking about such improvement than today, the eve of graduation of our biggest class, with the largest number in history going on to college.

Six years ago, seven per cent of the graduates had never been to Cleveland or Columbus. And only 12 per cent went on to higher education.

We've come a long way in six years. But there is still a long way to go.

We'll wager right now that, come February, 1961, the slightly under-40-per cent of the class which enrolled in college will have these comments to make:

1. "We didn't know enough about English composition and how to prepare reports, papers, themes and such."
2. "Our background in literature wasn't strong enough."
3. "Our study habits weren't what they ought to be."

The comments do not apply only to our town. Graduates of almost every high school in the state have made the same ones for several years.

The revision of the science and mathematics curricula is a step in the right direction.

But there are other revisions that need to be made. And they ought to come from all levels of the public educational system. From the state board and state department, from the county level and from local administrators.

If a man or woman can't communicate effectively, he or she has to strike against him. To communicate effectively, one needs a sound grasp of spelling, of punctuation, of rhetoric and elemental rules of direct expression, and of a reasonable volume of literature.

Parents and friends of pupils can help thus:

1. Encourage them to read mature, worth-while material. Sixth graders and up should be reading books that count, or have counted, books that inform, that excite the intellect, that speak of great moral and human issues. Nathaniel Hawthorne is more useful to them than, say, Helen Houston: Student Nurse.
2. Demand grammatical speech. Correct a child who uses the wrong tense, or number, or gender. Encourage him to express himself with clarity and preciseness.
3. Set a sound example by using good speech, by spelling correctly and writing correctly.
4. Get them started NOW, the younger the better. Make chil'ren a part of mature conversation when they show the ability to communicate in it. Nothing encourages a child to excel quite so much as recognition for effort in obtaining excellence.

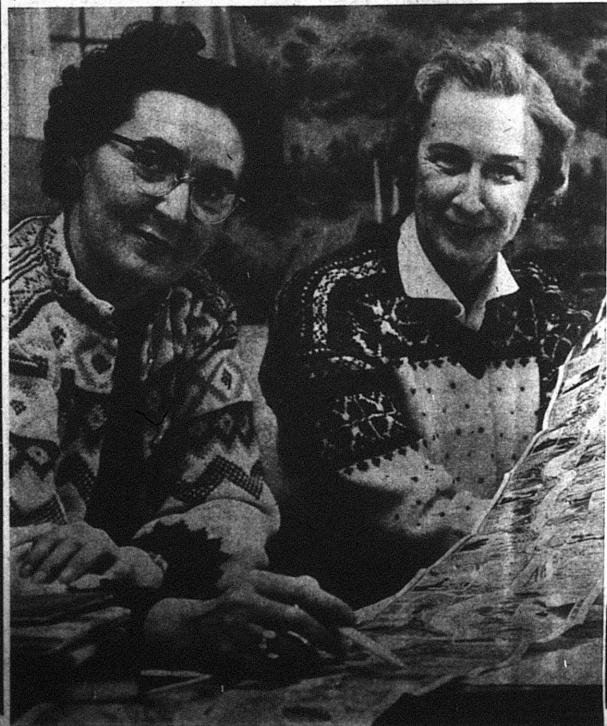

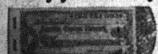

Ohio colt entries top state fair lists

The Big-Four colt series at the 1960 Ohio State fair, Aug. 26 through Sept. 2, attracted entries from 4 states and Canada.

Fair Manager Rowland Bishop says, "By all standards it appears that our championship racing program is achieving a national reputation."

USTA gives much of the credit for the success of the State Fair colt races to the Ohio Fairs Fund law passed in the 1957 legislation session. This law provides for a tax on pari-mutuel betting. Monies derived from this tax are earmarked for the improvement of racing breeds in Ohio. Money realized from this tax is divided among Ohio's fairs for the encouragement of the racing industry.

This law earmarks \$60,000 of the monies received from the pari-mutuel tax for the state fair to divide into four purses of \$15,000 each. Harness horse owners have augmented these funds by a series of payments to keep their Ohio born or bred colts eligible for a share in the big purses.

A USTA spokesman says, "These races are an excellent example of an industry, with the backing of the legislation, using the self-help method to grow, rather than falling back on the taxpayer. All monies paid out in purses for the big four colt series come directly from the racing and breeding industry itself."
