Clouds burst, drown ox roast, homes, stores

A flash rainstorm that dumped 3.14 inches of rain on the village in slightly more than 67 minutes inundated stores and dwellings here Sunday at 4:25 p.m.

It was the worst rainstorm in recent history. Some stores on the Square, notably Don's Shoe & Saddle shop and Millers' Hardware & Appliances, were flooded. McQuate Furniture center had several inches of water on its main floor.

Houses on the Richland county side of the village had water in their basements, notably those of M. E. Mellott at 66 Plymouth street, of Robert L. McIntire at 70 Plymouth and of A. L. Paddock, Jr., at 78 Plymouth street.

Mellott had four feet of water in his cellar. Local unit of 52nd Mobile Support Group,

Ohio Civil Defense corps, pumped him out.

Mr. Paddock was painfully burned on the right hand when the hot water heater in which gas had accumulated blew up in his face as he tried to re-light it. He was treated at Shelby Memorial hospital.

Water swirled from the southwest area of the of the village and swept into Plymouth street, where it was better than knee deep.

About 250 persons on the grounds at Jacobs Grove in attendance at the 12th annual Legion-Firemen ox roast took shelter under the tents until the height of the downpour, about 5:35 p.m. They broke for such transportation as could

leave the grounds, by then lying under from six to eight inches of water.

Mrs. Paddock stumbled over a woman who had fallen into the water and lay covered by it. Bystanders who helped the woman to her feet said that her alimentary habits earlier in the afternoon probably saved her from further injury.

The rain, coming on the heels of a heavy downpour Saturday night that affected attendance at the ox roast, left creeks and streams swollen. But the surface water quickly flowed off by Monday morning, save for some that remained in the foundry of Fate Root-Heath Co.

One stick popped him in the eye. He was rushed, for treatment, first locally, then to Willard, where a doctor told him he just missed losing the orb.

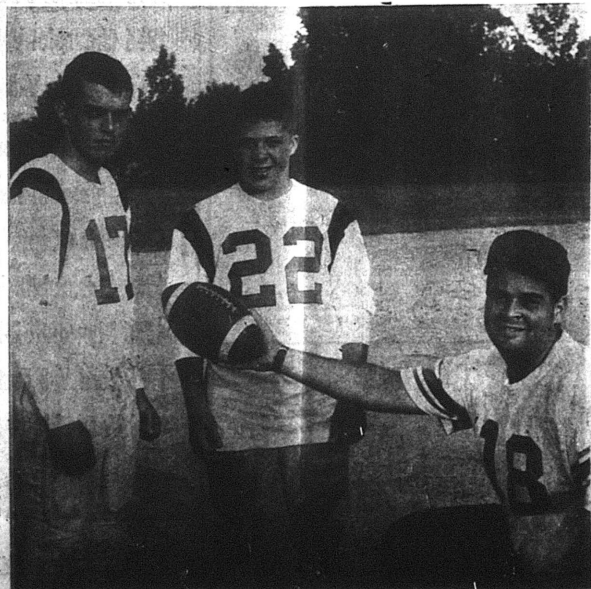
He completed the reception with a black eye, bandaged, and a chastened spirit.

Pop took us to the valley. I can't see what everybody gets excited about. It didn't impress me very much.

If you like hilly roads, no towns except now and then, poor land and only a few farm animals, beat-up buildings and hot weather, go to the valley.

We did see some college grounds. I liked Denison at Granville best, then Muskingum at New Concord and then Ohio university at Athens.

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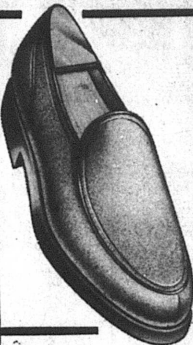

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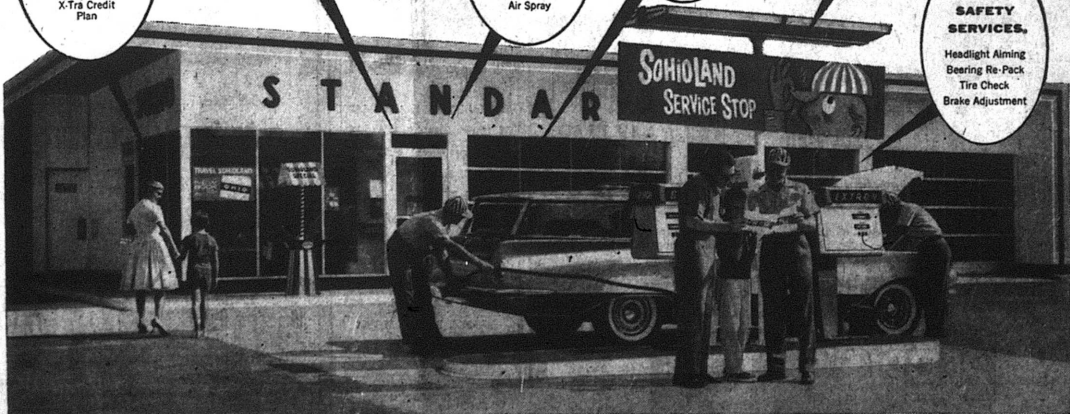
