

Reduced budget set for hearing Tuesday

Public hearing on a proposed municipal budget of \$40,040-73 — 12.5 per cent less in the general fund than the previous year — will be conducted Tuesday at 10 a.m. in the office of Clerk Carl V. Ellis.

The budget is substantially the same as last year's save for two items; the general fund balance will be lower and an additional \$940 is anticipated from mayor's court assessments.

Clerk Ellis said Tuesday he expects this amount to derive from "more vigorous use of the radar speed device on the police cruiser".

The budget as drafted shows cost of the new firehouse to be 12.5 per cent over estimates — \$43,862.50 versus \$39,000 raised in councilmanic bonds. The balance of \$4,862.50 is divided between the forfeit of the defaulting contractor, amounting to \$1,277.50, and \$3,585 pumped in from the general fund.

The firehouse fund is so far encumbered to the extent of \$42,169.94, leaving \$1,692.56 for unforeseen expenses.

Shiloh scratching for ready money to repair streets

Shiloh's mayor and council are having a tough time making the shoe fit the last.

Streets requiring repair will have to wait upon the availability of funds.

In the meantime, Mayor Glenn Swanger has been energetically seeking assistance of the Richland county highway department.

The department has already agreed to contribute materials and labor for repair of Petit street. Village will pay \$10 a ton for the hot mix.

If the village can recover damages from United Construction Co., Youngstown, other thoroughfares will be repaired. They were damaged when the sewers were laid.

Main street, which is also Route 603, needs repair. State highway department will be asked to contribute to its maintenance.

Swanger told the council June 22 he will ask Mansfield's street department to clean sanitary sewer lines, for a fee.

