St. Joseph's to erect new church

St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Mission church will erect a new and modern church building at Sandusky and Hoffman streets in the autumn, its pastor, the Rev. William Conces, said Saturday.

Bids are expected to be let about Nov. 1. A Cincinnati firm of architects is preparing plans and specifications now.

"I can't say now exactly what the building will look like or what it will measure in size, but it will be modernistic in design. The present rectory and the two houses immediately south of it will be torn down and the new church will be built on that general site," the Rev. Father Conces told The Advertiser.

The rectory will be moved four doors south to the former Fidler property now being re-modeled.

No announcement was made as to the ultimate disposition of the present church in Trux street.

Solution turns upon the uniformity of choice of fire lane (whether on the theory the right-hand lane of a street should be kept free for fire apparatus or on the theory the side of the street where hydrants are placed should be kept free from parked cars) and whether the village can afford the large number of signs that will be necessary.

visibly embarrassed when he could give no report of progress on the new firehouse. Focht Bros., general contractors, Tiffin, have placed their tool shed but not broken ground.

Crop field day Aug. 3 to visit area farms

Huron county's crops and conservation field day and tour will be Aug. 3, beginning at 10:00 a. m. at the Willard Fritz farm.

Other stops will include the farms of Harold Slessman, Holthouse Brothers, Allen Albright and Kenneth Westerman.

The first stop, in Weis road approximately four miles west of Celeryville, will include minor element tests on corn.

Boron, manganese, magnesium copper, iron and a mixture of elements were applied at planting time. Growth comparisons can be seen at this stop on the Willard Fritz farm. Results will not be determined until harvest time.

A pump drainage system is being used at the Harold Slessman farm in New Haven township on upland crops. Another drainage system on the

Holthouse farm, at Celeryville, will show how a water table can be controlled on muck land.

Many corn hybrid varieties, nitrogen on corn, soybean varieties and pre-emergence weed control on soybeans will be viewed in the afternoon at the Albright and Westerman farms. The last stop will also include one of the cooperative drainage projects where farm-

ers have agreed on a clean-out job and sharing the cost based on benefit.

A chicken barbecue will be served at Mary Fate park, Plymouth, at noon with John Hutchinson in charge.

All farmers and businessmen who are interested are invited to attend this summer tour which is sponsored cooperative by the Huron Soil Conservation district and Agricultural Extension service.

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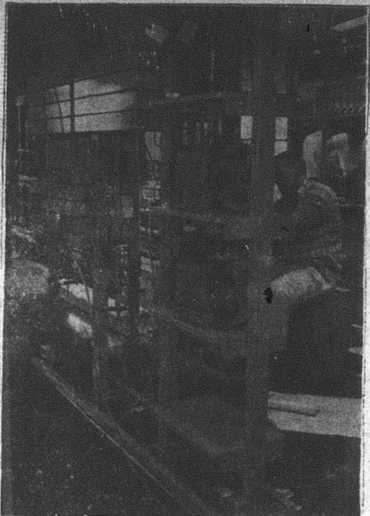

When the Army announced it was awarding the locomotive contract to Mitsubishi, GOP stock locally fell to a new and all-time low. 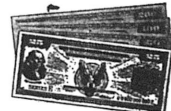

In the summer of 1863, when the encouraging news of the battle of Gettysburg was the chief topic of conversation throughout Ohio, this State was shaken by its most serious threat of invasion by the Confederates. The dashing Confederate cavalry leader, Gen. John H. Morgan of Lexington, Ky., with a force of some 2,400 men, crossed the Ohio River into Indiana on July 8. Threats of invasion into the North had heretofore amounted to little more than raids through Kentucky for horses. But this time rumors sped across Indiana and Ohio. Indianapolis was thought to be Morgan's objective, then Cincinnati, Columbus, Dayton and even Cleveland began to worry. The night of July 13, General Morgan's raiders slipped through the northern suburbs of Cincinnati without opposition, in spite of the fact that some 40,000 Union troops at various points across Ohio were searching for him. The Confederates halted to feed their horses within sight of Camp Dennison, the largest Union camp in the State. It was a running fight day and night between the raiders and their pursuers across the counties of Hamilton, Clermont, Warren, Clinton, Fayette, Ross, Pike, Jackson, Meigs, Athens, Washington, Morgan, Muskingum, Coshocton, Belmont, Harrison, Jefferson and Columbiana to the point near the town of West Point where Morgan surrendered. At Buffington Island near Portland on the Ohio River, there was a pitched battle where today stands the battlefield monument shown above. Another monument marks the site of Gen. Morgan's final surrender.

