Firehouse cost to hit \$43,000: contractor quit before starting

Withdrawal of the low bidder for the \$39,000 fire house general construction resulted Tuesday night in some last-ditch finching but a decision to award the contract to the second low bidder, Focht Bros. Inc., Tiffin.

This firm's bid of \$30,400 was \$4,900 more than the low tender of \$25,500. The proceeds of sale of councilman bonds amount to \$39,000. So the council must find an additional \$4,448 — probably from the electric fund — to pay for the work.

A certified check in the amount of \$1,277.50, submitted by its bid by McDougal & McFarland, Galion, was declared forfeit and will be collected by the village.

This reduces the amount by which costs exceed funds available to \$3,170.

Architect Thurman J. Peabody, Norwalk, told the council it is unlikely any advantage would be obtained by re-advertising for bids.

A hopeful story

When all you've heard in a rain-swept week is dismal and gloomy, even that small part of it that's true, it'll do you good to hear this, which we submit is quite the most hopeful story we've heard in a long time:

"As a result of an appeal made in 1945 by the Lord Mayor of Birmingham, a woman in Quinton, near there 'adopted' a little German girl whose family had been victims of the Nazis. This woman has now learned that her 'niece', Ingeborg Schumann, of Brunswick, has just announced her engagement.

"Said the woman of Quinton to a reporter for the Birmingham Mail, 'We never met, owing to a series of coincidences. I obtained Inge's name through a Quaker organization. She was to come to this country in a shipload of child refugees, but due to illness she did not come. Nevertheless, I made myself responsible for her. I told her she could always rely upon me. She calls me 'Auntie' and we regard each other as members of the same family.

"I sent her books on English, she also speaks French. Today she is a shorthand typist. I sent her shorthand manuals and she can now take dictation in English."

"Although she had retired, 'Aun-

tie' went back to work to support Inge, and her work took on a new meaning. Now she is hoping to see Inge and her husband on their honeymoon visit.

"Said 'Auntie': 'I cannot tell you what happiness it has given me to see Inge grow up into a lovely un-bittered young woman'."

We've felt for a long time that it would do this town a world of good to invite a foreign boy or girl to come here for a school year. One of the churches could arrange the sponsorship, through the international organization established for the purpose, and a home-away-from-home could be found for the child.

We believe such a plan would enrich our community and its schools by far more than the small out-of-pocket cost. Other communities have done it, Oberlin, for one.

If we believe in what we are and how we live, we should be proud to show it to others. If what we have is good, aren't we morally obligated to offer it to others? And if others have something we can use, don't we owe it to ourselves to try to obtain it?

And just think, if we choose the right child, every club and social organization for miles around has a ready-made speaker for at least one meeting.