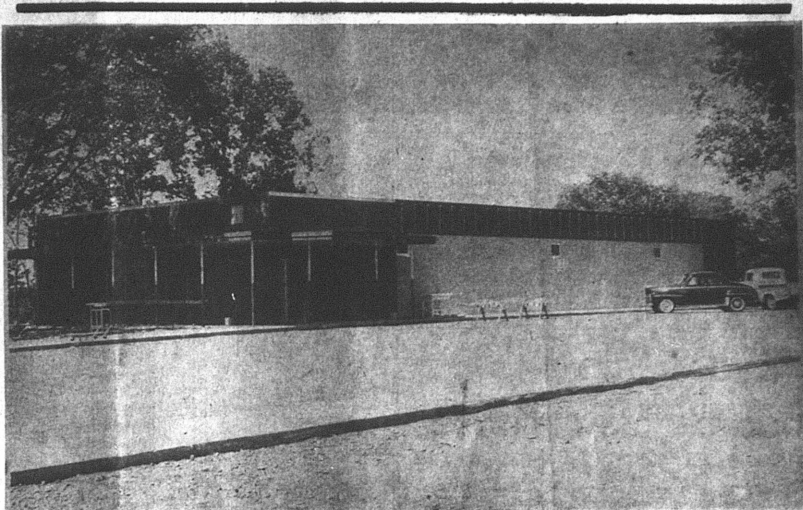

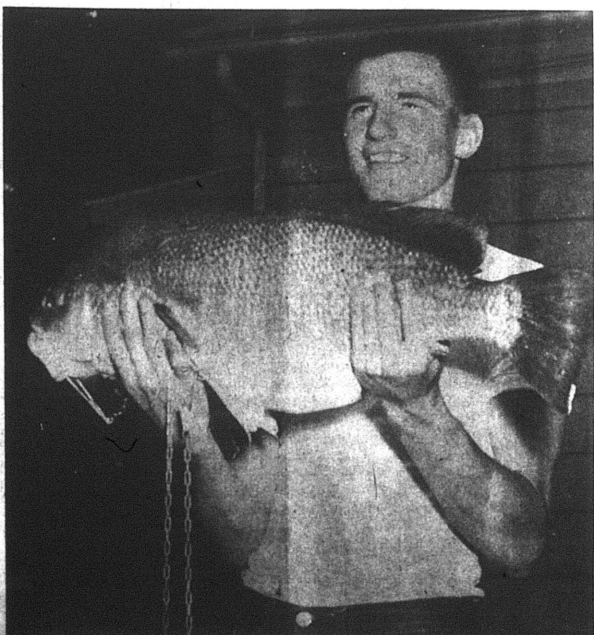
Ox roast readied at New Haven

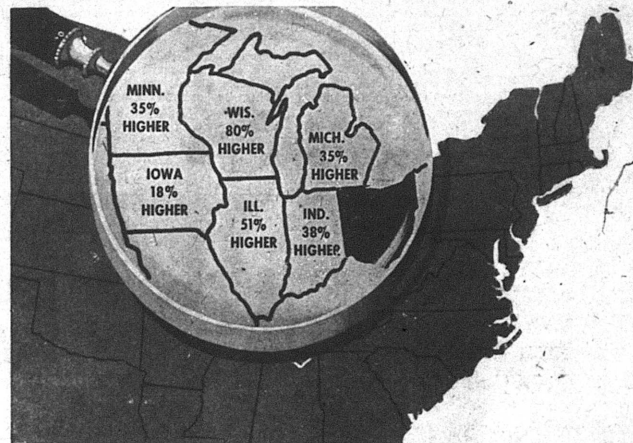

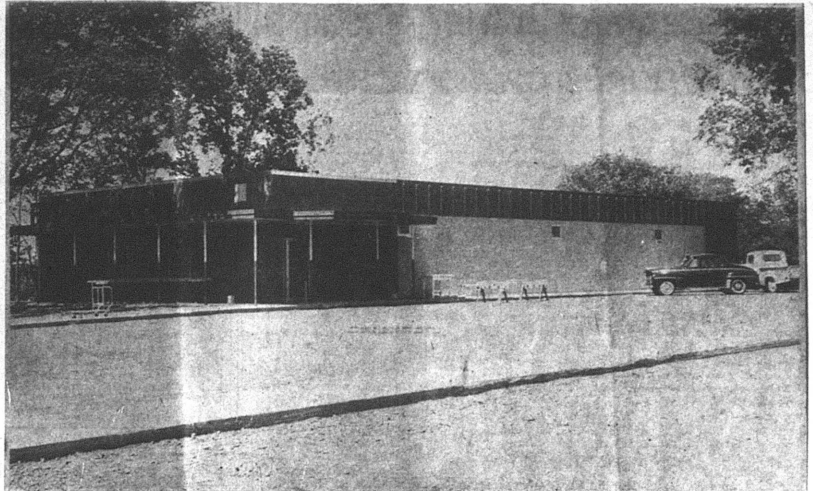

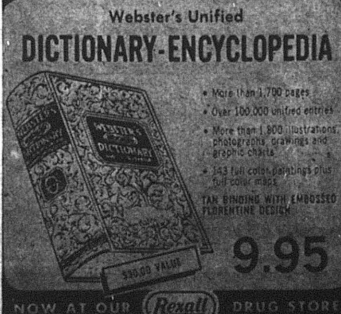

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Independence?

The nation reaches its 184th birthday Monday. Another star — one that may prove to be more costly in dollars and cents than any we've added since No. 14 — marks the blue field of Old Glory this year.

A wise man was recently quoted as saying the trouble with Americans is that we understand liberty but do not grasp unity, whereas the Russians comprehend unity, but do not understand liberty.

It would appear that we can afford to apply a little unity to the solution of our domestic problems. It's been tried a few times, sometimes at the expense of liberty.

When the encroachments upon liberty affects no more than our right to smoke in public buildings or drink on Sundays, we accept them in their intended spirit and learn to live with them.

It is when these encroachments exceed rightful bounds that an American is properly exercised. And we happen to be considerably exercised about what we consider to be America's greatest domestic problem.

