\$150,000 sewer issue on ballot

Reduced budget wins approval of council

A \$150,000 general obligation bond issue to support a \$625,000 sanitary sewer system was moved to the general election ballot by village council Tuesday night.

Enabling legislation was approved without dissent. It calls for bonds with maturity of 25 years and anticipated interest rate of 3½ per cent.

Remainder of the financing program will be worked out after the council has received the results of a fiscal study by Fox, Reusch & Co., Cincinnati.

A budget calling for \$40,040.75 in general fund expenditures for the next fiscal year was unanimously approved. It is 12.5 per cent less than last year's budget, although most of the difference of \$5,618.13

appears in the carry-over balance.

Mayor William Fazio defended an increase of nearly \$1,000 in anticipated receipts of the mayor's court. He said "I am hearing cases now that never were heard before, for example, minor traffic collision cases. Heretofore the police officer merely took the offender to his office and chided him. Now I have directed that a summons be issued and a case heard in my court."

Although the existing two-mill operating levy does not expire until Dec. 31, 1961, its renewal will be sought "on Nov. 8. This affords the council another chance to obtain approval should the inordinate amount of fresh tax money on

the November ballot impel voters to defeat new issues.

It is the council's intention to limit parking in the village to one side of through streets. A survey will be made to iron out anticipated irregularities, but the general policy will be that no parking will be permitted in lanes abutting fire hydrants.

Councilman Donald E. Akers called for a detailed report of outlays for sewer repairs during the past six months. This came after approval was given to an estimate of \$280 to rectify storm water flooding in the rear of East Main street stores.

Security deposit for new subscribers to electric and water service will be \$20 for re-

sidential service and \$50 for business and professional service, by the terms of an ordinance passed on first reading.

Street Supervisor Henry M. Trauger was assigned additional duties of survey of the village dump.

Cemetery committee was instructed to insure that the existing differential in rate for lots charged out-of-town buyers is maintained.

Clerk Carl V. Ellis was told to investigate the present bond market to ascertain if the council would be wise to buy up outstanding electric bonds. A surplus of \$14,000 is available.

Spruce up or fold up is admonition to small town; Chamber suggests trees

Chamber of Commerce representatives asked approval of the council for a scheme to beautify the downtown shopping area.

The plan was not new. It had been broached to the council by a private citizen a year ago but dropped when it was thought containers would be too large.

Mrs. R. Earl McQuate and J. Benjamin Smith presented a sketch showing how the Chamber of Commerce would place Norway spruce trees

measuring 36 inches in height in modified 55-gallon steel drums covered with a wooden frame. These trees would be placed at the kerbstones, or thereabouts, around the Square, and decorated in the Yule season.

Pending clarification of the village's liability for damages in event of accident to third persons, the Chamber was told a firm decision will be forthcoming in two weeks.

The highlight of the discussion was a colloquy be-

tween Mrs. McQuate and Solicitor Joseph F. Dush.

"We have simply got to do something," Mrs. McQuate said, implying the drawing power of the commercial section of the village is not all that it has been.

"I agree with this lady," said Dush. "It's a question of 'dress up or fold up'."

Retorted Mrs. McQuate: "I have no intention of folding this town up."

The bridegroom's sister, Judy, was maid of honor. Susan Woodworth and Nellie Cashen, the bride's sisters,

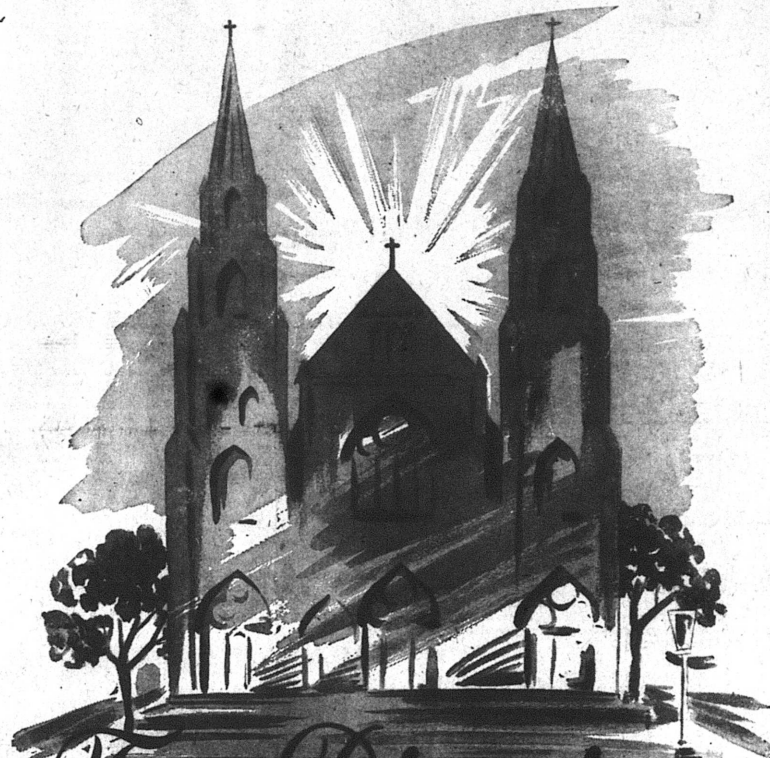

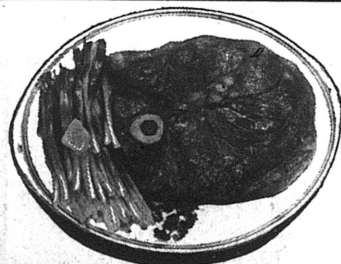

Looking over their monthly bills a tight-fisted husband complained to his wife.

"You're terribly extravagant! If anything ever happened to me you'd probably have to beg."

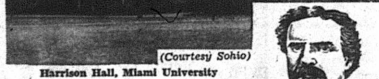

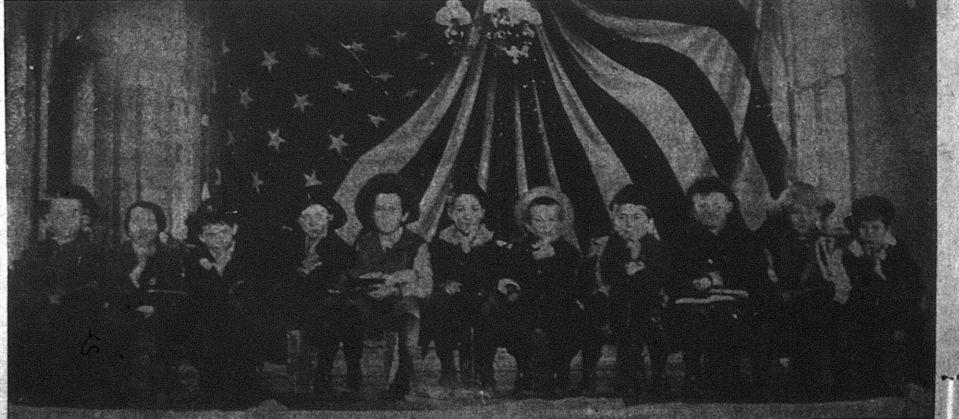
Harrison and Runkle entered the Union army and became generals; Harrison went on to the Presidency of the United States.

Whiteley Reid, as a representative of the Cincinnati Gazette, became one of the most famous war correspondents. He was present at the battles of Shiloh and Gettysburg, and was with Ohio General William S. Rosecrans in the West Virginia campaign in 1861.

Later, Reid wrote "Ohio in the War," an important reference book for students of the story of Ohio men in the Civil War.