Juvenile pacers set speed marks on state fair eve

Perhaps never before in the history of the Director of the Agriculture pavilion, a feature of the Ohio State fair harness racing meet, Aug. 29 - Sept. 1, has the group of eligibles to the \$26,000 stakes race been so prolific in piling up early season wins.

With the 1960 harness racing but a few weeks old, 30-odd starters among 56 remaining eligibles to the rich event have already piled up at least 65 wins. The victors have come on tracks from California to Maryland, as well as in the Buckeye state.

Fastest mark posted thus far belongs to Major Goose, a nifty 2:01 1/5. The Goose Bay colt, owned by C. M. Saunders, Perryburg, was piloted to a pair of wins at the state fair last year as a two-year-old by Ohio's rising young driving star, Dick Buxton. His time of 2:05 in one of the heats marked him as a contender for top national honors this season as a sophomore pacer.

Merrie Adios, owned by USTA director, Byron D. Kuth, Chesterland, holds a mark of 2:01 3/5. Merrie Adios usually has the services of nationally famous John Patterson in the sulky. Value of the eligibles to the state fair races was dramatically emphasized recently when another Kuth - owned pacer, Merrie Gesture, 2:01 2/5, was sold for a reported \$40,000.

A slick-going pacing machine, Edgewood Royal, property of Dr. W. L. Regan, Wil-
minton, and winner of one of the two-year-old heats at the fair last year, finished in 2:03 4/5 in a recent race.

From Washington Court house comes another pair of fast time hopefuls. Jerry Way, owned, by Neil Helfrich and driven by Forrest Short, has been nothing short of sensational this year in races at Scioto Downs, last winning in 2:02 3/5, and L. B. Blackstone, Belle Aire farm hopeful, has scored in 2:04 1/5.

Thus, if early season racing is a criterion, and it usually is, fans could easily see, on Aug. 31, when the Director of Agriculture pace goes to the starting gate, several contenders with two-minute miles in the background. Speed is bustin' out all over!

Duck hunters told '60 shooting may fall short of '59

An initial survey of the duck factory of the Dakotas and the prairie provinces of Canada does not augur for a good fall shooting season for waterfowl in Ohio, says H. R. (Bud) Morgan, special National Wildlife Federation field representative, who made a 5,000-mile trip by auto seeking information on duck reproduction in that area.

He will make another trip and have a final report by Aug. 15.

Because of drought conditions throughout the northcentral states and Alberta, Manitoba and Saskatchewan provinces in 1959, the federation made a similar survey. In 1959, quail hunting was recommended for the Central and Mississippi Flyways, the latter of which Ohio is a part. Numerous requests for a similar 1960 investigation brought Morgan's second trip.

"From the first and early go-round, I am far from convinced that the isolated areas of more surface water will compensate for those areas that are still dry," reported Morgan. "Neither am I convinced that the increased percentage of nesters among the ducks still remaining will be capable of reproducing in sufficient numbers to get us out of the trouble we got ourselves into through greed last

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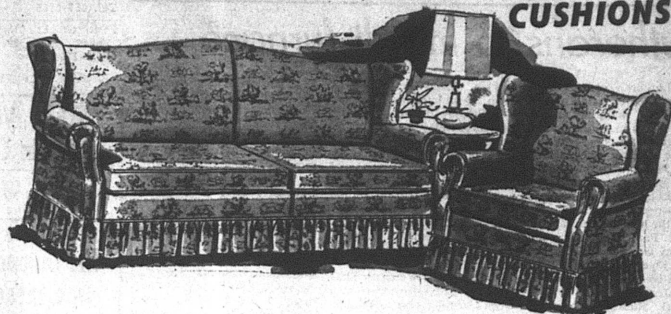

year. "Game administrators, as well as sportsmen, must be made to realize that ducks must have proper and sufficient habitat if they are to reproduce in numbers which warrant harvest. Unless, and until, we have such habitat we will continue to ask for trouble when we kill more than we produce."

Morgan declared that "it is too early to become a prophet of doom; by then same token it is too soon to become optimistic. By August 15 we will try to wrap up this thing, and make every effort to give you the word in time to plan your hunting trips on the basis of ducks."

It was comparatively easy to tell what was taking place in 1959, according to Morgan, "but forecasting the results of 1960 is not so simple."

"In 1959," he declared, "water had disappeared from the plains and that which remained was surrounded by mudflats separating cover from water. On these areas, ducks on each area were easily observed and counted."