First of all, it's a hot potato, and nobody wants to come to grips with it, save with tongs.

Second, every proposal to solve it departs from the precept — and we think it erroneous in entirety — that there will always be a considerable segment of the population that's shiftless and useless.

But something has to be done, and done promptly, about the citizen who doesn't carry his fair share of the

load.

Politicians seeking support at the polls propose to tax the energetic citizen to pay for the keep of the lethargic one.

Does the concept of American independence require acceptance of the doctrine that the vigorous must be penalized for the benefit of the lazy?

We would hope not. But we frankly are a little frightened that that's what's happened in America.

The revolution that occurred 184 years ago was a moral as well as a political and economic one. The social upheaval that took place in the Thirties resulted in establishment of the doctrine that everybody has a right to be taken care of by his neighbor.

We would not turn back to the Twenties, nor the conditions that pertained. But what profiteth a man to have won a battle if he loseth his own soul?

To our way of thinking, Independence day in 1960 is a good time for all of us to do a little thinking: how can we change things so that the shiftless, the lazy, the weak, the disabled, — and they are increasing in number, and expense, faster than their files in the great regiments of Americans are being filled — can be made to carry a larger share of their rightful burden.

The man, the party whose platform shows signs of accomplishing that goal can write a one-way ticket to Washington any time.

Why not now?

Japanese grad student says Nippon really likes Ike

(Ed. Note: These observations respecting the recent difficulties in Japan have special significance in Central Ohio, because of the recent award of a big Panama Canal Co. contract for locomotives to a Japanese firm in competition with a local one, as well as because of the rebuff to President Eisenhower by the Japanese government and people. They were written by Tetsuo Hoshino, Japanese graduate student in Wittenberg university. Roommate of Franklin D. Eckstein of Plymouth.)

Lately many Americans asked me why Japanese people don't like Ike. This question, although simple, is very complicated. There is no alternative but to answer that most of the Japanese people don't hate Ike but actually respect him. The policy and the individual should be considered separately. Ike stands for a policy which should be separated from him as an individual.

A few days ago I received a letter from my friend in Japan, who said that he was disgusted with the Kishi government but couldn't agree with the extreme acts of the union leaders, the Communists, and the ZENGAKUREN (the Japanese Student League which was responsible for the student demonstration). He was disappointed by the cancellation of Ike's trip, as he felt that it destroyed U.S. prestige among foreign countries. Most Japanese, possessing common sense have feelings similar to those of my friend.

The demonstration toward the U. S. Japanese Security treaty and President Eisenhower's cancelled trip was reported in full in the U.S.A. I think that these two situations were of a different nature, although they seemed identical. Those against the treaty have been expanding in social uprising... it was the anti-Kishi feeling of the Japanese people which resulted in the disregard of parliamentary procedures toward the public. Namely, the more the treaty was subjected to consideration, the more swiftly did suspicions of that treaty come to a head. Nevertheless, the Kishi government tried to pass it hurriedly as an important matter without enough explanation to the opposition. On May 20, the ministerial party passed and recognized the treaty in the Diet, where the opposition was not present. There were many reasons for this action, but it is clear that the rule of democratic parliamentary procedure was trampled underfoot by that course of action. Kishi's rash policy caused the formation of two opposing factions: those who wished to support the treaty and those who opposed it. I think that the ratification of the treaty came too early, even though both countries supposedly considered it closely.

I was much aggrieved with the violence toward Mr. Hag-

gerty in Tokyo. Most of the Japanese people, even those against the treaty, regretted the incident. The objectionable act of the Communists and of ZENGAKUREN showed a part of the Japanese social distortion, instead of showing Japan as she really is. I am very sorry that I don't have enough space to write about the cause

of ZENGAKUREN's regrettable act; the problem is comprised of many more elements besides the fact that those rioting students are Communists. The difficulty cannot be successfully overcome without first considering the social and educational condition and the environment of the Japanese.

I declare that most of Japanese people would welcome Ike as their guest. A great many of them are sorry for the manner in which they treated Mr. Haggerty. I cannot bear the thought that Japan, who should be a constitutional state, is held in contempt as the country which does not even know the elements of diplomacy.

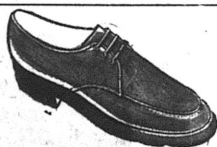

An emergency ordinance enacted by the Village of Plymouth, Richland County, Ohio, in the matter of the hereinbefore described improvement, under the supervision of the Director of Highways.

WHEREAS, the Director of Highways is considering improving a portion of the public highway which is described as follows:

(Location and general nature of work)
Apply asphaltic concrete resurfacing of approximately 1 1/2" on the existing pavement of SR 61 from the south corporate line of the village of Plymouth to the intersection with SR 98 a distance of approximately 0.40 miles or 2,112 lineal feet.

NOW THEREFORE, Be it ordered that the Street, Supervisor of said Village is hereby authorized to enter into maintenance and parking agreements and special contractual obligations.

SECTION 4 (Maintenance)
That it is hereby agreed that said Village will, after completion of the aforementioned project, maintain the improvement herein contemplated in accordance with the provisions of the statutes relating thereto and will make ample financial and other provisions for such maintenance, and maintain the right of way and keep it free of obstructions in a manner satisfactory to the State of Ohio.

SECTION 5 (Parking Regulations)
That upon completion of said improvement, said Village, will thereafter:

(a) Keep said highway open to traffic at all times; and
(b) Regulate parking in the following manner:
No parking on the pavement.

SECTION 6 That traffic control lights will not be installed on the project without prior approval by the State.

SECTION 7 That the rights-of-way provided for said improvement shall be held inalienable for public highway purposes and no signs, posters, billboards, roadside stands or other private installations shall be permitted within the right-of-way limits.

SECTION 8 (CERTIFICATION OF AVAILABILITY OF RIGHT OF WAY, UTILITY REARRANGEMENT AND SAVING THE STATE OF OHIO HARMLESS OF DAMAGES.)

(a) That all existing right of way within the Village, which is necessary for the aforesaid improvement, shall be made available therefor.
(b) That the State/Municipality will acquire any additional right of way required for the construction of the aforesaid improvement.

(c) That arrangements have been or will be made with and agreements obtained from all public utility companies whose lines or structures will be affected by the said improvement and said companies have agreed to make any and all necessary plant removals or rearrangements in such a manner as to be clear of any construction called for by the plans of said improvement and said companies have agreed to make such necessary rearrangements immediately after notifications by said city/village or the Department of Highways.

(d) That it is hereby agreed that the village shall at its own expense make all rearrangements of water mains, service lines, fire hydrants, valve boxes, sanitary sewers or other municipal owned and/or any appurtenances thereto, whether inside or outside the corporate limits, as may be necessary to conform to the said improvement and said rearrangements shall be done at such time as requested by the Department of Highways Engineer.

(e) That the construction, reconstruction, and/or rearrangement of both publicly and privately owned utilities, referred to in subsections (c) and (d) above, shall be done in such a manner as not to interfere unduly with the operation of the contractor constructing the improvement and all back-filling of trenches made necessary by such utility rearrangements shall be performed in accordance with the provisions of Section 1-2.06 of the Ohio Department of Highways Construction and Material Specification and shall be subject to approval by the State.

(f) That said VILLAGE hereby agrees that the said department of highways of the State of Ohio shall be and is hereby saved harmless from any and all damages or claims thereof arising from or growing out of the certification or obligations made or agreed to in Sections (a), (b), (c), (d) and (e) hereinabove.

SECTION 9 (Emergency Clause)
This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure by reason of the need for expediting construction of projects to promote highway safety, and provided it receives the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
